BIOGRAPHIES OF THE HONORARY COLONELS BCR (DCO)



Honorary Colonel Edwin (Ted) A. Hawthorne

Our outgoing Honorary Colonel, HCol Ted Hawthorne, was born in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, and moved to Burnaby, British Columbia in 1954. He received his Juris Doctor from UBC and has been a partner in the law firm of Hawthorne, Piggott & Company ("HPLaw") since 1973.

He has been actively involved in numerous aspects of The British Columbia Regiment (DCO) for many years; initially serving in the Cadet Corps, joining the Regiment in 1961 and participating in all facets of the Regimental Family.

Ted is Chairman Emeritus of Columbus Long Term Care Society with over 35 years of service. Ted has also served as a director, officer, or trustee of many other non-profit charitable organizations, including, President of Chacko & Lize Simon Scholarship Trust, Chairman of The BC Regiment (DCO) Charitable Trust, Honorary Solicitor, and past director of The Army Cadet League of Canada (BC Branch), Past Chairman of the 2290 BCR (101 DCOR) Cadet Corps Executive Committee of the Support Committee. and past Director of the Veterans' Care Facility, George Derby Care Society and Vice President of Derby Manor Housing Society.

He is a member of the Chinese Canadian Military Museum Society, ANAVETS Pacific Unit #280 and the Canadian Club of Vancouver, a member and past director and officer of the BC Veterans Commemorative Association (the prime mover in the establishment of the highly successful veterans' licence plate program) and Veterans Affairs Canada "Year of the Veteran" program in 2005, the Secretary of the Honorary Officers Association of BC, a member of the Royal United Services Institute-Vancouver, a Life Member of The Royal Canadian Armoured Corps Association, a Past BC Director of the Canadian Forces Liaison Council, a member and Past President of The BC Regiment (DCO) Association, a member and past director and officer of the Royal City Youth Ballet Company Society, the Chairman of the Commanding Officer's Committee, a Governor and Past Chairman of The BC Regiment (DCO) Regimental Trust, Counsel Emeritus of Honour House Society and a past Trustee of the Burnaby Art Gallery. Ted is also Special Counsel to the Vancouver Artillery Association, 15th Field Artillery Regimental Society, 15th Field Museum and Archives and Royal United Services Institute -Vancouver.

Ted has led two BC Regiment (DCO) Association Veterans' Battlefield Tours, including the 2007 Vimy Memorial Re-dedication and the 2008 BC Regiment (DCO) European Battlefield Tour where ten Regimental remembrance ceremonies were conducted, and seven commemorative plaques dedicated. In addition, Ted represented the Regimental Association as President in the Regimental Battlefield Studies Tour in 2012 and as Honorary Colonel in the Regiment's European Battlefield Studies Tour in 2015.

Ted was awarded the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal in March 2012 in recognition of his contributions to Canada. In addition, Ted was appointed Honorary Colonel of The British Columbia Regiment

(Duke of Connaught's Own) by the Minister of National Defence, the Honourable Peter MacKay, upon recommendation of the Chief of Defence Staff, on 2 November 2012 and has been extended twice by the Minister of National Defence, Harjit S. Sajjan. Ted was awarded the Commanding Officer's Commendation on 11 December 2013. In 2015, Ted was awarded The Army Cadet League of Canada Volunteer Service Medal for "continuous and meritorious service" and The Caring Canadian Award by the Governor General of Canada, the Right Honourable David Johnson. In 2016, Ted was awarded the Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers, in 2019, the Minister of Veterans Affairs Commendation by The Honourable Lawrence MacAulay and in 2021, the Commander Canadian Army Commendation and The Army Cadet League of Canada 50th Anniversary recognition for "exceptional volunteer service".

Professionally, Ted is a member of the Law Society of British Columbia. In 2017, the Canadian Forces Liaison Council awarded HPLaw a National Award for support of the Reserve Force and a Provincial Award for the Most Supportive Employer in British Columbia, and in 2021, HPLaw was presented with a Certificate of Appreciation by CFLC for their support of Operation Laser, the Canadian Armed Forces response to the COVID-19 Pandemic.



Honorary Colonel Farid Rohani

HCol Farid Rohani is an entrepreneur, senior executive, and community leader. In addition to his extensive business interests and activities, Farid has volunteered for and led many significant organizations as an engaged and contributing citizen since he came to Canada from Iran as a young boy.

HCol Rohani has held several prominent leadership roles both locally and internationally. He served for many years as the Chair of the Laurier Institution and was appointed as Chair Emeritus of the organization for his involvement and significant contribution to the institute from its original inception in 1989. He was also a board member of the Nowruz Commission in Washington, D.C. where he served for three years.

He is the treasurer and board member of Integrity Initiatives International, a US based organization focused on establishing an International Anti-Corruption Court. Farid further served for three years as the Vancouver Chair of the Institute for Canadian Citizenship and he led the hosting of the first Citizenships Ceremony held at a First Nations Community. He is also an advisory Board member of the Global Reporting Center, a trustee of the Jack Webster Foundation, and a member of the Royal Columbian Hospital Foundation Board.

HCol Rohani continues a significant contribution to the local community by acting as and an advisor to First Nations Golden Eagle Rising Society. He has established the Khanjani scholarship at UBC and is a supporter of the artistic community in Vancouver.

His extensive contribution to Canada and his local community has led to Farid receiving several notable distinctions, including being appointed to serve as Honorary Lieutenant Colonel of The British Columbia

Regiment (Duke of Connaught's Own), a recipient of the Canadian Senate's 150th Anniversary medal and recognized as a Fellow of the Royal Canadian Geographic Society. Farid was also awarded the Provincial Multicultural award in 2012 for his work around diversity and inclusiveness.

HCol Rohani sits on the Commanding Officer's Committee, and is the Chairman and a Trustee of the British Columbia Regiment (DCO) Trust.

He has been an active member and supporter of the British Columbia Regiment since Lieutenant Colonel Sajjan was the Commanding Officer, he has seen four Commanding Officers lead the Regiment: Lieutenant Colonel Harjit Sajjan, Lieutenant Colonel Doug Evans, Lieutenant Colonel Paul Lindsay, and Lieutenant Colonel Vincent Virk. Farid has been part of two BC Regiment (DCO) Association Battlefield Tours including the 2020 European Battlefield Tour coinciding with the 75th Anniversary of D-Day, additionally Farid represented the Regimental Association for the burial of Private George Alfred Newburn in 2018 in France and the Armistice Day centenary in November 2018, which marked the centennial anniversary of the Armistice that ended World War I on the Western Front. His prior appointment with the Regiment was Honorary Lt-Col BC Regiment (DCO).

BIOGRAPHY OF OUR NEW BCR HONORARY LIEUTENANT-COLONEL



Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel William Robert Diamond

Honorary Lieutenant Colonel Diamond was born in Kitchener, Ontario and is a graduate of Wilfrid Laurier University. He is the CFO for Keycafe Inc – a technology company based in Vancouver that has developed a unique and economical electronic key exchange system.

Prior to joining Keycafe full time, HLCol Diamond operated his own consulting business for 13 years. WR Diamond & Associates specialized in working with technology start ups within the areas of governance, finance and operations. Key clients were ConnectionPoint Systems Inc.- an early online fundraising platform, Keycafe Inc and Picatic e-Tickets Inc – online event ticketing that was purchased by Eventbrite.

In 2015 the Minister of National Defense appointed Mr. Diamond as Honorary Colonel of 39 Combat Engineer Regiment for a 3-year term and in 2018 was reappointed for an additional 3 years. In 2017 he was elected as the Chair of the Honorary Officers' Association of BC and is the 39 CBG representative on the National of Council of Honorary Colonels. In 2020 HLCol Diamond was elected Chair of the National Council of Honorary Colonels and assumed this role in November of 2020. In 2021, the Minister of National Defense appointed him as HLCol of the BCR.

HLCol Diamond serves and has served on many charitable and volunteer boards and committees. His current involvement includes The BCR CO's Committee (Band Governor and Trustee) and The BCR (DCO)

Association Charitable Trust (Trustee), the 39 Combat Engineer Regimental Association (founding Director and former Treasurer), Canadian Forces Liaison Council (B.C. Regional Director), BC Military Music Society (Chair), Canada Jaycee Foundation (Director & Finance Committee Chair. His previous volunteer involvement includes the Mainland BC Military Families Resource Centre (Chair and Vice-Chair), Junior Chamber International (Vancouver, British Columbia and Canadian President and Assistant to the World President for Area C), The BCR (DCO) Association (President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer), City of North Vancouver Centennial Committee (Chair) and the North Vancouver City Library (Vice Chair and Treasurer).

In 2002, HLCol Diamond was presented the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal by the Lieutenant Governor of BC, Iona Campagnolo and in 2012 he was presented the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal MP Andrew Saxton. In January 2018 HLCol Diamond was awarded the Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers, which was presented by the Lieutenant-Governor of BC, Judith Guichon at Government House. In March 2019 the Minister of Veterans Affairs and Associate Minister of National Defence, the Honorable Lawrence MacAulay awarded the Minister of Veterans Affairs Commendation to HLCol Diamond. And in 2015 The BC Regiment awarded HLCol Diamond the "Honorary Colonel Cup" (donated by former Honorary Colonel Patrick Reid) for his many years of outstanding service to the Regiment.

On behalf of all readers of 'The Duke', we thank Honorary Colonel Ted Hawthorne for his years of service to the BC Regiment, its Regimental Association, and 39 CBG. He continues serving as the Vice-President of the BCR Regimental Association, as a member of the Regimental Commanding Officers' Committee, and as a member of the Regimental Trust. Our congratulations to HCol Farid Rohani and HLCol Bill Diamond, wishing them both the best of success in their new positions within the BCR Regimental Family.





I had the honour of attending the Tree Planting event with Honorary Colonel Ted Hawthorne at Aspen Park in Surrey, BC. This event was hosted by the City of Surrey and supported by Guru Nanak Free Kitchen (GNFK). I would like to thank Colonel Hawthorne for his continued support and coming out to this event.



GNFK has provided over a million hot, fresh, vegetarian meals to disadvantaged people. Every year this organization distributes hundreds of new clothing and items to people living on the streets and to local shelters. They host annual events such as the toy and school supply drive, making cupcakes and cookies for local shelters, assembling care packages for men and women and much more.

Currently they have a food rescue and recovery project where they recover groceries before they expire and distribute them to local churches, community groups/homes, women's groups, food banks, homeless communities, Indigenous reserves and organizations.

The last weekend in October saw the Brigade and Unit Command Teams and Honoraries gather at the Bay Street Armoury. It was nice to be able to have the majority of the attendees in person and for those unable to attend, they were able to join remotely.

The Regiment was represented by our CO, LCol Virk, RSM CWO Harris, CO of the 39 TBG, LCol Lindsay, HCol Rohani and HLCol Diamond.

On Friday evening the group met at the Wardroom and then joined the Brigade Command Team and 39 CER at the Four Mile Restaurant / Pub in View Royal for dinner. Thanks to BCR advance planning, there was a private room booked for all to enjoy our meal and socializing. A very nice establishment and highly recommended for a nice meal or to socialize.

Saturday morning started with breakfast in the Wardroom. After breakfast the CO presented the two new Honoraries with their rank. Their appointment officially started on October 28 and this was the first opportunity for all three to be together.

It was then onto the bus for 7:15am and off to the Bay Street Armoury to begin the conference.

The Conference started with the Commander reminding all of his Command Team Philosophy. It has not changed since he took command and he reminded us all that we need to focus on living our values. The BSM comments related to Culture Change. This is not an event, rather it is the new way forward. All need to get onside with this. He also thanked the RSMs for attending his conference the weekend before. The focus of that weekend was on understanding the discipline process. They had a few guest speakers that were greatly appreciated and definitely added to the weekend.

The first presentation was from JTFP and was an AAR on 2020 and 2021 DOMOPS. This included the measures taken for Force protection. For the navy, they isolated themselves on ships at sea while the army had troops at Vernon Military Camp in isolation to ensure they were ready if called upon. There were many lessons learned and a number were shared as they related to Op LASER, Op VECTOR and Op LENTUS.

The second presentation was from LCol Mead on the Summer Training Establishment for 2021. The staffing and structure were similar to the prior year, but with less staff and the same requirements. Even with reduced staff, the program was a success and the plan is for this model to carry on for 2022 and beyond. The only change will be the TBG CO will lead the program as they are looking for additional taskings.

LCol Cessford provided a briefing from the Employer Support / CFLC team. This included information on the upcoming Unit Rep Course and encouraging nominations for Employer Awards. The nominations and invitations to Unit Executreks have proven to be quite successful when the member asks for time off for training or to support deployments.

The next presentation was on the Cdn Manoeuvre Training Centre. This included an overview of the training centre and its mandate. The update on the major Exercises include Maple Resolve which will be held in May, 2022 and 4th Div will have the lead.

After the presentations it was onto the syndicates for the Command Teams. A brief overview was given by each lead on their plans for their respective working groups:

- 1) Reconstitution of the CAF
- 2) BTE 2022 Cougar Gauntlet May 6 to 15, 2022 on Vancouver Island
- 3) Culture Change
- 4) Recruiting and Best Practices

Thanks to 39 Service Battalion a nice lunch was prepared and enjoyed by all. The Command Teams went to their working groups while the DComd and Honoraries were off to Esquimalt to visit the HMCS Calgary. The CO and XO were on board to welcome the Honoraries and lead an informative and comprehensive tour of the ship.

After the tour, it was back to the Bay St Armoury for an update from the 3rd Div DComd and DSM. The two big topics were Culture Change and CAF Reconstitution. For the latter there are two camps - one focused on the people and another focused on the policy as both are needed to be successful. Cdn Army Modernization Strategy (CAMS) was also discussed. Briefings will happen in November and the hope is that there will be direction coming in the next month or two. Soldier Readiness Policy for the Reserves was reviewed. Part of the development of this Policy has required a review of what is being asked and the realization of the number of courses and time requirement is greater than the allocated training days for the year. This is leading to

questions on what needs to be done and what can be delayed on the requirements. At the end of the day, members train to be ready to soldier and mandated training should not over take the necessary training. Their goal is if a course is added, what is removed as there is not unlimited time. The session wrapped up with some good news. The A/CCA has sent directions to the Divisions on mess events and guests. They are looking for smaller events than we have had in the past, but the good news is that they will start to happen.

39 Service Battalion was back to work and provided another great meal for dinner. The Officers' Mess was open for a social and then back to the Wardroom.

Sunday started with the usual good breakfast at the Wardroom. Then back to Bay Street Armouries. We were greeted by Regional VP, PB for Bank of Montreal - Rob Parrott and handed a nice "Official Bank of the Cdn Defense Community" travel mug. 3 CANADIAN DIVISION HONORARIES CONFERENCE 5 – 7 NOVEMBER 2021 BRANDON MANITOBA

Previous 3rd Div Honorary Conferences had been held in Edmonton or Calgary. BGen Awalt wanted to move the conference to different Brigades. The first move was to Victoria, BC and then COVID moved the conference to online which delayed the Brandon visit for a year. Thankfully the restrictions were lifted and this year's conference was a hybrid of Honoraires and guest speakers being present in person and online.

With an early trip to the airport Friday morning (really early for some) HLCol Diamond met up with 15th Field Honoraries HCol De Genova and HLCol Foster and LCol Purcell and CWO Roberts who were representing the Brigade at the conference. They flew to Winnipeg, rented a car and made the drive to Brandon.

The conference started Friday evening with a social in the 26 Field Officers' Mess with overflow into the WOs' & Sgts' Mess. The Div Command Team of BGen Fletcher and CWO Bantock welcomed everyone and were excited to be meeting in person.

Saturday started with breakfast at the hotel and then back to the Brandon Armoury to start the conference at 9am with a safety briefing.

The Commander, BGen Fletcher opened the conference with his update. This frank discussion included comments about our need to improve our technology to be in step with our peers and adversaries. Cyberspace is another constant threat - this is from adversaries as well as "amateurs" testing their skills. He was proud of the past 13 months of COVID related DomOps - the troops stepped up when needed. This led to discussion of the Continental Defense of NA - this is more than planes and ships. It will involve generating a land component that can move fast and contact searches. It may include different Reserve mission tasks and will go beyond fire and flood support.

CAF Reconstitution was also addressed. The challenge of replacing the "missing middle" which is part of the approximate 8,000 members that the Reserves are currently under strength. At present the Army is not recruiting and training sufficient members to replace those leaving. They are looking for bold solutions such as 1 Brigade focusing on training at St Jean for the next year. The recruiting needs to continue but recruits need to be trained. There is also work continuing on the policy front such as what needs to be completed on the medical file at the timing of joining and what can be completed over time.

The last major review of the Army was Force 2013 - a lot has changed since then, so Force 2025 is needed. There are new technologies and adversaries that need to be considered. Army Council is hoping to make a decision on this at the end of November but it may take until December to ensure all options are considered. This will include looking at what we are currently doing and need to continue with and also change / stop. Training requirements - currently require approx 50 days to complete and members have 37.5 days to parade. The math doesn't work here. The focus on training will be at the Individual level vs Collective to ensure recruits and new leaders are getting the training they need.

Culture Change was another topic of discussion. The work has begun but it will take 3 to 5 years for all the changes to be implemented. As this is happening the focus to stop the bad behaviour and observe and report the bad behaviour will assist in the transition that is taking place.

2022 will be a busy year for 3rd Div as it is the Consume year. This means deployment time with the need being more at the leadership level vs the soldier level. The Reserves will be part of the deployments.

DComd BGen Awalt was next up and thanked all for attending. He also commented on the Honorary pin that he saw in Victoria and at last night's social. The Soldier Readiness Policy was the first topic and included the

need for baselines for the soldiers as well as leadership. This means going beyond NES and addressing participation before it becomes an issue. By establishing this bar it will ensure we are ready for domestic operations and new requests coming to the reserves.

Digitization is coming. Work is happening on an app that will allow soldiers to submit paysheets online, update training on their phones and find the Unit training plan on the app so they can plan their schedules.

His comments on Force 2025 included ReRolling and Amalgamation. There is a desire to maintain the history and heritage of the Units but questions have to be asked about the need for new buildings vs keeping and maintaining old buildings that were built for a different purpose. There has been Composite and Tactical Grouping and Consolidation in the past and this will continue as we move forward. Once the needs are confirmed this will lead to direction on recruiting and equipment needs that will enable the changes to happen.

The DComd closed by thanking the Honoraries for what they have done and commented on their importance during this time of change. With the leadership looking "down and in", the Honoraries can assist with the "Up and Out". This includes making sure the COs and RSMs get out to community events.

The Reserve DSM brief comments were to work with the RSMs and if you "See Something, Say Something".

After a busy morning it was on to the buses with a box lunch for a trip to Shilo. This visit included observing the sighting and firing of the guns. The group was able to see BGen (Ret'd) Selby fire his "last round". The surprise for the group was that 5 Honoraries were invited to fire the gun. HLCol Diamond was fortunate to be one of the 5. There is hope that the shell from his round will make its way west. It will make a fitting tribute to his Great Grandfather who was a gunner in the Boer War and WWI. After this excitement, it was back on the bus to return to the armoury for the conference.

The first presentation was from the CFLC / Employer Support group. They provided an overview of the changes taking place and focus of each team. At a National level the focus will be to get Associations involved with Executreks and the Units will be encouraged to focus on getting employers to local exercises / events.

Former 39 CBG Commander Col Paul Ursich joined the conference remotely and presented on Cultural and Professional Conduct. This includes the effort on moving announcements to policy development. As noted earlier in the conference, it will take 3 to 5 years for these efforts to be finalized. As part of this presentation, the Brigade reps were asked to share what is happening in their Brigades to support these efforts.

--38 CBG focused on the establishment of their Diversity Inclusion Advisory Committee (DIAC) -39 CBG commented on their current initiatives that resulted in the BC Soldier Handbook and outlined their plans for the near and long term

- 41 CBG had an epiphany this year when female soldiers were asking why are we waiting for change - now is the time to move. This has led to a Culture Change Conference in Banff later in November that will include a presentation by LCoI (Ret'd) Eleanor Taylor. All 3rd Div Honoraries were invited to attend this session remotely.

The closing comments were to "Build Trust and Work Together". Once the MND's mandate letter is issued it will be incorporated into the efforts to implement this change.

The last session of the day was from the National Advanced Placement and Prior Learning team. This is a great program for current and former members to continue with their post secondary education. We also had a sneak peak on what the BCIT Military Employment Platform will look like once completed.

The Commander and DComd closed the first day of the conference and it was back to the hotel for most of the attendees to get ready for the scaled down version of the Brandon Military Ball.

After a great evening and an extra hour of sleep due to the clocks changing, the day started with breakfast at the hotel and then back to the armoury for the balance of the conference.

HLCol Fitch was first up and gave an informative presentation on the role, structure and impact of the Canadian Rangers. It was also noted the great impact the Cdn Rangers have had over the past year with the support they have been giving in the remote and northern areas.

As the conference was coming to a close, each of the Brigades provided their thoughts on how the Honoraries were having an impact in their areas.





VANCOUVER'S NATIONAL ABORIGINAL VETERANS DAY CEREMONY SOLDIERS ON

Vancouver observed its 17th annual National Aboriginal Veterans Day Ceremony at Victory Square in cool and windy weather on Monday November 8th, 2021. For the second time, the event took place under COVID-19 precautions that limited in-person attendance and required masks. Live streaming and significant local media coverage, however, helped bring the service home to families, the public, and individuals unable to attend in person.

As co-founders, Elder Kelly White (Snuneymuxw and Musqueam First Nations) directed the logistics and sequence of the event, while Veteran and Elder Robert Nahanee (Squamish First Nation) led the Pipe Ceremony and observances. Dignitaries and wreath presenters represented multiple First Nations and Métis organizations, governments, first responders, unions, and Veterans' associations. (In fact, it was a challenge to keep attendance within the maximum permissible 50 participants in close proximity to the Cenotaph.)

"We are grateful to the families of our Aboriginal Veterans for the sacrifices they have made, and continue to make," wrote Ms. White prior to the ceremony. "We honour our Warriors of the past, and of today, for fighting for the rights of the People of Turtle Island and Mother Earth."

For the first time here, a senior serving member of the Canadian Armed Forces laid a wreath. Colonel Scott Raesler, Commander 39 Canadian Brigade Group and a United Nations veteran, was accompanied to the Cenotaph by Warrant Officer Brenda Morris, an Indigenous soldier from Labrador who has served overseas and as an instructor on the Bold Eagle Indigenous summer training program. Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel Bill Diamond and Association Vice President Ted Hawthorne represented The British Columbia Regiment (DCO), including laying a wreath with MCpl (R) Chuck Davey.

"Aboriginal Veterans fought for the freedoms most other Canadians enjoy today, and we honour the great sacrifices and contributions they have made," added Ms. White. Unfortunately, they also faced injustices and discrimination when returning from past wars. Nowadays, Canadians are increasingly concerned about rectifying historic harms and building appropriately respectful relationships with our country's original populations. In honouring Indigenous veterans and paying tribute to fallen warriors, the National Aboriginal Veterans Day Ceremony is a milepost towards Reconciliation that we will continue to support.
























REMEMBRANCE CEREMONY ICBC HEAD OFFICE, NORTH VANCOUVER, B.C. 10 NOVEMBER 2021







I joined the Regiment at 17, in June of 1993...walking into the smoke-filled JRs my first night...utterly clueless. What a place, full of characters and yelling. That place, and the Regiment over the next 23 years, rapidly became my home with lifelong friends that I simply now call 'brothers'.

I deployed to the former Yugoslavia in 1995 on the last UN tour...tried to extend for the NATO tour but I think they'd had enough of me, and I was rotated back home, a very unhappy 19 year old.

Over the next 20 years, I had the opportunity to travel all over Canada, the US and Europe with the Regiment either on tasking or on course. The two Regimental battlefield tours I went on and the Cambrian Team deployment are definitely highlights. Being able to actually see regimental history and the monuments and battlefields where these world changing events took place were definitely humbling and also made the history of the BCR more tangible.

In 2001, I joined the North Vancouver City Fire Department. I was a little intimidated going through the process and the interview, but I can say without a word of a lie that my experiences, courses and the Regimental culture of always forcing you out of your comfort zone gave me my success. In my interview, I was able to talk about working within an established structure, the importance of adapting to the culture you are seeking to join and then embracing it. I knew everyone else would beat me in the formal education part of the resume and application process....but no-one was beating me on that interview. Twenty years later, I use the lessons, good and bad, I learned within the CAF and particularly the BCR every day on the job. I had fantastic mentors and supervisors with the Regiment, that later became some of my closest friends. While taking my Fire Officer 1 course a number of years ago (LT qualification), I burst out laughing when a very ernest Fire Dept LT spoke of the stressors of managing 3 firefighters on a daily basis in a firehouse and running that crew on a call. I apologized but didn't mean it. That carried on with future career courses, I knew that I just had to take my lessons and experiences from the Army and the BCR and put a slightly different perspective on them with regard to command and personnel management. It also made me aware of my own shortcomings and seeking to adjust and be better at my profession. And the ability to laugh at pretty much anything....again, not always appreciated, but whatever.

In 2015, after 22 years, I retired at the rank of Sgt from the BCR, after watching with great satisfaction and a huge grin, soldiers I had taught and peers I came up with surpass me and be better than I ever was.

I will be forever grateful to the Regiment for teaching me some invaluable life lessons: you're only special to your parents, its pretty much all funny afterwards, be good to those around you and most of all: be loyal. Loyalty begets loyalty. The opportunities, people and experiences I received gave me the skills, confidence and ability to be where I am now.

THE CHANDLER PLAQUE 1 DECEMBER 2021 (By R.O.Acconci)

Last Wednesday, the Commanding Officer received, on behalf of the Regiment, the Raymond Chandler Plaque in a low-key presentation at his office. The following is a brief synopsis of the plaque's genesis and creation.

Raymond Thornton Chandler (1888 – 1959) was born in the United States to an American father and an Irish/British mother. Due to marital problems his mother took him to London (UK) to live with her relatives and to obtain a formal education – which he did at Dulwich College. He spent his childhood summers at his uncle's home in Waterford, Ireland, where his branch of the Thornton family originated.

After leaving school he travelled briefly in Europe and tried his hand at several professions before returning to the United States and settling down initially in San Francisco, California.

After America's entry into WW1 Chandler felt he should be in uniform but opted to join H.M.Forces, and so travelled up to Victoria, BC to enlist in the 50th Gordon Highlanders – a founding unit of The Canadian Scottish Regiment. After basic and advanced infantry training in Canada and the UK, Chandler was transferred to the C7th Bn (1st BC) CEF in the field. Where he served in action with the C7th Bn from March to June 1918, attaining the rank of Acting/Sergeant. He was invalided from the trenches due to illness and when recovered, was transferred to the RAF. Chandler ended the war as a pilot trainee and was demobilised in Vancouver, BC in 1919.

Chandler returned to California and in due course became one of America's most renowned crime fiction writers. His famous 'Philip Marlowe Mysteries' series resulted in several Hollywood movies staring the likes of Humphrey Bogart and Robert Mitchum, and rendered Chandler as a screenwriter as well.

Chandler seldomly spoke of his experiences in the trenches as a combat infantryman with the C7th Bn, and wrote very little on the subject. But perhaps his most well known quotation of that experience is:

"Once you have had to lead a platoon into direct machine-gun fire, nothing is ever the same".

Raymond Chandler's service in the C7th Bn was first brought to our attention by LCol (Ret'd) Bruce Kadonoff after he read an article on Chandler in the Victoria on-line newsmagazine, 'The Tyee'. This article and some further research, including information provided to me by LCol (Ret'd) Archie Steacy led me to think that we

should establish some recognition at the Drill Hall (DH) of Chandler's service with the C7th Bn. With some further research, including an excellent biography on Raymond Chandler's life, I thought a good plaque to go up somewhere in the DH would be a deserving marker to commemorate Chandler's time in the Regt. I also noted that there was in London (UK) a Heritage Blue Plaque at the house Chandler grew up in and also an Irish Heritage Plaque at the family house in Waterford where he spent his childhood summers. These plaques of course commemorate him as a famous author, but our plaque would recognise his service and his poignant quotation as a combat infantry sergeant in our Regt – specifically, the C7th Bn (1st BC) CEF. Of course we would have to acknowledge, as well, Chandler's fame as a crime fiction novelist!

I approached my friend Dan Bellan of Dan Bellan Design, who has vast experience in stonework, for I had thought that the plaque should be rendered in stone. Dan suggested polished black granite and let me know where to purchase it and the dimensions he had in mind. Both Dan & his mother are great fans of Raymond Chandler and he said he and an artisan that works with him at his studio would do the artwork without charge to me, but rather as a patriotic gesture to the Regt and in consideration of his affection for Chandler's Philip Marlowe mysteries. So I naturally left the design of the work to him but did provide a genuine C7th Bn cap badge and a photo of the collar badges (kindly sent to me by Sgt Dwayne Snow).

From the excellent biography of Chandler I showed to Dan, he selected a photograph of Chandler in the uniform of the C7th Bn – which we could not locate anywhere else on Google! Dan decided to **hand-etch** Chandler's likeness from the photo to the plaque and include Chandler's poignant quotation along with his name, rank and unit. There was no room for anything else. So I determined we would need a smaller supplementary plaque to go with the main plaque in order to fill out the significance of Raymond Chandler to the BCR – for I thought some of our younger soldiers would not have known of Raymond Chandler, nor would some of our visitors to the DH. My thoughts were also that the plaques would be affixed somewhere fairly prominent so that on any given parade night a young soldier might be reminded not only of the valour of some of our predecessors, but also the scope and talent of others who have gone before.

As a final note on Raymond Chandler – don't trust all the information you find on him in Google (Wikipedia). There are better sources, as well as his Service Record. It seems clear from his fictional character, Philip Marlowe, and some observations from those that knew him well, that Chandler quite possibly suffered in some degree from PTSD. It's fortuitist to have made the connection of Chandler and the Regt and of modest satisfaction to finally mark his service and include his name among the many talented and courageous individuals who have served in the BCR.

The Cowichan River floods most years and extensive remediation took place at the lower portion over the past summer. These current storms put homes and the Big House at risk. The Big House has great traditional and cultural significance to the community.

I visited the Troop and saw the success that they achieved as a result of their impressive efforts. The Hesco's and sandbagging was executed in very good time due to the coordinated efforts of all concerned with heavy equipment and sand bagging machines, First Nation's crews and old fashioned shovel work along with lifting and moving the bags into position.

The Left Coast Lancers is the informal collection of all ranks and the families of the Royal Canadian Armoured Corps, who are primarily retired, located in British Columbia and the Yukon. The Strathcona assistance is having a direct impact on our colleagues who are living in Merritt, Princeton, Abbotsford, Chilliwack and Vancouver Island. We extend our thanks and gratitude.



THE BARRETT BUNKER DECEMBER 2021

It is said that history often has a way of repeating itself. As I write this excerpt from our Regiment's history, soldiers from the BCR (DCO) are assisting in OP LENTUS under command of the Commanding Officer Lord Strathcona Horse (LDSH) in Abbottsford fighting back the recent flood waters and assisting with recovery of farms and property on the Sumas Prairie. In the spring of 2004, I was serving in the G1 Personnel Branch at 39 CBG HQ when the Fraser was again on the verge of flooding. Col (then Maj) Paul Ursich was to be in command of our troops from 39 CBG filling sandbags and I was detailed to be the Military Liaison for the City of Maple Ridge. Fortunately, the waters subsided, and we were not required at that time. In the past we have not always been so fortunate, especially in the spring of 1948.

Back in May of 1948, the first twelve days of the months had the heaviest rainfall on record for that time. Followed by an unseasonably warm heat wave which melted the snow off the mountain peaks, the Fraser Valley faced an immense flood which dwarfed the prior record holder of 1894. The 1948 Fraser Flood dwarfed the record by an additional foot of water or 30 cms. Cache Creek was hit hard by 13 May and all other interior rivers reached new heights. By the end of the month the rising waters had breached the dykes at Agassiz and flooded 1200 acres. The Army set up a Flood Control Headquarters at Jerhico to work with the civil authorities. Conditions continued to deteriorate and by the 29th of May both the CP and CN tracks were under water, trains were at a standstill, roads were impassable, and Vancouver and the Lower Fraser Valley were cut off from the rest of Canada. Conditions were grim and flooding was expected throughout the Lower Fraser Valley.

In response to the civil emergency, the BCR (DCO) was called out and ordered to near Langley and put to work to try to save the dykes on Barnston Island. About 900 head of cattle had already been evacuated by barge by the time the soldiers arrived. Some locals ignored the orders and were confident that the waters would recede as they had in the past.

On arrival, the Regiment met up with an engineer from the Provincial Authorities, who upon completing a survey of the island believed the dykes could not be saved. The Officers of the BCR were unable to convince the locals remaining on the island of the danger, so the soldiers, assisted by civilians, filled sandbags, patrolled the soggy levees, and fought the leaks that developed hour by hour.

On 1 June 1948, the Premier, the Hon Bryan Johnson declared a state of emergency and all the troops in the British Columbia were called out and craft of the RCN from Esquimalt were sent over to the Fraser River. The Lower Mainland was divided into five sectors, of which, the BCR's was from Port Mann to the Sumas River on the Fraser. 500,000 sandbags were flown out from Montreal and daily requirements numbered some 200,000.

During the night of 3 June, the dyke on the northeast corner of Barnston crumbled, the dyke broke and soon a gap of 100 feet wide, or 30 metres, was created. An RCN Naval Tug was dispatched, and the officers drove around the island to hasten the departure of the remaining residents. This had to be accomplished quickly

as the waters were rising fast and roads were soon under water. The soldiers worked tirelessly to evacuate the residents and their reluctant livestock.

This was accomplished by daylight and by morning most of the 250 Barnston Islanders had been taken to New Westminster to join more refugees from the floods. By the next morning, Barnston Island was almost completely under water. Only a few residents in small boats remained trying to save what remained of their possessions.

Over 50,000 acres of farmland had been flooded and it appeared that the remaining dykes were now holding. The waters of the Fraser continued to rise until they reached a height of 24.59 feet (average height normally 16 feet). Luckily the Chilliwack and Sumas Dykes held.

The BCR was moved down to Annacis Island, and plans were made for the evacuation of Lulu Island and the City of Richmond. Detachments from the LDSH and Canadian Scottish arrived. Fortunately, with a cold spell, the waters eased, and the waters dropped, and on the 13th of June, the BCR and the other reservists were dismissed from further duty and returned to their homes.

We live in a province where historically extreme weather events are not uncommon. Preparedness is critical to reducing the devastation which can occur, and this is reflected both in past and current commitment to ensure that our soldiers are ready to help in a timely manner when needed in Assistance to the Civil Authorities. Who knew that almost 70 years later that BCRs and other units of 39 CBG under Command of the LDSH would be standing firm with civilian authorities once again against the floods in the Fraser Valley.

My thanks to Douglas Harker for information from his history of the BCR's, <u>The Duke</u>, and to <u>Swift and Strong</u>, and to other archival sources.

SERGEANT JESSICA SCHULTZ, CD FROM SOLDIER TO DOCTOR OF PHILOSPHY CANDIDATE

I was terrible driver. At age 17, with no licence, experience, or self-confidence, I was a driving instructor's worst nightmare. My first time in an Iltis, I drove out onto the wrong side of the road, almost got creamed pulling out into traffic and stalled while turning left on the highway. My crew commander was shaking as he got out of the vehicle, knees weak in that special way that only comes from a near-death experience. "Schultz!" he yelled, panting. Then he tried to control his voice, "you're not doing bad, you're just...". He was lost for words, but it was nice of him to try. The next training night, I heard them talking, "ok, who's going to take Schultz this time?" The others avoided eye contact so as not to be chosen. Yes, I was *that* driver.

So it was no surprise that summer when I didn't do very well on QL3, the armoured trades course at the time. However, I will never forget my end-course interview because something unexpected happened. The sergeant said, "other than your driving [coughs awkwardly], you actually did quite well." He went on to say he thought I was smart, and that I should consider becoming an officer (likely since officers don't have to drive!). What's memorable to me about this is not the complement, although very nice, but what I thought about it afterwards. *I fooled him*, I thought. It didn't occur to me that there could be any truth to his words. Instead, as a quiet introvert at heart, I thought I'd found the perfect life hack: if you just don't say anything, people will think you're smarter than you actually are. Maybe there is some truth to this, but it was the beginning of the most important lesson I learned during my service. Or perhaps it was the most important thing I "unlearned."

I grew up in an environment where I was treated like I wasn't very intelligent. No one did this on purpose, but often I was shot down and put-down whenever I opened my mouth. What resulted was a deeply entrenched imposter syndrome; a life-long feeling that I was observing life as an outsider, unworthy of actively participating myself. I'm sharing this context to help express how much my time in the BCR has meant to me. I suspect other members have faced similar challenges.

I came home from QL3 and finally took some driving lessons. I had an epiphany when I realized that driving is way easier if you break it down like a weapons drill. Mirror. Signal. Shoulder check. I can do this.

It turns out this applies to nearly everything in life. In fact, 20 years later and now working on my third postsecondary degree, I have yet to come across something I couldn't learn by breaking it down into simple steps, just like a C9 unload or changing lanes on the highway.

Hence, the most important thing I learned during my service was this simple truth:

Anyone can learn anything.

(I also learned that it's good to be terrible at something once in a while. Among other things, it makes you a better teacher. Later, when I learned the terror of being in the crew commander seat with a new driver, it was at least therapeutic to remind myself, "anyone can learn anything! Anyone can learn anything!" as I gripped the dashboard with white knuckles).

This knowledge has carried me through my military career and every other aspect of my life in a way that otherwise would not have been possible. I'm now a marine biologist and professional scuba diver. I've been fortunate to have a number of cool opportunities in my career so far, from diving with some of the world's leading underwater explorers, to visiting the bottom of the ocean in a submarine. I completed my undergraduate degree by working three jobs and my MSc while simultaneously working full-time. I'm proud to say I'm the first person in my family to earn a graduate degree. None of this would have been possible without the confidence I gained in the military. I learned that the world belongs to me too, as much as it belongs to everyone else. It changed my life in every sense.

I'm currently working towards a PhD at the University of Guelph, where I'm using DNA barcoding to discover and quantify the variety of life on the seafloor. My goal is to develop DNA-based tools that will make it easier to measure biodiversity, inform decision-making, and ultimately help address the current challenges faced by oceans and people. Although it seems unrelated to my military experience, my motivation stems from the sense of service I gained in the military. Serving overseas left me with a deep sense of responsibility to make the most of the opportunities I have as a Canadian, and science has become my pathway for giving back as best I can. My service taught me more than I can by possibly express, and I am so grateful. In my heart, I will always be a Duke.















LIEUTENANT-COLONEL WILLIAM SMITH LATTA C.E.F, D.S.O. & 2 BARS (MID), 29TH BATTALION

There is much to be said about Lieutenant-Colonel William Smith Latta, but this narrative of The Distinguished Service Order (DSO), taken from Veteran's Canada's Website also sums up a brave and gallant man.

"This is a military order for officers only, and while normally given for service under fire or under conditions equivalent to service in actual combat with the enemy, it was awarded between 1914 and 1916 under circumstances which could not be regarded as under fire. After 01 January 1917, commanders in the field were instructed to recommend this award only for those serving under fire. Prior to 1943, the order could be given only to someone Mentioned-in-Dispatches. The order is generally given to officers in command, above the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel and awards to ranks below this are usually for a high degree of gallantry just short of deserving the Victoria Cross."

To be clear, Lieutenant-Colonel Latta was awarded his DSO in June 1917, meaning he met the criteria for a DSO. He was, after all, one of the eight commanding officers of the 29th Battalion, according to a Wikipedia article referenced below.

A Speech on Return to Vancouver

The following article appeared in the Vancouver Sun on 3 March, 1919, page 5 from a speech he delivered. It is very instructive on the measure of this man, as well as the men of the 29th Battalion:

ting too little.

"I want to speak tonight of the front line man," said Lieut.-Col. W. S. Latta, D.S.O., who confined his remarks more particularly to the work of the famous 29th battalion, with which unit he served in France. The Hun was al-ways on the look out for the infantry man. The sniper was ready to get him if he showed his head above the trenches, while the enemy machine guns were waiting for a similar op-portunity. In addition the Hun aero-planes flew overhead with like intent.

Front Line the Test. "You could never tell what was in a man." said Colonel Latta, "until you saw him in the front line trenches." The speaker said he had in mind two members of the battalion. There was one fine fellow, a smart appearing soldier, and something over six feet in height. It was, however, extremely difficult to get him near the front line trenches. He was taken sick with some imaginary illness each time he was scheduled to make the trip. On the other hand there was a little fellow, with his toes turned in and a squint in his eyes. He was a man clean through, said Colonel Latta, squint and all. He was always at his post in the trench and was eager to Man's volunteer for service in "No Man's Land" when the opportunity was offered him.

The front line, said the speaker, is the great test-box. Everything that is good in a man will be found then, also everything that is mean and bad. The everything that is mean and bad. friendship of the men in the firing line was another remarkable thing, to-gether with the spirit of self-sacrifice shown by them towards their fellow comrades. Colonel Latta told of the fight of the 29th two years ago in the Kemmel sector in front of Mount Kemmel. He referred to Hill 70, where this battalion went into its hardest fight against the best troops that the Germans had. It was a wonderful fight, he said. The men of the 29th fought the Huns to a standstill and not only that but they went forward and took some of the enemy trenches. It was there that Sergt .- Major Hanna won his Victoria Cross.

Men Want Chance.

Any mistakes that may have hap-pened at the front were not due to the men. It would be the same at home, said Colonel Latta. "If you handle them right and give them a fisir start they will not let you down. All they want is a chance to earn a-fair and honest living," he said. Those returning had also learned the lesson returning had also learned the lesson of co-operation, for they had seen what it meant at the front and what cruld be done with it at home.

"Questions that have been asked many times during these days," said Major (Rev.) C. C. Owen, "are what were the Allies fighting for and what are the results?" These men who went over, some never to come back, did not do it for nothing. The men in the front lines often asked the question whether the world was going to be any better when the struggle was over. They saw the moral condition of Ger-many and the ideals and teachings of the Huns. They did not want this standard of life in Canada. They also looked towards Russia and were determined that there would be no Bol-shevism in this Dominion. The speaker referred to profit-sharing as one of the solutions of the future. Every man wanted his fair place and his fair share.

Greatest Men Live for Others.

The highest conception of life, said Major Owen, was given to the world by Jesus Christ. If the world was to be made worth living in, Christ would have to be given first place in it. No one had ever given the people such a high type of Socialism as preached and practiced by Jesus. The greatest men, he said, were those who lived for others and this was borne out all through history.

Towards the end of the meeting a vote of thanks was moved to the speakers and artists by M. J. Crehan, vice-president of the Army and Navy Veterans' association, the concern being given under the auspices of the association, F. J. A. King, president, occupying the chair. In between the addresses there was a pleasing programme of songs and musical num-bers, those taking part being Miss Marjorie Stevens, Miss Helen Prestwich, Henry Green, Wilfrid Fee-San-derson and Madame Carapata. It was intended that Lieut.-Col. Ray Collishaw, D.S.O., the famous aviator, should have spoken, but owing to the state of his health he was unable to appear. The theatre was filled from top to bottom and the collection that was taken up amounted to \$220, net-ting about \$80 for the benefit of the Army and Navy Veterans.

Distinguished Service Order (DSO)

The award of the DSO is shown on the below image located on ancestry.ca. The date of the award is 4 June 1917, under authority of L.G. 30111, presented to Lieutenant-Colonel William Smith Latta. It was at this time that the Battle for Arras was in progress (see: Longtail website reference below), The second bar was awarded on 4 October 1918. The dates of his "Mentioned in Dispatches", which is one of the criteria for this award is also noted on this card. At the time of this award, he held the rank of Major, it appears that the award of the DSO resulted/coincided in his elevation to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel.

When Latta was awarded his DSO on June 4, 1917, it was solely a British Army Medal (by Royal Warrant), as Canada did not assume control over awarding this medal to it's citizens until the 1930's. Latta's DSO has two bars, only 18 recipients have received this medal with two bars. At the time he was awarded this medal, the recipient had to have been mentioned in dispatches, and, hold the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel and higher. In other words his medal was awarded for his performance in combat as a ranking officer.

According to Veteran's Affairs, the ranking of this medal ranks below the following, in Order:

Victoria Cross (VC) George Cross (GC) Companion of the Order of the Bath (CB) Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE)

Life after Military Discharge

Latta's Military Record indicates that he was admitted for a time at Shaughnessy Military Hospital in Vancouver, B.C. April to May 1919.

Swift and Strong indicates that became a land surveyor until his retirement.

A review of newspaper articles as well as other documents indicates the following:

An Order in Council (British Columbia) dated 19 August, 1941 appoints Latta, shown as Inspector for the British Columbia Land Settlement Board, as a Director of the Board, with a notation that the OIC appointment was rescinded, unknown date.

There does not appear to be any additional information available to document his civilian life, until his death.

Death

William Smith Latta died on 16 September 1966 at Victoria, B.C., he was 87 years of age.

An article appeared in The Vancouver Sun dated 20 September 1966, recording his passing. It is shown below. As an aside, there are newspaper articles available recording the marriages of the children of this marriage, and it is interesting to note that the children appear to have respected family tradition by marrying into other military families. Their eldest son, John Blandford Latta, served in the R.A.F. during WWII, was awarded a M.M. and was lost in action on 12 January, 1941, during The Battle of Britain.

CANADIAN MILITARY INTERNEES IN SWITZERLAND DURING WORLD WAR 1

You may be surprised to know that during the First World War, a number of Canadian Army soldiers who had fought on the Western Front, subsequently completed their wartime service living in hotels in the snowy mountains of Switzerland. This short article explains how this extraordinary situation came about, and describes the experience of one such Canadian soldier who hailed from British Columbia.

The exchange of badly wounded prisoners of war (PWs) between the Allies and Germany took place throughout World War 1, some through the neutral countries of Holland and Switzerland, but it is not broadly known that many servicemen from both sides who had been made PWs remained in those neutral countries, serving out the war as internees; in uniform, under military discipline but required to remain there until the war's end.

This remarkable scheme was the outcome of a proposal by the International Committee of the Red Cross. As one element of it, the Swiss Government offered to hold as internees those prisoners from either side who were less wounded or unwell and might, if they re-joined their armies, become useful again. Such prisoners would remain in Switzerland throughout the war and any who escaped would be returned by their own side. This plan suited the Swiss Government admirably. As well as consolidating Switzerland's neutrality, the prospect of filling holiday hotels emptied by the war with persons whose governments would foot the bill, was an appealing one.

Reciprocal agreements were signed between Germany, France, Belgium and Britain. The system required wounded PWs to appear before a board of Swiss and host-nation judges and the lucky ones were chosen. But the selection process was rigorous and rejection heartbreaking, as it condemned the individual to further years of deprivation and monotony in his PW camp. The first batches of French and German prisoners arrived in Switzerland in early 1916, and thereafter Britain joined the scheme. By the end of the war, nearly 68,000 men from all sides had been brought to Switzerland for internment.

Within the allied parties so selected were many Canadians, and the first of these reached Switzerland in May 1916. They included Kenneth Foyster, a private soldier in the 7th Canadian Infantry Battalion (1st British Columbia), who lived in Victoria, BC. An out-of-work mining engineer, he had joined the 88th Regiment (Victoria Fusiliers) in mid-1914, a militia regiment which had been mobilised and ordered to restore peace during a Vancouver Island miners' strike. Soon after Kenneth enlisted, war between Britain and Germany was declared and he duly signed up for wartime service. Becoming a member of the 1st Canadian Division, he trained at Valcartier in 1914, then crossed the Atlantic to England and thence deployed with his battalion to France, taking part in the April 1915 Second Battle of Ypres, in which the untried Canadian force greatly distinguished itself. During the heat of the battle, Kenneth was shot through the arm and captured. He ended up in a PW camp at Göttingen in Lower Saxony.

The camp ran a harsh regime, but as Kenneth's arm did not heal, he eventually became eligible for the internment scheme. Happily, he was selected and he arrived in Switzerland in August 1916. On their arrival and during their passage to their final destinations, the internees were amazed to be welcomed by thousands of Swiss along the way, a sharp contrast with the severe conditions in their PW camps.

Kenneth was sent to the alpine holiday resort of Mürren, where his arm eventually healed. There, he and his comrades spent the last two years of the war, accommodated in hotels but under a military regimen. They were comfortable and safe, but not allowed to return home until the war's end. The internees engaged in a host of activities to stave off boredom and even received visits

from their relations, who travelled there across western France. But in Switzerland they were required to remain. Sadly, as it did universally, the influenza pandemic arrived in 1918 and a number of internees died as a result. Kenneth returned to Victoria in 1919, eventually becoming a Vancouver schoolmaster.

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You can read Kenneth Foyster's unique story in my book *'Keeping The Old Flag Flying'*, based on his vivid memoir. It describes Kenneth's fascinating journey from BC to Europe, his stirring part in 2nd Ypres, his time as a PW and internee, and his life thereafter. You'll meet a host of legendary and idiosyncratic characters


She was a WW2 Veteran, a proud Scot, and a proud Canadian who led a life of service to others. We will all miss Agnes very much.
