




















2. The "Last Words" from the Honorary Colonel:





The Reviewing Officer was Captain (N) Jeff Zwick, newly appointed Commander, Canadian Fleet Pacific.


A most enjoyable reception followed the ceremony on the flight deck and in the hangar. It was an excellent opportunity to visit and meet the many new members of the ship's company.


CHARLIE COMPANY PARADE – 14 August 2015

V-J CELEBRATION BCVCA, STEACY, SPEECH – 15 August 2015

As Co-Chair of the V-J Day Commemoration Committee, I was requested to deliver a presentation, pertaining to "Canada in the Pacific War, 1939 -1945", at the V-J Day Commemoration Ceremony, on 15 August 2015, held at the Chinese Cultural Centre in Vancouver.

The talk expounds on Canada's participation, though minimal compared with the United States and Great Britain, in the Battle of Hong Kong, shelling of Estevan Lighthouse, Civil Defence (ARP - Air Raid Precaution), the Aleutian Islands Kiska Landing, Japanese fire balloons, coastal defence of British Columbia and the three Canadians who were awarded posthumous Victoria Crosses.

"Good Morning Ladies and Gentlemen,

Today, we mark the 70th anniversary of VJ – Day, 15 August 1945, when Japan capitulated to Allied Armed Forces; the end of World War II.

However, I want to journey you back 70 to 76 years when the Second World War was a global war lasting from 1 September 1939 to 2 September 1945, 6 years and 1 day.

1939 to 1945, though related conflicts began earlier, involved the vast majority of the world's nations, including all of the great powers, eventually **forming two opposing military alliances**; the **Allies** and the **Axis**.

It was the most widespread war in history, and directly involved more than 100 million people from over 30 countries, In a state of **"total war",** the major participants threw their entire economic, industrial, and scientific capabilities behind the war effort, erasing the distinction between civilian and military resources.

Marked by mass deaths of approximately 11 million civilians and the strategic bombing of industrial and population centres, during which approximately one million people were killed, including the two nuclear bombs, resulting in an estimated 50 to 85 million fatalities, made World War II the deadliest conflict in human history.

The end of the war in Europe in May 1945 did not mean the end of the Second World War. Fighting dragged on in Asia until the atom bombs destroyed Hiroshima and Nagasaki in August 1945.

So let's turn a page to broach Canada's involvement during World War II in the Pacific Theatre.

Attack on Pearl Harbour (See Photo 1)

The Japanese surprise attack on Pearl Harbor, on 7 Dec.1941, turned a European conflict into a global war.

At this time, British Columbia's coastline was largely undefended, and the province's citizens **clamored** for action In January 1942.

<u>What transpired?</u> (See Photos 2 - 8)

- Two Canadian Infantry Battalions had already been sent to reinforce Hong Kong.
- Japanese Canadian citizens were stripped of their possessions and removed from the Pacific coast to internment camps at least 100 miles inland.
- A massive expansion of RCAF bases was planned to secure the west coast from Japanese aerial assault.
- Artillery fortifications were strengthened and constructed at strategic locations in Victoria/Esquimalt, Vancouver, Vancouver Island West Coast, Yorke Island and Prince Rupert.

- Air Raid Precaution (Civil Defense) was organized involving Wardens, Auxiliary Police, Firefighters, Medical, and Scout Runner Teams. School children were trained with gas masks and air raid sirens announced many "Blackout" sessions.
- Army personnel strength in the Pacific Command was increased to 34,315 all ranks; with 10,000 serving in action in the Pacific Theatre.
- The naval establishment on the west coast had been tiny since the war began in September 1939, and the dispatch of the River class destroyers to the east coast, left B.C. essentially defenseless.
- Following sinking and capture of German merchant ships off Peru and Mexico, in 1939/40, RCN operations in the Pacific were concentrated on defense of the west coast by the Armed Merchant Cruiser, HMCS Prince Robert and other smaller naval vessels.
- Ship building increased with Burrard Dry Dock, in North Vancouver, building half of Canada's freighters, corvettes, fairmiles and destroyers.
- Boeing Sea Island plant built Catalina Flying Boats and B29 fuselage centre sections.
- The construction of the 1,700 mile long. Alaska Highway, from. 8 March to 28 Oct 1942, by US Army Engineers, through British Columbia and the Yukon Territory to Alaska to support defense and lend lease military equipment to Russia.
- The establishment of Army Cadet Corps in High Schools.

The Battle of Hong Kong, 8-25 December 1941 (See Photos 9 - 11)

In Autumn 1941, the British government accepted an offer by the Canadian Government to send two infantry battalions and a brigade headquarters personnel), to reinforce the Hong Kong garrison. "C Force", as it was known,

On 27 October 1941, HMS Awatea escorted by HMCS Prince Robert, embarked from Vancouver with 1,975 officers and men of the Winnipeg Grenadiers, from Manitoba, and the Royal Rifles of Canada, from Québec, for Hong Kong, arriving on 16 November 1941. It was one of the first battles of the Pacific campaign of World War II, and a first for Canadians.

NOTES: A New Zealand cruise liner; 545 feet long displacing 13,500 tons. While leaving Vancouver, in Aug 1941, she was holed by a US Oil tanker, returned to Vancouver, repaired and repainted in Burrard Dry Dock, North Vancouver, then commandeered by the Admiralty as a troopship for the war's duration. It was sunk in the Eastern Mediterranean at the end of the war.

NOTES: HMCS Prince Robert, David and Henry, 5,700 tons, were former CNR B.C. coastal cruise ships, purchased by the Federal Government and converted to Armed Merchant Cruisers.

The Japanese Attack (See Photo 12 - 14)

On 8 December 1941, the British Colony of Hong Kong also suffered a surprise attack by the Japanese across the frontier of the New Territories. The attack was in violation of international law, as Japan had not declared war against the British Empire.

The attack was met with stiff resistance from Hong Kong's Garrison of local troops as well as British, Canadian and Indian units. Not even the best troops could have stopped the more numerous and betterprepared Japanese troops.

Within ten days the Japanese 38th Division, supported by extra artillery and infantry, overran the defenses on the mainland portion of the colony.

On December 18, the Japanese landed on Hong Kong Island itself. The defenders fought back as best they could, grimly holding onto their positions and counterattacking repeatedly.

After seventeen days of bitter fighting, the Canadians, along with their British, Chinese and Indian allies, capitulated on Christmas night.

290 Canadians had been killed and are buried in San Wan Bay Cemetery. 500 were wounded. The losses would have been less heavy if the Japanese had not killed injured men and prisoners.

The survivors subsequently were faced with abominable conditions that prevailed in the prison camps. They were assigned to construction of a landing strip at Kai Tak (in Hong Kong), or to work in the coal mines of Niigata or at the Yokohama shipyards.

Suffering from malnutrition, disease and the violence of their guards, 260 Canadians perished from neglect or from harsh treatment. 1,428 survivors were repatriated to Canada via HMCS Prince Robert and the Empress of New Zealand shortly after war's end.

Attack on the Estevan Lighthouse (See Photos 15 - 17)

During the evening of 20 June 1942, the remote Estevan Point Lighthouse on the West Coast of Vancouver Island was shelled with 17 rounds from the 5.5 inch deck gun from the Japanese submarine, I-26, commanded by Lieutenant Commander Yokota Minoru.

His gunners were not very accurate: although they bracketed the lighthouse and broke windows in its tower, they did little damage to the facilities the shells fell harmlessly offshore or, exploded in the bush behind the lighthouse.

This was the only occasion, in either the First or Second World Wars, when enemy shells fell on Canadian soil. Nevertheless, the military authorities and residents were very concerned and the attack seemed to justify defense preparations being carried out on B.C.'s Pacific Coast.

It's interesting to note that Mrs. Linda Weeden, a lighthouse keeper's wife, found a stray unexploded shell from the incident, while walking in the woods in 1973.

Attack on the Aleutian Island of Kiska (See Photo 17 - 21)

Kiska is a small island almost at the western end of the Aleutian Island chain.

On 15 & 16 August, 1943, a US Canadian invasion force of 34,426 Allied troops landed on Kiska, code named <u>"Operation Cottage</u>".

Major General George Pearkes, VC commanded the 6th Canadian Infantry Division. The 5.300 Canadians, primarily from the **The Canadian Fusiliers**, **Winnipeg Grenadiers**, **Rocky Mountain Rangers** and the **Regiment de Hull**, all of the13th Canadian Infantry Brigade, commanded by Brigadier Harry Foster, sailed on US Transports from Chemainus and Nanaimo, B.C. The Canadian forces also included 594 all ranks of the Canadian Component of the **First Special Service Force**.

The invasion force landed in heavy fog on the north and western sides only to find the island abandoned. On 28 July under the cover of dense fog, the Japanese had successfully removed their 6,000 troops, without the Allies noticing.

The landing forces did not know the Japanese had left Kiska, and the battle raged for two nerve-wracking days, in virtual silence, cold temperatures and dense fog, as the Allied soldiers slowly and awkwardly gained ground in the difficult mountainous terrain.

The deadly silence of an invisible enemy was only a trick to lure careless soldiers up from the beaches to higher ground and present themselves for easy slaughter. There were no Japanese; Americans and Canadians had only been shooting at each other

Allied casualties during the operation numbered 313, including 28 Americans and 4 Canadians killed. All of these casualties were the result of so-called friendly fire, booby traps set out by the Japanese, disease, and frostbite.

The 13th Canadian Infantry Brigade remained on Kiska until January 1944, while the Special Services Force left at the end of August en-route to Italy.

The Japanese Balloon Bomb (Fire Balloon) attacks in 1944-45 (See Photo 22)

Between November 1944 and April 1945, the Japanese Navy launched over 9,000 fire balloons toward North America. Carried by the recently discovered Pacific jet stream, they were to sail over the Pacific Ocean and land in North America, where the Japanese hoped they would start forest fires and cause other damage. About 300 were reported as reaching North America, with little damage to property.

Fire balloons were reported over the Yukon, North West Territories British, Columbia, and as far inland as Manitoba. Many were also seen over the West Coast of the US.

A woman and five children became the only deaths due to enemy action to occur on mainland America during World War II, when one of the children tampered with a bomb from a balloon, near Bly, Oregon, and it exploded.

Canadian Valour in the Pacific War

<u>Three (3) Posthumous Victoria Crosses Awarded</u> (See Photos 23 – 25)

On 19 December 1941, during the battle of Hong Kong, Sergeant Major John Osborn of the Winnipeg Grenadiers died when he threw himself on a Japanese hand grenade to save his comrades. His bravery was recognized with a posthumous Victoria Cross; Canada's first VC during WW II.

On 16 February 1944, Major Charles Ferguson Hoey VC MC of Duncan, B.C. while serving with the 1st Battalion, Lincolnshire Regiment, British Army near the Ngakyedauk Pass, Arakan, Burma, Major Hoey's company came under devastating machine-gun fire, but Major Hoey did not waver in his advance on the objective. Although wounded in the head and leg he went forward alone and tackled a troublesome enemy strong point, destroying it and killing all the occupants, but he was mortally wounded and subsequently awarded the VC

On 9 August 1945, Lieutenant Robert Hampton Gray of Nelson, B.C., flying with the British Fleet Air Arm, sank a Japanese destroyer in Onagawa Bay, Japan. His bombs struck the ship amidships and it quickly sank. Gray crashed a short distance away, and was subsequently awarded a posthumous Victoria Cross.

Conclusion

VJ Day is a day for the world to celebrate the Allied victory of good over evil fascist regimes that stained history with the atrocities they committed.

All of the battles, atrocities and loss of life speak loudly of the futility and tragedy of war. "As we remember this victory, let us offer our heartfelt gratitude to the one million Canadians who served their country during the Second World War and **NEVER** forget the 45,000 soldiers, sailors, airmen and merchant sailors who made the ultimate sacrifice, and their families, who put the interests of our great nation ahead of their own".

Canadians stood up for what is just in the world. "It is part of what defines us as a nation".

For their actions and sacrifices, all Canadians stand **Proud Strong and Free**.



FROM THE BARRETT BUNKER

Having returned home recently from Vernon Cadet Training Centre where I spent the summer as a Company Commander, I thought that it would be interesting to explore the significance of Vernon Army Camp and its links the history of the BC Regiment and its affiliated units during the First World War.

Why Vernon? Vernon became an important transportation hub following 1892, when the CPR built a spur line from Sicamous to the head of Okanagan Landing which became the major transfer point for goods and people from rail to water transportation serving communities from Vernon to the border with Washington State.

Why an Army base? With the outbreak of the South African War from 1899 to 1902, an interest in the military had been sparked by the returning veterans and businessmen of the small community. This led to the creation of The Okanagan Mounted Rifles in the spring of 1908 (later the 30th & 31st BC Horse, now known as the BC Dragoons). Early military camps were held just east of the Okanagan Landing near what

is now Kin Beach, but by 1910, the locals were petitioning Ottawa to establish a permanent training camp to be built near the Town of Vernon. This came into fruition when the city leased lands on Mission Hill and allowed DND use of the site without cost. A new armoury was opened in September 1913, and the subsequent tent camps were erected upon the site of the current Cadet Camp.

The Duke of Connaught's Own Rifles from our Drill Hall on Beatty Street entrained with the other mainland militia units (72nd Seaforth Highlanders of Canada, 11th Irish Fusiliers of Canada, 104th Westminster Fusiliers) and headed north to Vernon where they joined the 30th & 31st BC Horse, the 102nd Rocky Mountain Rangers for a two week military camp starting 24th of May 1914.




The 6th Regiment Duke of Connaught's Own Rifles march through Vernon May 1914

The 62nd Battalion CEF, 158th DCOR Overseas Battalion CEF, and the 121st Western Irish Battalions CEF, all trained at Vernon Army Camp in 1916, before heading off to Britain where their fate was to be broken up as reinforcements for the 7th & 29th Battalions following the losses at the Somme in 1916.

some 1,800 to 2,000 strong trained in the hills around Vernon before returning to Vancouver. That summer Canada trained over 55,000 militiamen in the spring and summer camps held just prior to the outbreak of the Great War.



With the outbreak of war, Vernon Army Camp grew in significance and became the training centre for a number of our perpetuated battalions on their way to the Western Front. At its height in 1916 almost 5,000 troops were training at the Camp practicing trench warfare.

One lesser known fact is that Vernon was also the site for an internment camp for Austro-Hungarians, Germans, and Prisoners of War. In September 1915 Major A. Rowan 6th DCOR was appointed the Camp Commandant.



The tail end of our story is that after the Second World War, Vernon Army Camp saw the arrival of Army Cadets in 1949 and Reservists, and continues to perform those duties to the current day. I recall in the mid-1980s annually recruiting and sending thirty BCR Recruits off to Vernon Army Camp on the Summer Youth Employment Programme (SYEP), and more recently Recce Crewman courses have been run there in conjunction with the BCDs. Our BCR Cadets continue to train there each summer and the Camp continues both its links to the military and the community of Vernon.
