RECEPTION AT THE RESIDENCE OF THE HONORARY COLONEL OF THE ARMY






CO'S PARADE (STAND DOWN) 30 MAY 2018





KINGDOM OF THE NETHERLANDS CONSUL GENERAL OF THE NETHERLANDS LUNCHEON 7 JUNE 2018



3 CAV – CANADIAN ARMY VETERANS THE SAVIO VETERANS UNIT

- 3 CAV is a group of retired Canadian Armed Forces members who named their Unit in commemoration of an October 1944 Canadian Army battle in the south eastern area of the Italian Lombard Plain, creating a bridgehead over the Savio River where Private EA (Smokey) Smith, Seaforth Highlanders of Canada was awarded the Victoria Cross for bravery while stopping a German Armoured attack.
- 3 CAV's 12 members and supporters ride their motorcycles on weekends, throughout British Columbia, in support of motorcycle shows and many fundraising events including "The Ride for Dads" and "The Ride for the Fallen", and of course for their own enjoyment. Wearing their red shirts and Veteran leather vests and berets or ball caps provides easy recognition.



The Road Captain is Kelly Parkes, a Veteran of The British Columbia Regiment (DCO), Royal Canadian Armoured Corps. He rides a Honda 1800 Gold Wing.

One of their recent rides took them to Langley, B.C where they visited "The Walk to Remember Memorial Monument". The Walk to Remember was built in 2012 as a result of the efforts of two Langley students, sister and brother Elizabeth and Michael Pratt.

The memorial structure features a single column, representing a tree with its life cut short, wrapped with a metal ribbon engraved with the names of the Fallen.

Through sponsorships and partnerships with the Township of Langley, Arboretum and Botanical Society of Langley, Rotary clubs, Veterans Affairs Canada, and other community groups, 158 trees were planted along the Walk — one for every Canadian soldier killed in Afghanistan. The British Columbia Veterans Commemorative Association (BCVCA) donated two of the Walk's trees.

The site, which was donated by the Township is the largest Afghanistan memorial of its kind in Canada.

The 3rd Canadian Army Veterans (CAV) ROME Unit, was responsible for having a portion of Highway 1 in Langley designated the "Highway of Heroes" in 2011. The movement spread across the country with the last dedication taking place in Newfoundland and Labrador last fall.

Now, every province has one.

"WHAT IT'S LIKE TO BE PUTIN'S NUMBER ONE ENEMY", AN EVENING WITH BILL BROWDER

On Friday June 15th 2018, the Global Reporting Center based at UBC invited noted bestselling Author, Bill Browder, for an exclusive banquet at which he reflected on the state of Russia and the world and sharing his stories of what it's like to be Putin's number one enemy.

As Russia continues to undermine democracies around the world, and targets enemies for assassination, Bill Browder has led an extraordinary effort to expose Putin and his mafia rule that saw Browder's Russian lawyer murdered because of a tax fraud expose.

Browder once held the largest foreign portfolio of foreign investment in Russia – until his tax attorney Sergei Magnitsky was arrested after investigating massive Russian tax fraud. And after Magnitsky died in prison under mysterious circumstances, Browder worked with both the U.S. and Canadian governments to enact the Magnitsky Act, to punish Russian and other human rights violators.

Russia has retaliated against both the U.S. and Canada – and against Browder, issuing an arrest warrant with Interpol, and according to some observers, calling for the assassination of the London-based banker.

Browder is a sought-after expert of Russian misconduct and has testified before the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee about Russian interference in the U.S. presidential election.

The MND Harjit Sajjan spoke eloquently at the event welcoming Bill Browder and noting Canada's support for the rule of an International Rules based order. Minister Sajjan presented Browder with a MND medal given exclusively to diplomats for Browder's efforts in exposing corruption globally.

June 2018

Following a stop in Cairns, Australia, HMCS Vancouver visited the beautiful island of Fiji. The ship came alongside the capital city of Suva. This five-day visit to Fiji's economic hub represents another of our global engagement visits as part of OP PROJECTION.



Despite only being alongside Suva for less than a week, HMCS Vancouver and her crew accomplished the tasks assigned to them, and more. As with our previous visits to Hong Kong, Singapore, and Cairns, the ship hosted a successful evening reception on our flight deck which was attended by many important government officials, UN representatives, and regional diplomatic representatives. Of note, the Canadian High Commissioner to Fiji was in attendance that evening; he was very pleased with our crew's ability to act as ambassadors for Canada, and noted that sailors make for great diplomats.

The Fiji port visit wasn't without it's fair share confusion and drama. Space for ships alongside Fiji's economic hub was very limited, and HMCS Vancouver was forced to leave our assigned position on the jetty early and come to anchor in Suva's harbour for the last two days of the visit.

Arguably, our most rewarding engagement while in Fiji was an outreach event that was organized by PO1 Rownd. Approximately 60 members of the crew participated in this outreach in order to help an organization in Fiji called Homes for Hope. This organization provides safe lodgings, counselling, and support for women in Fiji who've been sexually exploited in some manner. The group from HMCS Vancouver who volunteered their time and effort towards the program accomplished a great deal in a very short timeframe. This work included repainting an entire dormitory, clearing a significant chunk of jungle in order to make space for a new building, and refurbishing a decaying rooftop. The residents of the program were extremely grateful for our support.



After departing Fiji, we met up with HMAS Adelaide, HMAS Melbourne, HMAS Success, HMNZS Te Mana, and HMAS Toowoomba in order to transit in formation on route to Hawaii. As a Task Group, we practiced manoeuvring, conducted replenishments at sea, and performed various exercises in preparation for RIMPAC 2018. OP PROJECTION is now at an end; the crew has accomplished her mission. Now, HMCS Vancouver finds herself making the final preparations for it's participation in RIMPAC, and we now find ourselves back in Pearl Harbor for a well-deserved break before this world-renowned joint naval exercise begins.

Brooks Secondary School graduate Elizabeth Gillen is one of 15 cadets from across the country chosen to represent Canada at the 100th anniversary celebration of the Battle of Amiens in France later this week,

Gillen, currently ranked master warrant officer, has been part of the Royal Canadian Army Cadet Corps, BC Regiment in Powell River for the past six years.

"I'm the only army cadet in BC going," said Gillen. "They choose three from each region and one from each element: one sea, one army and one air."

Gillenis the second senior cadet from Powell River chosen for an international tour this year. Master warrant officer Katheryn Sheldon was one of 11 cadets chosen to participate in a World War I and II battlefield tour in March 2018.

"We're very fortunate in Powell River to have dedicated, talented people presenting the program as well as a world-class venue for us to experience and explore," said local corps lieutenant Caroline Visser, "Sheldon and Gillen have both participated fully in the program with enthusiasm and dedication, and it shows. They have excelled in their activities and in the community. We are incredibly proud of them."

Gillen said she was surprised when she received the news that she had been chosen.

"It was kind of out of the blue," she added. "My mom and I went to Victoria to get my passport last Wednesday."

The tour, a collaboration of Veterans Affairs Canada and the United Kingdom's UCL Institute of Education, takes place August 3 to 11, starting off in the nation's capital with a visit to the Canadian War Museum in Ottawa.

The 15 cadets, aged 16 to 18, will then travel together to France, visit significant World War I battlefields and learn about the role Canada played in the first World War. On the anniversary of the battle, August 8, the contingent will attend a ceremony at Amiens Cathedral.

The Battle of Amiens, also known as the Third Battle of Picardy, began on August 8, 1918. It was the opening phase of the Allied offensive that ultimately led to the end of World War I. Amiens was one of the first major battles involving armoured warfare and marked the end of trench warfare on the Western Front until the armistice was signed on November 11, 1918.

Gillen said being chosen is an honour.

"I'm really excited to go," she added. "This is my first trip to France; I've never been out of the country before."

We began with a brief tour of the building during which the RSM emphasized that the drill hall is more than a building and a training venue, but the home of The British Columbia Regiment. I'd like to especially thank the RSM and the day staff for their hard work getting our building into top shape, ensuring I had all the information I needed to brief the CCA and addressing all critical details."




BCR RECRUITING 19 AUGUST 2018 2018 PNE

The Frederick Lee Walkway At Hill 70 in France Secures Major Donor

Noted Canadian Philanthropist Robert H. N. Ho Helps Sponsor Walkway dedicated to Chinese Canadian Soldier Who Fought in First World War



Kingston, On – The Hill 70 Memorial Project is pleased to announce that it has received a \$1.5 million gift from Mr. Robert H. N. Ho (何鴻毅), O.B.C., that will be directed towards the construction of the \$2 million Frederick Lee (费德瑞克 ◆ 李) Walkway in Loos-en-Gohelle, France.

Lee was among only 300 or so Canadians of Chinese heritage who were permitted to enlist with the Canadian Expeditionary Force during the Great War. After having fought at Vimy Ridge, he was killed in action in August 1917 during the Battle of Hill 70 and has no known grave. A walkway dedicated in his honour is being planned for a new national memorial that is currently being built on the site of this former Canadian battlefield in northern France.

Hill 70 Chairman Col. Mark Hutchings commented that the donation was pivotal in enabling his team to proceed with this commemoration to Lee and paid special tribute to Robert H.N. Ho for his commitment to the project.

"We are thrilled to be able to venerate the remarkable story of Frederick Lee whose service to this country made him a role model for all Canadians. However this key element would not have been possible without the generous support of a notable individual - Robert H.N. Ho - a man with a keen sense of history, who has experienced it first hand".

Born in Hong Kong prior to the Second World War, Robert H.N Ho was forced to flee the city with his mother and sister after the Japanese invasion of December 8,1941. Walking inland through war torn China, they eventually reached temporary refuge in Liuchow in Guangxi Province, before escaping to Kunming in Yunnan Province just ahead of a Japanese offensive. Ho's father, General Ho Shai Lai, served in the Nationalist Army alongside other Allied Forces that were fighting in the Far East theatre. A decorated and distinguished soldier, he was subsequently appointed as Taiwan's Vice Minister of Defence, before accepting a United Nations posting on behalf of his government in Washington, D.C.

Robert H.N Ho later followed his father to the United States, completing first a Bachelor of Arts degree at Colgate University and then a Master's degree in Journalism at Columbia. After working for several US publications (including a stint as a White House reporter), he returned to Hong Kong in order to help manage his family's media companies and other enterprises. Rising to become publisher of The Kung Sheung Daily Press, he was able to observe the sweeping changes that took place throughout South East Asia over the course of his professional career.

In the early 1990's Ho retired and moved with his wife Greta to Vancouver. Continuing a long-standing family tradition of private philanthropy, he established The Robert H. N. Ho Foundation, which has specialized in supporting projects around the world in the fields of education, Chinese Arts and Culture. and Buddhist learning. As well, he has made a point of personally funding a wide variety of healthcare initiatives that have subsequently helped tens of thousands within the community. In recognition of the significant impact that he has had both within the province and across the country, Robert H.N. Ho was awarded the Order of British Columbia (O.B.C) in 2013.

Hutchings observed that Robert H.N. Ho is that rare type of individual who sees a broader need and then quietly goes about filling it so that the public may benefit.

"We very much wanted to insure that Frederick Lee's story would become of part of the Hill 70 Memorial Project. Robert's gift will allow us to do just this and in a manner that will bring it to the attention of an estimated 700,000 Canadians who visit this area of France every year.

Frederick Lee died at the Battle of Hill 70 on August 21,1917.

Frederick Lee has inspired Canadians from all backgrounds, including the Finding Fred Lee team and the Chinese Canadian Military Museum Society. The Hill 70 Memorial Project is working closely with both these organizations to help secure additional funds for the long-term upkeep of the walkway as well as the perpetuation of other educational elements that are to be dedicated to Frederick Lee.

"Finding Fred Lee" is a volunteer project that aims to complete the story of Frederick Lee by tracing the full extent of his family across two continents. THE HILL 70 MEMORIAL PROJECT 21 AUGUST 2018

On August 21st, 2018, The Hill 70 Memorial Project, The Chinese Canadian Military Museum and Finding Fred Lee initiative invited a number of dignitaries including the HCol Ted Hawthorne to the Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Gardens in Vancouver's Chinatown to announce a major donor and the construction of the Frederick Lee (费德瑞克•李) Walkway in Loos-en-Gohelle, France.

The Hill 70 Memorial Project announced that it has received a \$1.5 million gift from Mr. Robert H. N. Ho O.B.C., towards the completion of the \$2,000,000 Fred Lee Walkway construction.

The Frederick Lee Walkway at Hill 70 in France, will be Canada's last memorial to be built for the First World War. August 21st also marks the 101st anniversary of the death of Frederick Lee of Kamloops, BC, one of the first Chinese Canadians to volunteer for the First World War. Therefore, the ability to engage enemies at close distances in a swift and effective manner while properly utilizing cover becomes a skill that all armoured recce soldiers must master.



"ADAPT, IMPROVISE, OVERCOME"

As an armoured reconnaissance soldier, it is important for one to know how to call an effective fire mission. This is especially true when the unit is deployed to screen (monitor) an area in Observation Posts (OPs) or during engagements with enemy units. However, live artillery and artillery simulator ranges are not something the regiment regularly has access to. NCOs of the regiment adapted to this situation and used a map model kit to simulate targets and had soldiers call fire missions on them and adjust impacting rounds.

The training was overall effective and troops did extremely well when they applied what they learned on an artillery simulator range at 15th Field Artillery Regiment later in the training year.

THE BARRETT BUNKER – SEPTEMBER 2018

Pivotal in the history of our three Fighting Battalions in the Great War from 1914 to 1918 is the victory at Amiens in 1918, scored by Canadian and Australian Corps as part of General Henry Rawlinson's 4th British Army from the 8th to the 11th of August.

Following the signing of peace with Bolshevik Russia in February 1918, the Imperial German forces with the additional troops from the Russian Front were able to launch OPERATION MICHAEL on 21 March 1918 along the length of the Western Front. Initially focussed on the right wing of the BEF, the offensive was halted near Arras and their push towards the vital railway junctions at Amiens had been halted by the British and Australian Corps. Subsequent German offensives proved equally unsuccessful and ultimately they ran out of steam following their defeat at the Second Battle of the Marne by the French and American forces. With no further resources available, the German forces prepared to withdraw back from the Marne into defensive positions.



Promoted as a Marshall of France following his victory at the Marne, Marshall Ferdinand Foch wanted to get the allies back onto the offensive. He proposed on 23 July 18 an offensive along the Saint-Miheil Salient to free up the railway lines that ran from Amiens from German Shellfire.

However, Field Marshall Haig of the BEF had already made plans to attack the Germans near Amiens. The Australian Corps had demonstrated that the ground south of the Somme was open, firm, and entirely suitable for an attack. General Rawlinson had submitted the proposals of the Australian Corps Commander, Lt-Gen Monash, up to Haig in July and he discussed these with Marshall Foch as an alternative course of action.

Marshall Foch agreed to the plan but on the condition that the French First Army to the south participate. General Rawlinson objected to French Participation as the plan involved a significant use of tanks which would be employed to achieve surprise, and that this would be jeopardized by the French, who in lacking tanks would require a substantial pre-bombardment by artillery before their infantry could advance. A fair compromise was reached in that the French would participate but would not launch their attack until 45 minutes after the Fourth Army BEF's 'Zero Hour.' The date of the attack was adjusted from the 8th to the 10th of August with the intent of striking the Germans prior to the completion of their withdrawal from the Marne.

General Rawlinson has already completed his plans with his three corps commanders, Lt-Gen Butler, Lt-Gen Monash, Lt-Gen Currie of the Canadian Corps, and Lt-Gen Kavanagh of the Cavalry Corps. This would be the first time that the Canadians and Australians would be fighting side by side. Both had a reputation for aggressive tactics and a strong record of success over the past two years. It should also be noted that whereas most British battalions were now reduced in strength down to 600-800 troops, both the Australian and Canadian Corps had maintained their fighting strength at 1,000 man battalions. The plan was to use surprise through the use of tanks and a quick advance by the infantry, with the artillery only opening fire as they advanced, hoping for a rapid overrunning of the German forward positions. Key in the plan was secrecy.

The artillery involved in the final Fourth Army plan for the included 1,388 Field Guns and Howitzers, 684 heavy guns, and 580 tanks. Using the developed sound ranging techniques developed in 1917, the BEF gunners were able to knock out 504 out of 530 German guns at 'Zero Hour' as a creeping barrage supported the infantry onto their objectives.

The Australian and Canadian Corps were each allocated a brigade of four tank battalions, with 108 Mark V tanks, 36 Mark V "Star" and 24 unarmed tanks to bring forward ammunition and supplied. A single battalion of Mark V tanks was assigned to support the Cavalry Corps as well as two battalions of Medium Mark A Whippet tanks (48 Whippets per Bn).

The four infantry Divisions of the Canadian Corps had been successfully moved down to Amiens without being detected by the Germans, and was fully moved into position on the night of 7 August. As a further security measure the commanders pasted the notice "keep Your Mouth Shut" onto orders issued to the soldiers and referred to the action as a 'Raid' rather than as a major assault.

At the time of the attack at 0420 hrs on the morning of the 8th of August, a dense fog had covered the ground. The BEF Third Corps attacked north of the Somme, the Australians advanced south of the river, and the Canadian Corps south of the Australian with the French First Army on their right. The attack came as a surprise to the Germans and their forces only began to return fire five minutes later and at positions already abandoned by the allies.

The advance rolled over the German first positions and by 0730 hours had moved forward 4,000 yards (2.3 miles or 3.7 km). In the centre supporting units advanced through the leading divisions and attacked the second objective. By 0820 the Australian 4th and 5th Divisions and the Canadian 4th Division had passed through the lead units and headed towards the third line of objectives. The allied had now penetrated well into the rear of the German lines and the Cavalry now continued the advance with one brigade in the Australian Sector and two cavalry divisions in the Canadian. Aircraft fire and fire from the Canadian Armoured Cars kept the retreating Germans from rallying.



By 1100 hrs both the Canadians and Australians had advanced 3 miles (4.8 km) and a 15 mile (24 km) gap had been created in the German lines south of the Somme by the end of the day. North of the Somme, the BEF Third Corps had only managed to achieve their initial objectives.

Canadian Armoured Cars - Amiens 1918

The 7th Bn (1st BC) CEF moved through Amiens on the night of the 6th and took up positions in a field west of Gentell. The code-word that assembly for the battle had been completed was 'Llandovery Castle' named after a hospital ship by a German submarine with the loss of almost the entire Canadian crew and medical staff. At 0420 the preliminary barrage was replaced by a creeping barrage of 18 pdrs. The 7th did not move forward for about two hours and was held up by bridges that were blown and by the cavalry and whippet tanks sharing the same route. Little organized German resistance was met. Noon, the 7th and 10th battalions had advance 8.5 miles inside the German lines through the streets of Caix, with the Germans fleeting in front

of them. At Cayeux the 7th took over the advance and reached the final objective by 1435 hrs. Three men had been killed, 49 wounded, and four were missing. One officer, Lt GA Jackson had been wounded. Many prisoners, machine guns and stores had been captured. The 7th remained in their objective for two days and participated in driving the Germans further and further back until they were relieved by the French on 17 August and moved up for further action at the Scarpe.

The 29th Bn (Vancouver) had on the 8th captured the Old Amiens defensive line and on 9 August resumed the advance supported by tanks and captured the village of Rosieres after fighting through still resistance and German artillery fire. Their losses were 180 killed and wounded during to days of fighting. The 102nd Battalion, Warden's Warriors as part of the 4th Division's advance suffered 112 killed and wounded during the capture of Beaucourt Wood, an action in which they were well supported by two light Whippet Tanks and two Mark V Tanks.

Five German divisions had effectively been overrun by the end of the day, The Fourth Army took approximately 13, 000 prisoners, and the French a further 3,000. Total German losses on the 8th were about 26,000 to 30,000 troops for a loss of 8,000 killed

and wounded from the Fourth Army with further losses to the RAF, Royal Tank Corps and the French. Allied forces had pushed, on average, 6.8 miles (11 km) into enemy territory by the end of the day. The

Canadians in their sector had gained 8.1 miles (13 km), the Australian Corps 6.8 miles (11 km) and the French 5 miles (8 km), with the British Third Corps gaining only 2 miles (3.2km) north of the Somme.

It came at the cost of 1,036 Canadians killed, 2,803 injured and 29 taken prisoner. Overall more than 19,000 Allied soldiers were killed or injured, while the Germans lost more than 26,000 casualties. The Canadian Corps captured 5,033 prisoners and 161 guns.

As often seen in the Great War the Allied attack continued on the 9th August without the great results of the first day. Overall, the action at Amiens was widened on the north and the south of the initial attack. Mobility issues of the war came into play once the infantry advances had outstripped the artillery support and following the reduction of the initial force of 500 tanks down to six within three days. German forces on the Chipilly Spur commanded a wide field of fire to the south of the Somme and held up the left flanking units



of the Australian Corps until their positions were captured by the Australians late on the 9th. Congested roads and communication problems held up the British 32nd Division long enough on its passage through the Canadian Corps front lines that the momentum of the advance could not be maintained.

The Battle of Amiens ended on the 11 August 1918 with Germany's worst defeat on the Western Front since 1914. It was Germany's worst defeat since the start of the war. General Ludendorff described the opening day of the battle, 8 August, as "the black day of the German Army in the history of this war."

When General Ludendorff informed German Kaiser Wilhelm II of the German disaster at Amiens. The Kaiser replied, "We have reached the limits of our capacity. The war must be terminated."



By the 10th of August, the Germans were pulling out of the salient back to their rear defensive positions. Although, Marshall Foch requested that Field Marshall Haiq continue with offensive, Haig refused to continue the action as he preferred to launch a fresh attack using the fresh troops of Byng's Third Army between the Ancre and Scarpe. These future actions by the BEF and our Canadian Corps led to the final 100 days of the war and the eventual signing of the Armistice on 11 November 1918 and the cessation of hostilities.

The British Columbia Regiment through its fighting perpetuated battalions 0of the 7th, 29th and 102nd from the Great War participated fully in the great victory achieved on August 8th by the Canadians, Australians, British and French forces, with some Americans thrown in as support to the British Third. Lt-Gen Currie

later wrote to the 7th battalion to state that when battle honours were awarded for the war that Amiens should be one of those selected for the 7th Battalion. Although, largely forgotten today, the Battle for Amiens stands as a monumental victory for the Allies and especially the British Empire, which demonstrated that they knew not only how to defeat the Germans but how to open the way for future victories. Much heavy fighting was yet to come for the Canadians and our Regiment in the breaking of the Hindenburg Line, Canal du Nord and the final advance to victory at Mons.

THE START LINE MILITARY ASSOCIATIONS FOR A LIFETIME

I have served in three Regiments, the RCD, the LdSH(RC) and the BCR (DCO). I loved being a soldier in all of them not the least of which is that many of the friends that I made while serving remain friends and we continue to see each other through our regimental association activities or maintain contact through email correspondence. One of the developments out here in BC is that because of numbers, we are more of a Black Hat organization supporting and honouring each other's histories and heritage. Most of us have served in more than one regiment anyway. Most recently we gathered to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Moreuil Wood and thanks to Dave Letson, FGH, the luncheon honoured the contribution of the Canadian Cavalry Brigade because we all were there, RCD, Strathcona's and Fort Garry's. It was a fine lunch and we lifted our glasses to the memory of those that came before and who built the traditions that we continue to remember even after a century.



My Dad was a soldier in WW1 serving as a Vickers gunner, a runner and signaler in the Canadian Machine Gun Corps and served in the 3rd Canadian Division from 1916 until he was demobilized in the spring of 1919. He remained a Private soldier throughout his time overseas. I know from his letters that he was glad to be a civilian as he had had enough of the army, his fill of bully beef and plum jam and although glad to be home, felt great sadness from losing many friends and family. In the 1920s he served in a militia Artillery unit and later in the RCAF both auxiliary and Active force. But what remained important to him was that he had been in the Canadian Machine Gun Corps and was a member of that association for the remainder of his life. He died in 1977 at the age of 80 and only recently in a White Owl cigar box I found his membership card, dated 1977, in Canadian Machine Gun the (Overseas) Association. (Can you imagine White Owl cigars smoking them with great pleasure in the car while

my brother and I gagged in the back seat.) I had no idea that all those years as a kid in Ontario and BC that the one thing he needed to belong to was the CMGC Association. You just can't forget the time you served with your buddies from long ago. They called each other "chums", a word we rarely hear nowadays.

The above photo is one I took with my iPhone and is a segment from a panorama photo of the CMGC Association veterans gathered at High Park in Toronto dated May, 22, 1939 and they had just served as part of the Guard for the Royal Visit. In addition to their blazer and flannels, they wore a maroon beret with the MG badge and here they are carrying the Corps flag, "the Maroon Arrow". They all wore the maroon arrow sewn over their division patches and it was a proud and distinctive badge - sort of like wearing Jump Wings I expect. Of course, we all know the arrow as the map symbol for an MG. In the photo there are probably 150 veterans. I do know that they used to have their annual association reunion at the Royal York Hotel in Toronto. I'm sure these functions were a time of merriment, high-jinks and reflection. For many years we had a Royal York Hotel highball glass on a kitchen shelf and I never gave it much thought. Many years after Dad died I learned the story as told to me by my older brother.

It was during the Great Depression and Dad, without a job and little money, had to attend the Corps Association reunion at that same hotel. Our home was in Port Credit (now in Mississauga) several miles west of Toronto and so at the end of reunion, Dad had to make his way home but without any means or transportation. No problem apparently for with that Royal York Hotel Glass, a bottle of Scotch and a stolen hotel chair, Dad set out for home. It seems he would walk until he needed a rest, he'd then sit down on the chair, pour himself a drink, rest and then repeat. I remember the chair too - it was a bentwood chair painted gold and not a part of my folks regular bedroom furniture. I love that story. None of the reunions I have ever attended have presented such a challenge.

TALKING ABOUT COINCIDENCE... It's a small world...



On my way back from the the D-day landing beaches (Normandy) this afternoon, I noticed a car stopped alongside the road in a very small town nearby La Cambe in the middle of nowhere, on the countryside. Inside the car two people, terribly lost and trying to find their way looking on a map. I stopped by, asked if I could help, and ... they seemed to be looking for the Guest House which happened to be the one I'm staying at. Coincidence number 1.

I tell the two people to follow me and once we get to the guest house, we start a conversation.

The lady, Tara, comes from Kelowna. I'm telling her I will probably drive

through Kelowna in a couple of weeks from now. Coincidence number 2.

As a tour guide, and even more being simply curious, I asked Tara and her husband why they're visiting Normandy. No doubt: they want to visit both the American and Canadian landing beaches. It happened that Tara's grandfather served with a « Canadian Regiment » in WW2.

I asked her about the Regiment, but she was not sure and needed to check in the papers she brought with her.

And ...yes!

Trooper K51456 John Kennedy (!) joined the 28th Canadian Armored Regiment/BCR on May 23rd 1943.... and eventually landed here in Normandy.

When I told her about my link with the Regiment we couldn't believe all the coincidences. Tara and her husband will visit our monument here in Normandy, even though she wasn't aware about it.
