

FEBRUARY

BCR OFFICERS' PROFFESIONAL DEVELOPMENT SESSION WITH LCOL (Ret'd) ALEX VINDMAN – 1 Feb 2022

Editor's Note: A timely analysis of the Ukraine situation given just prior to the invasion of the Ukraine by Russia three week's later.

The Regiment was pleased to host LCol (Ret'd) Alex Vindman as part of the Officers' Professional Development session. Due to the current tensions in the Ukraine and the speaker's intimate knowledge of this area, the CO opened attendance to others in the Brigade. The invitation was eagerly accepted and the session had over 80 guests in attendance.

Major McCullough welcomed everyone and advised all that this session would use "Chatham House" rules. This means that the intent is to have open discussion in an informal format and comments or discussion are not to be quoted outside of this format. He then advised all that the session would be focussed on the current Russia / Ukraine situation.

The CO was next up and shared with all the PD Plan for the next couple of months and asked Major Brown to introduce the guest speaker. The introduction gave a brief overview of the speaker's background.

LCol (Ret'd) Vindman opened by saying he planned to cover some history, policy actions and potential scenarios over the next 15 minutes. Then the floor would be opened for questions and all were reminded of the Chatham House rules.

The initial 15 minutes rolled into 20 minutes and I am sure LCoI (Ret'd) Vindman could have carried on for much longer, but he wanted to receive questions from the attendees. It was evident that he has a strong background on this subject and was willing to share his knowledge as well as his opinion on possible scenarios. It is the latter that made this time a PD session vs a lecture. There are a number of people that can share the facts and history, but the interest and development is understanding how and why the possible scenarios may come to be. As there are many layers to what is happening on the borders of the Ukraine - the military aspect, political posturing, NATO maneuvering, etc, it was intriguing to hear from someone that had an understanding of all these different aspects. It will be interesting to see what happens over the coming weeks and months. Maybe in the fall we can have the former LCoI back to give his assessment on what happened and why.

After great questions and answers, the CO had the last question and then he turned the floor over to Col Raesler for a few comments. The Commander was pleased to be invited and thanked the CO for coordinating this session and extending the invitation to the Brigade.

The evening closed with HCol Rohani thanking the speaker. A special thank you is due to our Honorary Colonel for arranging the session with LCol (Re'td) Vindman.

By Alexander Vindman Mr. Vindman was the director for European and Russian affairs at the National Security Council from 2018 to 2020.

It feels ominously like 2014 again. Back then, Russian troops and tanks rolled into eastern Ukraine while the West, in shock, looked on. This year, Russia has once again raised the tenor of anti-Ukraine propaganda and assembled nearly 100,000 military personnel along Ukraine's border, plus tanks, artillery and equipment. All of this has raised alarms that Russia is preparing to launch the largest military offensive in Europe since World War II. In an attempt to ease the tension, President Biden spoke with Russia's president, Vladimir Putin, on Tuesday. Mr. Biden made progress in signaling the significant cost of an invasion of Ukraine: He explained the United States is prepared to impose punishing economic measures to protect Ukraine's sovereignty. But that may not be sufficient to deter Mr. Putin. Russia has amassed a \$620 billion war chest to weather the most crippling of sanctions — and Mr. Putin understands such penalties are unlikely to be enforced in the first place, since American allies in Europe would also be hurt. Providing Ukraine with larger weapons such as anti-air and antiship missiles would be useful, but history suggests that the U.S. government is too risk-averse to take this step. To shift Mr. Putin's calculus, it is imperative that the Biden administration's policy toward Ukraine change both tactically and strategically to demonstrate a more active level of U.S. engagement but one that avoids crossing into military adventurism.

There's a bigger issue at stake here: the vital role a free and sovereign Ukraine plays in advancing U.S. interests against those of Russia and China. The United States must support Ukraine by providing more extensive military assistance, deep and sustained diplomatic engagement and, most crucially, economic cooperation. To date, U.S. foreign policy toward Ukraine has failed to keep the Kremlin in check. When it comes to Russia's neighbors, Washington has settled for a passive role and has been, at best, fickle in its friendship with Ukraine. Russia, on the other hand, has been committed to retaining and regaining a sphere of influence over its most important imperial holdings, Ukraine and Belarus. Mr. Putin — no doubt picking up on the decreased American appetite for foreign entanglements over the last few years — has seized his chances with encroachments on Ukrainian sovereignty including the annexation of Crimea and the invasion of the Donbas region. Even interference in Western elections is just another tactic to weaken the West and create a privileged sphere of Russian influence. Today's looming crisis in Ukraine is simply the continuation of Mr. Putin's ambitions. Statements like the one by Mr. Biden on Wednesday — that U.S. interests end at NATO's borders — have only emboldened Mr. Putin to ignore international norms. This American neglect must end. After all, the United States and Ukraine share both ideology and long-term geopolitical interests.

Over the past 30 years, Ukraine has made major strides in its experiment with democracy. Despite worrying instances of government-backed corruption — undeniably, there is still more work to be done — Ukraine has made hard-fought progress on reform in the midst of war. Six presidents, two revolutions and many violent protests later, the people of Ukraine have sent a clear message that reflects the most fundamental of American values: They will fight for basic rights, and against authoritarian repression. A prosperous Ukraine buttressed by American support makes an authoritarian Russia unviable in the long term. Ukraine's success would upend Russia's irredentist aspirations for empire and highlight the Kremlin's failures, just as West Germany's achievements once did in comparison to the totalitarian East German state during the Cold War. It may even convince the Russian people — who share a culture, history and religion with Ukrainians — to eventually demand their own framework for democratic transition. To be sure, this doesn't happen overnight. A generational investment is necessary to realize such a vision. Nevertheless, the outlines of the stark contrast between a prosperous democratic Ukraine and a repressive and economically stagnant Russia are already evident. This is, in large part, why Mr. Putin needs Ukraine to be a failed state. U.S. support for Ukraine could also help drive a wedge between China and Russia. Preventing Mr. Putin from invading Ukraine demonstrates the strength of the West's commitment to opposing autocracy and makes

Russia a less potent partner to China in their mutual efforts to undermine the Western rules-based international order

To that end, the United States should consider an out-of-cycle, division-level military deployment to Eastern Europe to reassure allies and bolster the defenses of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. This kind of deployment would signal that Russia's aggression will result in the sort of NATO security posture Russia most wishes to avoid. And the United States cannot adequately support Ukraine without significant European involvement. The Kremlin wishes to make NATO membership for Ukraine a central issue of any discussions. That's a distraction right now because an assurance that Ukraine won't be a part of NATO is unlikely on its own to stop Russia from still trying to bring Ukraine to heel. The more important issue to consider is that negotiations with Russia should be dealt with at the level of European security. These talks should devise off ramps that alleviate both European and Russian security concerns: for Russia, NATO encroachment and ballistic missile defense, and for NATO, Russia's over-militarized western border.

The Biden-Putin call on Tuesday opened the door to exactly this kind of discussion. The question that remains is whether Russia is prepared to walk through that door and reconsider its position on conventional arms control agreements such as the Conventional Forces in Europe Treaty. The United States should also engage Ukraine in more long-term bilateral initiatives on security, reform and economic cooperation. This year, Washington has delivered approximately \$450 million in security assistance to Ukraine. While this is important, economic cooperation should go further to include backing American commercial investment through the Development Finance Corporation. Washington should also consider maintaining a more sustained high-level relationship with Ukraine that isn't defined by whether Kyiv is in crisis or not. There are irrefutable benefits to the existence of a strong, democratic and independent Ukraine as a powerhouse at the crossroads of Russia, Central Asia, the Middle East and Southern Europe. For that to happen, the United States has to be more assertive in the region. Our traditional halfhearted approach has already proven to be a dead end.

LCol (Ret'd) Jim Barrett, BCR Association President as the Exercise Director and main presenter for the day.



NATIONAL FLAG OF CANADA DAY QUEEN ELIZABETH PARK 15 FEBRUARY 2022

The Vice President of the Regimental Association, Ted Hawthorne, attended at Queen Elizabeth Park at noon on Monday, 15 February 2022 to mark the 57th Anniversary of the inauguration of the Canadian National Flag on 15 February 1965. The 60-foot flagpole, dedicated in 2017, and the Canadian Flag (6' by 12'), were donated by The Flag Shop to honour the legacy of its founder, Jack Braverman. The Flag Shop has generously agreed to donate all future flags for the flagpole as may be required as part of their legacy program. In our new COVID-19 environment, no one was there as the annual ceremony was once again cancelled!

We look forward to 2023 where the City of Vancouver Board of Parks and The Canadian Club of Vancouver will hopefully be able to hold their customary ceremony celebrating this special anniversary.





UPDATE ON REPAIR OF THE KAISER'S CUP

The Kathe iser Cup (Kaiser Cup) was awarded to Major W.F. Hart-McHarg for winning the Long-Range Championship of World with an Army Rifle at the National Shooing Tournament, Camp Perry, Ohio, USA, 1913. The winning trophy was named the Palma Trophy.

The Kaiser Cup was retained permanently by the Regiment, due to the outbreak of World War I commencing on 28 July 1914.



The engraving on the Cup states: Long Range Championship of the World with an Army Rifle, Winner Major Hart-McHarg. National Shooting Tournament, Camp Perry, Ohio, U.S.A., 1913.

Zudem, Ehrengabe das Deutschen Schützenbundes. Translated as follows: Furthermore, Honorary Gift of the German Shooting Foundation.

The badge affixed to the top of the Kaiser Cup is the "Gaumeister Badge". The Gaumeister badge displays an Eagle and a shooting target surrounded with a laurel wreath. It is not known how, why, or when the Kaiser Cup had the wood base removed. In 2004, I noticed four small holes drilled through the bottom edge of the trophy indicating it originally had a wooden base.

It has stayed as I surmised until December 2021, when I advised Museum President, Bill Whalen of my suspicion, supported by a photograph of Hart-McHarg standing next to the trophies he won. President Whalen enhanced the photo to determine the size of the base. I offered to construct a base, at no cost, for the trophy. The Museum Directors agreed. and I constructed a base of white oak, applied seven coats of lacquer and attached the base to the trophy with four one-inch brass broad nails.

BCR Expedition Team AST 1

On 12 and 13 February 2022, members of the BCR's Expedition Team took part in an Avalanche Safety Training Level One (AST 1) course on Mt Seymour with Canada West Mountain School. It was the team's largest gathering since the 120km expedition last summer, and it was great to see a mix of both new and returning faces. A special shout out to Pte Truong, a last minute addition fresh from completing his BMQ less than a week previous.

AST 1 is an introduction to avalanche safety, and the course examines how weather patterns affect mountain snowpacks, and how to be prepared when operating in avalanche terrain. As our team explores new challenges and more complex terrain, having this information helps us to ensure we do so in a safe and controlled manner. It is highly recommended that anyone expecting to spend time out in avalanche terrain conducts this training.



Our instructor, Brent Hillier, was an avid skier and had worked previously as part of Mt. Seymour's ski patrol. As such, he had a wealth of knowledge about operating safely in avalanche country and made himself open to a myriad of questions from the group. Day one was largely theoretical, with a morning classroom session assessing weather reports, planning routes and making assessments based on different weather trends at similar locations. We then moved outdoors to test out emergency transceivers and avalanche probes.

Day two we put it all together, with an early start on Mt. Seymour and crash course on skiing for some. Once in the mountains we set about locating, probing and extricating buried transceivers. Splitting into two teams each group tested their new skills under a time crunch to add a sense of urgency. Spirits were high as we completed a sunny day on the mountain with a ski run back to the parking lot.



The intent of avalanche training is to build up the mountaineering skillset within the BCR's Expedition Team. We have another group of BCRs soon to take their AST 1 qualifications, and several then going on to be trained on AST 2, which takes a deeper dive into operating in avalanche terrain. Members of the expedition team are now better prepared for future adventure training challenges.

WORKUP TRAINING FOR EX SUMMIT DUKE IV

Following the success of Ex SUMMIT DUKE III, a 125km trek through the Kananaskis Valley, members of the British Columbia Regiment's expedition team face the ambitious goal of summiting Mount Logan in 2023. Located deep in the Canadian Yukon, Mount Logan is the highest mountain in Canada, and the second-highest peak in North America, after Denali. Working up to that objective, the team has conducted avalanche safety training through February and March of this year, to prepare for an expedition to Mount Rainier in June.



9 members of the team had recently completed Avalanche Safety Training Level 1 (AST-1) in February on Mount Seymour. To build on this training, 7 members of the team undertook Avalanche Safety Training Level 2 (AST-2) in March, spread over two serials. AST-2 continued the training from AST-1, concentrating on the skills required to traverse avalanche-prone areas in the field. In addition, the team had a chance to practise backcountry skiing and ascending using skins — skills critical for an ascent of Mount Rainier and Mount Logan.



After a quick theoretical review in the morning of Day 1, both serials moved out to Mount Seymour for a hands-on review of companion rescue at Brockton point. The rest of the course quickly changed in tone however, and members put their theoretical knowledge to work. First planning 'expedition' traverse routes first at Mount Seymour, and then at Whistler/Blackcomb. Serial two's training culminated in a traverse of the Blackcomb glacier followed by backcountry skiing down 'Body Bag Bowl.'





Weather conditions dramatically changed over the short course period and members gained valuable experience operating in the Alpine; learning that constant terrain evaluation is required to ensure safe and efficient passage.

Overall, AST-2 gave the expedition team a chance to test a multitude of winter backcountry skills in the field. This type of training will prove invaluable for an attempt at Mount Logan and is certainly just the first step in tackling an expedition to the Canadian Yukon.

FOLLOW UP ON REPAIR OF THE "KAISER'S CUP"



Major Hart-McHarg 6th DCOR with World Military Championship Trophy 1913







HMCS Vancouver

The road to high readiness is both exciting and challenging, just ask the crew of HMCS Vancouver. Vancouver just finished their Intermediate Multi-Ship Readiness Training (IMSRT) programme with Sea Training (Pacific) and went straight into exercising with the United States Navy Submarine Commander Course off the coast of Hawaii.

Throughout Readiness Training the crew was assessed by Sea Training on the full range of operational capabilities.

"It was difficult at times, but ultimately it was a hugely beneficial experience," says SLt Christopher McFarlane, bridge watchkeeper.

Vancouver's crew were tested on their ability to respond to a person overboard, search and rescue taskings, fires, and floods. Other capabilities tested included the Naval Boarding Party, the ship's towing ability, and helicopter operations.

Readiness Training concluded with a 48-hour combat scenario.

"Those final 48 hours were intense," says SLt McFarlane. "We were bringing the ship to action stations multiple times a day, trying to defend ourselves against simulated surface, subsurface, and aerial threats. Sea Training aimed to make the exercise as realistic as possible. As the ship sustained simulated battle damage, areas in the ship would be placed out of bounds – some for the entire two-day period and always requiring the crew to adjust in order to maintain effectiveness. If you became a casualty, you were stuck with your simulated injury until the end of the programme."

Despite the difficulty of the training programme, Vancouver's crew came out strong, impressing Sea Training with their ability to adapt and overcome challenges that were thrown their way. Ultimately, Vancouver got the green light for having passed its Readiness Training from the Canadian Fleet Pacific Commodore and Sea Training.

This was another step towards high readiness status as the ship and crew prepare for an operational deployment later in the year.

The crew of Vancouver – or the Battle Cats as they like to call themselves after the ship's gun art – a Cougar pouncing on a Second World War U-boat- weren't about to stop training.

After successful completion of the readiness training programme, the ship went straight on to participate in the USN's Submarine Commander Course with USN submarines. The Canadian warship evaded, tracked, and engaged the submarines. The value of participating in the Submarine Commander Course was two-fold. The Battle Cats gained great experience conducting torpedo evasion and tracking submarines, and USN submarine commanders were able to enhance their own skills by training with a highly capable anti-submarine platform.

It was certainly a busy time at sea for the Battle Cats, but they lived up to their reputation: Battle Cats Don't Stop.





CWO (Ret'd) Mark Arden & Sgt (Ret'd) Heather Arden Chief Warrant Officer Mark T. Arden, MMM, CD

CWO Arden's military life started with the British Columbia Regiment (DCO) when he enrolled with the 2290 Cadet Corps BCR (DCO) in 1975 later transferring to the Reserves in the fall of 1978. In 1984, he led the Unit's contingent of soldiers that provided local security for Pope John Paul II's visit to Vancouver. The BC Regiment won the coveted Worthington Trophy that year for 'Top Armoured Regiment in Canada' and MCpl Arden was awarded the 'Armour Branch Certificate of Merit' - presented to him by Brigadier General Radley-Walters, CMM, DSO, MC, CD. In 1996 WO Arden was recognized for service to the unit and the Brigade with a 'British Columbia District Commanders Commendation'. For service to the unit and the community in 1998, he received the 'Commanding Officers Commendation'. MWO Arden was presented the 'Queen's Jubilee Medal' in 2002 for volunteer work within his community namely: Junior Achievement, GF Strong, Vancouver Christmas Bureau and Dragon Boat Festival and he was subsequently promoted to Chief Warrant Officer in January 2003. CWO Arden served as the Task Force (Yakima) Sergeant Major during Cougar Salvo 2004 and as the Task Force RSM for Domestic Operations 2004/05. CWO Arden completed his first term as RSM on September 15, 2005 and was subsequently 'attached out' to Joint Task Force Pacific, Canada Command as the first South West Regions Primary Liaison Officer. During Operation Pontoon in 2007 CWO Arden received one of JTFP's first Commanders Commendations. CWO Arden has also continued his community volunteer work in support of the City of Vancouver as the Remembrance Day Parade Marshal for 2007 & 08. In 2009 he returned to the Dukes as the first RSM to do a second term. For his dedication and 33 years of service he was named to the Order of Military Merit in November of 2010. 2011 he was attached to 39 CBG as the 2IC for Brigade Recruiting. In April of 2013 he was appointed Brigade Sergeant Major. Completing that post in May 2016 CWO Arden was named RSM 12 (Vancouver) Field Ambulance RSM on 29 July and shortly thereafter RSM of 11 (Victoria) Field Ambulance. CWO Arden retires at the compulsory age with 44 years of service - 19 of those as a Chief Warrant Officer. He and his wife Heather reside in South Vancouver. His son Karl working with the City of Vancouver and daughter Alita is a coast fishing guide.

Editor's Note: I first met CWO Arden when as a Corporal he assigned me to guard the Regimental Command Post Vehicle when I was a newly qualified Trooper on MILCON 1982. As OC A Sqn BCR, he was my Squadron Sergeant-Major for two years from 1994 to 1996 when the Regiment brought home the Dunwoody Trophy for being the Best Armoured unit in Western Canada (a trophy which we won for most of the years of its competition ending in 1996) following in the steps of our predecessors, and was he my SSM in HQ Sqn, before his appointment as RSM. I last worked with him when he was the 39 CBG SM and I was the Assistant Chief of Staff (Admin) in 2013 before my first retirement from the CAF. I also had the pleasure of playing with him for many years at Recreational Ice Hockey and at Regimental Hockey Games. We wish CWO Mark Arden the very best in his retirement.

Battle of Vimy Ridge / General Clark / Brigadier Wilson

One Hundred and Five years ago, at the height of the First World War, on Easter Monday, 1917, in early morning sleet, 49 Battalions of the 100,000-man Canadian Corps rose along a nine-mile line of trenches in Northern France and began to advance against fortified German forces. All four Canadian Divisions moved forward through No Man's Land at a walking pace protected by a well-rehearsed creeping barrage of artillery fire. By nightfall, the Germans had suffered a major setback. Four days later, Vimy Ridge, which other Allied Troops had assaulted previously and failed to capture, was firmly in Canadian hands. It was the first time Canadians had fought as a distinct national army, and in many ways, it was the coming of age for the young nation of Canada.

The Order of Battle that day included the 72nd (Seaforth Highlanders, Vancouver) Battalion as part of the Twelfth Brigade of the Fourth Canadian Infantry Division. This Battalion of "Vancouver's finest" was led by two young lawyers, Lt. Col. John Arthur Clark, and his Second-in-Command, A.D. Wilson. Both Arthur Clark and Alexander Wilson were decorated heroes. Arthur Clark was eventually promoted to the rank of Brigadier General and Alexander Wilson to the rank of Brigadier.

Both men survived the war and returned to their respective practices of law in Vancouver and went on to become founding partners in the merged firm of Clark, Wilson, White, Clark & Maguire. Today known as Clark Wilson LLP.

General Clark, K.C. (as he was known throughout his legal career), went on to further serve his country between the wars as a Member of Parliament representing the Vancouver Burrard constituency for three terms, during which he maintained his busy law practice.

Brigadier Wilson passed away in 1965 and General Clark in 1976.

On this 105th Anniversary of that famous battle, we recognize the role played by the founders of this Firm.



A great evening was enjoyed by all, especially given that no St. Julien Mess Dinner has been held since 6 April 2019 due to the Pandemic.






















ANZAC MEMORIAL DAY PACIFIC NATIONAL EXHIBITION 25 APRIL 2022

In the Loop: Longtime BJ Expat Returns for 2nd Beijing Games

In <u>OlymPicks</u>, we highlight news, gossip and the results of Beijing's 2022 Winter Olympics.

Long-term Beijing resident Richard N. Liu is back in Beijing since moving back home to Canada in 2014 – this time to work for Team Canada in the 2022 Games.

He's not only returning to the city he called home for more than 20 years, he's also working at his second Beijing Olympics. He was a volunteer in the '08 Games as well as Mission Staff for Team Canada at the Paralympics. Now that he's back and working like crazy to prepare for the big event, we asked him a few questions about life inside the "closed loop."

Q What's your role this year at the Olympics?

A I'm part of the Administrative Personnel for the Mission Staff of Team Canada.

Q What parts of the Closed Loop are you in — do you stay in one specific zone or do you move from place to place?

A I'm with our Advanced Team, which arrived over a week ago in the 'Jing. We are located outside the Olympic Village, at a Performance Center, but we have the flexibility to move from venue to venue, and from competition zone to competition zone within the Closed Loop using dedicated transportation such as cars, buses, and the high-speed train up to Yanqing and Zhangjiakou.

Q As a long-term Beijinger, how does it feel to be back in the city? Do you get any of the old "Beijing flavor" inside the loop?

A It's been great and amazing to see the blue skies during the Lunar New Year! We had *jiaozi* during the Lunar New Year's Eve, which nearly brought me to tears. Oh how I missed thee! And I have yet to get a *jianbing*!

Q Speaking of food, what's the food like within the loop? I'd imagine there's got to be so many different tastes and dietary regimes to adhere to.

A Since we are located outside the village at a Performance Center, we're housed in a hotel, so the breakfast buffets are awesome ... there goes my diet! I hope to find some time to visit and experience the food and services closer to the Games though, as I saw some robots taking over the work of cooking.

Q What's the most impressive change you've noticed about Beijing?

A I'll let you know when I get out of the office! We have been working non-stop during pre-games to ensure everything is up and running for our athletes who have already started to arrive.

Q I'd imagine you've got a packed schedule — what's a typical day like? Will you get any breaks/time off to watch any of the games as a spectator?

A I usually get up early in the morning before the sun rises, get my coffee and breakfast, and then head up to the office and work until 9pm ... or longer if things get busy. We have an amazing team of Canadians from coast to coast back home as well as here on the ground, and we keep each other energized and entertained. I took half a day off on Lunar New Year morning to speak with family and friends and will probably do the same for the Lantern Festival. When things quiet down, I do hope to visit the Olympic Village and see a couple of venues if I'm lucky.

Q Organizers are taking some impressive precautionary measures to make sure there isn't a <u>Covid outbreak</u>. How does that play out for you in terms of your day-to-day schedule?

A I had to start doing the Closed Loop bubble prep a couple of weeks before departure in my hometown of Burnaby, just outside of Vancouver, by taking three PCR tests and getting a third booster (I threw in a couple of additional vaccines like the flu shot as well), I've avoided large crowds since Christmas and had daily temperature checks. Also prayed a lot as there was a chance we couldn't get on the plane if we got Covid or if the health declaration wasn't confirmed. However, I thankfully got the green light before departing.

Q And how about after touching down in Beijing?

A We arrived at a very quiet Beijing Capital International Airport and were ushered efficiently through the process, probably the fastest I have ever left T3! Got on the highway and to our Performance Center in no time flat. It's very good to be back in my second hometown, but the part I am missing tremendously is being able to wander outside to hang out with my friends here in Beijing and grab a cold one. Well, at least it's not 1918 and we have WeChat!

Q What events would you recommend the average sports fan tune into during the games?

A Watch everything if you can as it's all amazing, but I am hoping to catch Jamaica's bobsled team as they have a cool Canadian story beginning that was captured by the 1993 movie "Cool Runnings" (find trailer below). I'm also looking forward to the women's monobob, which will be a new discipline for Beijing 2022 to watch out for.





Major Anh Foort

Major Anh Foort escaped war-torn Vietnam as one of the boat people. In July 1979, her family was welcomed as refugees into Canada, a place she now calls home.

Anh joined The Loyal Edmonton Regiment in the Canadian Army Reserve as a finance clerk after completing the Summer Youth Employment Program in 1987. She was accepted to Royal Roads Military College but decided instead to pursue both a civilian and military career. She graduated from Simon Fraser University a year early and holds an Applied Sciences Degree with a major in Communications and a minor in Political Science. In 1989 she transferred to 12 Service Battalion as a Vehicle Technician. In 1999, Major Foort was commissioned in the rank of Second Lieutenant in the Logistics Branch.

Over her extensive military career, Anh has served as a Non-Public Funds Accounts Officer, a Battalion Finance Officer, and as a Supply and Transport Platoon Commander. She has also held company commander positions within 39 Service Battalion.

Major Foort completed the Army Operations Course in 2014 and was promoted to her current rank in 2015. She currently serving as 11 Company Commander, and Company Commander of the Territorial Battalion Group which responds to domestic operations in British Columbia.

In her civilian career, Anh is a Manager of Injury Services with the Insurance Corporation of British Columbia (ICBC). She joined ICBC in 1996 and has moved through the corporation rapidly from Claims

Adjuster to her current position.

Major Foort has volunteered with the Vancouver Police Victims Service Unit, Immigrant Service Society Host and Leadership Program, and the Vietnamese Canadian Seniors' Society. She is currently an executive board member for the Chinese Canadian Military Society and the President of the Mess Committee of the Sherman Armoury Officers' Mess.

Anh and her husband Peter reside in Richmond, BC. Their daughter Ayden is studying Communications at Simon Fraser University.



Lieutenant-Colonel Vincent Virk

Lieutenant Colonel Vincent Virk joined the Canadian Armed Forces (Army) Primary Reserves in 2001 as an Armoured Reconnaissance Officer. He has held various positions including Officer Commanding Reconnaissance Squadron, Regimental Second in Command and Chief Instructor of 39 CBG Training Establishment. He is currently the Commanding Officer of the British Columbia Regiment (Duke of Connaught's Own) which is an Armoured Cavalry Regiment in Vancouver, BC.

He has supported domestic operations on two occasions as the Domestic Response Company Commander with Operation LENTUS (2018) in the fight against the BC Wildfires and most recently with Operation LASER (2020) as part of CAF pandemic response plan.

He attended the University of British Columbia and completed various military courses such as the Information Operations Course at the Peace Support Center and the Joint Command and Staff Programme (Advance Joint Warfare Stream) with the Canadian Armed Forces College. In 2013 he was awarded the Queens Diamond Jubilee medal for his efforts in recruitment diversity.

When not in uniform he is President of the Pallas Group of Companies, which focuses on vertically integrated hospitality-based businesses from conception, development, acquisition, and operations. As an avid industry advocate, he has formerly held the roles with the Intercontinental Hotel Group Owners Association as Chair of the Canada Region and Vice-Chair for the Americas Region. In 2021 he was inducted as a Fellow of the Royal Canadian Geographic Society.

He lives with his wife and two daughters in North Vancouver, BC and is an avid skier, hiker, and reader.



Lieutenant-Commander Justin Wong

Lieutenant-Commander Justin Wong has Malaysian heritage, and he grew up in West Vancouver, B.C. Justin enrolled in the Canadian Armed Forces in the late 1990's under the Regular Officer Training Plan (ROTP) attending McGill University in Montreal, Q.C., and graduating with a Bachelor of Commerce. On completion of his initial Royal Canadian Navy training, he joined the Pacific Fleet in 2003. Justin first served onboard Her Majesty's Canadian Ship (HMCS) Algonquin as a bridge watch-keeper, and then specialized as the ships Anti-Submarine Warfare Director until 2007. On completion of his director tour, he became a Clearance Diving Officer and went on to lead a dive team during Operation PODIUM at the Vancouver Olympics in 2010.

In 2011, Justin was selected for a Canadian Armed Forces member posted Outside of Canada (OUTCAN) role, and he became the Officer in charge of Royal Navy's Northern Diving Unit in Faslane, Scotland and Southern Unit 2 in Portsmouth, England. He earned the British Armed Forces Joint Service improvised explosive device (IED) qualification and conducted bomb disposal and IED operations under Operation TAPESTRY in Northern Ireland and Scotland. During this time, he also qualified as a North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO) Submarine Rescue Supervisor and conduced multiple NATO exercises around Europe.

In 2014, he returned back to Canada and was appointed the Executive Officer of Fleet Diving Unit (Atlantic), where he continued to support Arctic operations and dive training missions in the Caribbean.

In 2016, Justin completed his Operations Room Officer (ORO) Course and served onboard two navy ships as the Weapons Officer. Deployed on Operation RENAISSANCE, the humanitarian and relief mission to Turks and Caicos and Dominica Island in 2017, followed by a deployment on Operation REASURANCE as part of a NATO mission in the Baltic Sea, and a subsequent deployment on Operation SEA GUARDIAN as part of a further NATO mission off the Syrian coast in 2018.

Justin was later posted ashore to Naval Fleet School (Atlantic) before assuming duties as the Operations Division Commander, followed by Deputy Commandant.

In 2021, Lieutenant Commander Wong was appointed the Commanding Officer of Fleet Diving Unit

(Pacific).



Major Lewis Williams

Major Lewis Williams was born in Mississauga, ON, and raised in Georgetown, ON, from a British father, and a Malaysian-born Chinese mother. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) in 2005, under the Regular Officer Training Plan while attending the University of Western Ontario Commercial Aviation Management Program where he received his Multi-IFR rating, key step in progressing to type ratings on larger airplanes, and commercial pilot licenses.

After completion of his degree, he went on to earn his Pilot Wings in 2010 as a Helicopter Pilot, being first posted to 103 Search and Rescue (SAR) Squadron in Gander, NL, where he trained for two years to become a SAR Aircraft Commander on the CH149 Cormorant Helicopter flying over 1,000 hours on type there.

In 2016, he was then fortunate enough to be posted to Comox, B.C., to 442 Transport and Rescue Squadron, where he went on to earn qualifications as a Maintenance Test Pilot, Training and Standards Pilot, Instructor Pilot and eventually become the Chief Check Pilot of the squadron. Now on his third posting, he was sent to be the Cormorant Pilot Representative on the Search and Rescue Standardization and Evaluation Team (SARSET) which oversees standards for the entire fleet of Cormorant Helicopters in Canada. He was promoted to his current rank of Major in January 2021, and currently has over 2,500 hours on the CH149.

Lewis has approximately 17 years of service and hopes to retire one day in Comox. In his spare time he enjoys coaching and playing on the base volleyball team, or spending it with his girlfriend outside mountain biking, snowboarding or hiking.



TOMMY WONG AND CONTRIBUTIONS OF CHINESE CANADIANS

T. Wat: I rise today to honour the remarkable life of Tommy Wong — originally from a small town on Vancouver Island, Tommy's heroic life and legacy both as a veteran and an advocate for B.C.'s Chinese-Canadian community.

When the Second World War broke out, like hundreds of other young Chinese-Canadian men, Tommy wanted to serve his country. Although most were initially rejected by the Canadian army due to their race, once Japan entered the war and invaded large areas of Southeast Asia, suddenly Chinese Canadians were considered valuable soldiers. They could blend into the populations of Asia and carry out clandestine work.

Tommy participated in operations throughout Southeast Asia as a member of Force 136, a special executive operations group that helped establish, train and supply resistance movements in Japanese-occupied territories and undertake contesting sabotage operations. Tommy's heroism not only cemented his legacy in our history books; the incredible work throughout the latter half of his life has helped to cement the legacy of all Chinese Canadians in our history books.

I had the honour of working closely with Tommy during my time as the Minister Responsible for Multiculturalism when I worked with the Chinese-Canada delegation through our legacy initiatives, where we unveiled plaques commemorating Chinese-Canadian historical sites in Barkerville, in Ashcroft in Kamloops and many others, honouring Chinese Canadians and their contributions to our province's history.

Our province has lost a wonderful and passionate community leader, and many have lost a great friend and family member. My heart goes out to all that were close to Tommy, who I know will miss him dearly.

Please join me in honouring the incredible life of Tommy Wong.

THE BARRETT BUNKER MAY 2022


For this edition of the Barrett Bunker, I have decided to edit and include a short article with respect to the battle of St Julien at the 2nd Battle of Ypres from the pen of Sgt Dwayne Snow, CD. The story is pertinent to our Regiment's history as it portrays not only the confusion and uncertainty when lost as a soldier during battle, but also recognizes the importance of the Arrival of the Indian Army at a critical time in the Battle to replace the badly mauled 1st Canadian Division after three days of intense battle commencing with the release of poisonous gasses on the French Colonial Troops and later upon our Canadians. That they held the line and stopped the German advance towards Ypres is a testament to their determination and resolve.

Sgt Snow's source for materials came from a CBC interview in the 1960s and from the Vancouver Sun and Province newspapers.




7th Battalion (BC) CEF Shoulder Badge

Pte H McArthur had just turned fourteen years old when he enlisted in the 6th Duke of Connaught's Own Rifles in Vancouver in 1912. He had lied about his age, so that he could be on parade for the Duke of Connaught's visit. The Duke of Connaught being both our Colonel-in-Chief and the Governor-General for the Dominion of Canada. Pte McArthur found himself a member of the 7th Battalion (1st BC) Canadian Expeditionary force in Belgium at the age of approximately sixteen.



Germans unleash Chlorine Gas on the French Colonial troops April 1915

Following the chlorine gas attack on the French and the ordering of the 7th into the line during the fighting near the village of St Julien, Pte McArthur manage to survive the intense fighting near Keerselare Crossroads and the subsequent withdrawal. He found himself with roughly 200 to 300 survivors rallied behind Gravenstafel Ridge, a few hundred metres south of St. Julien as it was being overrun by the Germans. The 7th Bn had not been resupplied with water or rations for over 24 to 48hrs so finding water was big priority. Pte McArthur and some his comrades were tasked to go fill up as many canteens as they could carry at a well close behind, the now occupied village of St. Julien, and ultimately both he and the water party were captured by the Germans.



The Germans soldiers which were tasked to escort the Canadian Prisoners of War to the rear found themselves lost, and they demanded that one of the prisoners tell them where they were and the way to the

German lines. When not one of the PWs stepped forward, the Germans threatened to shoot them right there and then. Pte McArthur figured he would have some fun with the Germans, and hopefully get them captured, so he volunteered to lead the Germans to 'their lines'. His comrades were not too happy with him. Pte McArthur dutifully led the Germans... the wrong way, to the west and past Kitchener's Wood toward the flanking British units that were located in the shadow of Mauser Ridge. Pte McArthur was lucky, as the Germans made him lead the way. As they passed in front of the British lines a British platoon failed to see that the bulk of the party were Canadian Prisoners. They opened fire and killed or wounded everyone except Pte McArthur! After the ambush, the British did what they could for the survivors before advancing on Mauser Ridge.

Pte McArthur now found himself attached to two Northumberland Fusiliers of the 149th Brigade. It's not clear, but it sounds like they had been survivors of their assault on Mauser Ridge. He was almost captured again when he and his new friends were ambushed by some Germans, who were probably also lost themselves. He survived but the other two did not. Pte McArthur inherited one of the Northumberland's Lee-Enfield Mark III Rifles, which he thought were much better than his Ross Rifle which had become non-serviceable back at Keerselare Crossroads.

Next, he then found sanctuary with the recently arrived Lahore Division. Over the next two or three days, Pte McArthur found himself in the front line fighting alongside members of the Lahore Division. He did not mention unit names when he was interviewed by the CBC in the early 1960s but mentioned that there were Gurkhas in the firing line. Apparently, the Lahore Division soldiers took great care of him as he was quite young and "Canadian." They let him stay in their trench and shoot at the Germans but would not let him join in their assault on Mauser Ridge on the 26th to 27th of April as he had already done his bit...which of course saved his life.



Pte McArthur clearly recalled that even though there was a French casualty collection station nearby, the soldiers in the Lahore Brigades refused to see them for treatment, stating that they, the Sikhs, and the Gurkhas, were not French. They were British and would only trust British medics. He described the Indian troops as literally bleeding to death in the trench, rather than seek aid from the French!

On investigation of the 7th Bn and other pertinent War Diaries and records, it appears that Pte McArthur had stumbled first into the British 149th Northumberland Brigade, who shot the German captors and their

Canadian prisoners up, and then as he kept moving west toward Ypres, he bumped into the lines of the Jullunder and Ferozepore Brigades of the Lahore Division of the Indian Army. He must have found refuge right in the middle of the Lahore Disivison's line as the Gurkhas were to the west and the Sikhs to the right of the Lahore line facing north. Sikh Regiments included in the Jullundar Bde included the 15th Ludhiana Sikhs, now perpetuated by the 2nd Bn, 2nd Sikh Regiment of the Indian Army, the 47th Sikhs and the 59th Scinde Rifles (Frontier Force) currently perpetuated by the Pakistan's 1st Bn, Frontier Force. The Gurkhas Pte McArthur mentioned in his CBC interview were probably from the 1st Bn, 1st King George's Own Gurkha Rifles (The Malaun Regt) or the 1st Bn, 4th Gurkha Rifles, now perpetuated by the 1st Gurkha Rifles of the Indian Army.

It sounds like Pte McArthur fought with the soldiers of the Lahore Division for several days before being sent off to find his own 7th Battalion CEF, which he did, eventually, and happy day, he did not get charged for losing his Ross Rifle!

As for Pte McArthur....

Pte McArthur served through the rest of the War and miraculously lived through every one of the 7th Battalion's battles and even took part in the 7th's famous trench raid in November 1915! By 1917, he had risen to the position to Company Sergeant-Major at the age of eighteen (19) at a time when the average age in the battalion was close to 30. As CSM he refused to give his men more than one shot of rum before an attack as he had seen men with more one shot in them try to bayonet Germans instead of the more sensible "shooting them with your rifle". CSM McArthur apparently took great effort to make sure they had that one shot of rum to deal with "nerves". CSM McArthur recalled that in 1917 he had some trouble from some recently arrived replacements from a draft of Rocky Mountain Rangers who apparently thought he was rather young for a CSM and that he could be bullied. CSM McArthur quickly sorted them out.

CSM McArthur was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal (DCM) at Hill 70. The citation below does not indicate it, but he fought most of the battle completely deaf as two shells bracketed his head as he lay in no mans land and he had blood pouring out of both ears. Stretcher Bearer, and VC winner, Pte Micky O'Rourke, tried to evacuate him but CSM McArthur waved him off as there so few NCOs left at that point. Sgt Snow noted that in the CBC interview that CSM McArthur was shouting a little!



Distingushed Conduct Medal 1914 - 1918

The Commanding Officer of the 7th Bn CEF at Hill 70, Major Philpott, noted that CSM McArthur was one of the few originals left by the time of the battle, and commented that CSM McArthur claimed,"...with legitimate pride that he had never missed a show!" At that point in the war, less than one in ten of the originals were still fighting with the battalion. CSM McArthur's citation for the DCM at Hill 70 reads: 17252 Company Sergeant-Major McArthur, H., DCM: "For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in leading his platoon to their objective. Afterwards he took forward a party in support of troops holding an advanced position through very heavy fire."

THE BRITISH COLUMBIA REGIMENT (DUKE OF CONNAUGHT'S OWN) MUSEUM SOCIETY

BCR MUSEUM – WWI GERMAN SHOULDER BOARDS

Sgt Dwayne Snow introduced some discussion among the Museum Society Members with respect to the origin of the WWI German Shoulder Boards in the Museum's possession and their origins. The origin of how they came into the possession of our collection is a bit hazy as they were there when almost forty years ago if not longer. It is believed that they were donated by a former member of the 7th Bn CEF (BC). It is possible that they were donated by more than one member, but if any of our readers can shed further light upon their origins, please send me a note at barrettjd007@gmail.com and include Sgt Snow at dhsnow@shaw.ca.

From Sgt Snow:



Looking at the unit histories the only common deployments that I can see are the Somme and Cambrai sectors in 1918. However, the **Königlich Sächsisches Reserve-Infanterie-Regiment Nr. 245** (aka the **Royal Saxon 245th Regt**) fought against the 7th Bn CEF at the battle of St. Julien in 1915, and later in 1918 near Cambrai during the final 100 days. So that one should probably have pride of place in our collection. Thus, if these items did come to us from one of our vets, it seems likely to me that he was not an original, but rather one who served in 1918, or if an older vet, then he started his collection in the last six months of the War.

None of these are from Prussian units or Bavarian/ Wurtemburgers (who our guys fought a lot from 1915-17), but six shoulder boards come from units raised in the East. Three from Pomerania and Kulm, what is now mostly Poland, and another three from Saxony...Schlesisches = Saxon). One is from just outside Frankfurt in Hesse (Hessisches). All served in different divisions. All were infantry regiments. Five of them had combat experience on the Russian Front (in modern Poland) - and one even got to spend some time fighting in the Carpathian Mountains/ Romania and then the Tyrolian Alps (brrrrr and double-brrrrr). With the exception of the 330th all were in high category (strength) divisions - the 330rd was made up of Ersatz "volunteers" - older or medically impaired conscripts that had exemptions (but they were not considered "unfit" e.g. poor eyesight, no teeth, or too many kids back home. These would have been during the initial call up of reserves and was a "category IV" formation.

When looking at our shoulder boards they all appear to be of the same design which was standardized in 1910. The piping on some of them looks pretty faded and some don't even have piping, which apparently happened near the end of the War - which makes me further believe these were all mostly collected in the last six months of the War.

6. Pommersches Infanterie-Regiment Nr. 49

Formed in 1860; fought in Austro-Prussian War and Franco-Prussian War. At outbreak of Great War was part of II Korps garrison at Gnesen, Pomerania (now Gniezno, Poland) and fought on the Western Front throughout the War except for a brief period in 1915 when it was transferred to the East. Shoulder Board: white piping, red number 49

Kulmer Infanterie-Regiment Nr. 141

Formed in 1890; At outbreak of War was in garrison at Strasburg and der Drewenz (now Brodnica, Poland). Initially served on Eastern Front at the Battles of Masurian Lakes and Tannenberg. Transferred to Western Front in 1916, fought on Somme and Cambrai.

Shoulder Boards: Yellow piping, red number 141

4. Schlesisches Infanterie-Regiment Nr. 157

Formed in 1897. Initially garrisoned at Brieg (now Brzeg, Poland) as part of IV Korps. They initially fought on the Western Front, but were transferred to Romania in 1916, then the Italian Front in 1917 and finally to the Western Front in 1918.

Shoulder Boards yellow piping with red number 157

5. Grossherzoglich-Hessisches Infanterie- Regiment Nr. 168

Formed 1897; garrison was Offenbach-am-Main (it's now a suburb of Frankfurt, Germany). Fought entirely on the Western Front on the Marne, Somme and at Cambrai.

Shoulder Boards: Red piping, red number 168

Königlich Sächsisches Reserve-Infanterie-Regiment Nr. 192

Formed in Saxony as part of the 192nd (8th Royal Saxon) Infantry Division in 1915. Fought on Western Front: Verdun 1916 and 1917, 1918 on the Ancre and the Somme, ended War in the Champagne Sector.

Königlich Sächsisches Reserve-Infanterie-Regiment Nr. 245

Formed in Sep 1914, in Saxony; saw its first action in October 14 on the Western Front, fought against 1 Can Division at 2nd Ypres. It later fought at the Somme (1916) and was then sent to the East. Returning to the Western Front in Dec of 1917, participated in the German Spring Offensive and again on the Somme in 1918, before ending the War in the Verdun Sector.

Infanterie-Regiment Nr. 330

Formed in June 1915 from Ersatz Kompanies of the 2nd Occupation Regiment at Posen. It fought on the Eastern Front until the Russian surrender, then was transferred as part of the 83rd Division to the West where it fought on the Somme in August of 1918 before being sent to Lorraine in September. Title may have been "Reserve-Infanterie-Regiment Nr. 330" but data on this regiment is almost non-existent.

A SHORT HOISTORY OF THE 102nd CANADIAN INFANTRY BATTALION, CEF (THE NORTH BRITISH COLUMBIANS)

Recently, I travelled to Comox to visit the Comox Valley Museum and Archives and in doing so, found myself meeting with the very impressive archivists working there, who are very familiar with the early history of the 102nd Battalion, CEF, who trained there in preparation for posting to The Western Front in 1915.

Many of you are aware that this Battalion was raised and trained in Comox, under the leadership of Lt.-Col. John Weightman Worden, CD. The original group of approximately 1,065 officers and men were largely recruited from persons living in the Interior of British Columbia as far north as Atlin, B.C., including recruiting at Prince Rupert, Prince George, Nelson and Vernon, B.C., arriving in Comox in December 1915.

It is evident from what was made available to me for this article that the 102nd is still remembered in Comox, including at the Cenotaph.

Much of the training and preparation that took place in Comox took place in walking distance from the Museum and Archives, located at 1720 Comox Avenue in Comox. Some of the training took place at Goose Spit, now a public park and RCN Cadet training (HMCS Quadra) area located at the entrance to Comox Harbour, pictured below:

The Museum has an impressive holding of indexed and documented artifacts and Battalion History related to the 102^{nd} , with the 102^{nd} prominently on display. If you find yourself in Comox, this is not to be missed.

I was given access to their collection of cards, some of which I colourized for this article and have provided copies to the archivists in Comox. Where available, I have colourized imagery of some of the locations where the 102nd trained prior to shipping out.

Sgt. Martin Gerald Joyce, 28th Canadian Armoured Regiment (BCR) (for the period c. 1942 – 1945)

This is an article about a member of the 28th Armoured Regiment (Worthington Force), his love story with his wife Elaine and the locket that includes the cap badge emblem of the British Columbia Regiment (DCO).

To start me off with researching this article, Bill Whalen, our President provided me with some background, as follows:

"Mr Robert Tetu, who lives in Seaforth, Ontario is a former Lieutenant in the Highland Fusiliers of Canada. He was good friends with Mr Martin Joyce and his wife, Elaine. Martin was born in 1905 in Wales where as a young man, he worked in the coal mines then subsequently immigrated to Canada. He served during WW II with the British Columbia Regiment, 28th CAR. Early in the war, he met Ms. Elaine Austin who was from Wetaskiwin, Alberta. In September of 1940, Martin gave Elaine a beautiful engagement gift, a gold locket and chain, with the British Columbia Regiment cap badge on the front. Inside were photos of Martin (in uniform) and Elaine. The back was inscribed "Elaine Martin Sept. 1940" They were married in June 1941, and Martin was one of the lucky ones who eventually made it home.

After the war, Martin attended Alfred University in Alfred, New York, where he received a certificate of Craftsmanship in Woodworking on 30 January 1948. Elaine also attended and studied ceramics. Following that, they moved to Banff, Alberta, where he became Superintendent of Property at the Banff School of Fine Arts. He subsequently moved to Ontario, where he worked as head carpenter at the world famous (Shakespearean) Stratford Festival from 1955 until his retirement. Martin died in November 1992. This beautiful locket will be placed on display in the museum, as a testament to Martin's service to his country and his lifelong romance with Elaine. "

The British Columbia Regiment (DCO) Museum Society recently received a locket dating to 1940 for its' collection from a close friend of Sgt. Martin Gerald Joyce, Lt. (Retd.) Robert Tetu, formerly of the Irish Fusiliers of Canada. Mr. Tetu knew both Mr. and Mrs. Joyce well, and acted as Mr. Joyce's executor when he passed in 1992, which is how came into possession of the locket. He felt the locket should come to the Museum, as the Joyce's were without issue. I would like to acknowledge Mr. Tetu's generosity in time and his sharing information for this article.

Background on Martin Gerald Joyce

Here is some background on Martin Gerald Joyce

Birth: 16 November 1905, Tonypandy (Pontypridd), Glamorganshire, Wales

Death: November 8, 1992, Stratford, Perth, Ontario, cremated

Parents: Lawrence Joyce (Irish ancestry), Mary Ann Cunningham, (Wales ancestry)
Lawrence Joyce was a colliery pumpman, and while in Wales. Martin was a coal miner.

Marriage: Margaret Elaine Austin, 21 June 1941, Elaine was from Wetaskiwin, Alberta

Canadian Citizenship Date: September 5, 1947

Military

Regimental Number: K38052

I located a link to the 28th Armoured Division Nominal Roll:

Two Joyces appear, Martin appears as a Sergeant in the N.C.O. section, Regimental Number K38052, the other appears as Private H.C.F. Joyce, probably not related to Martin. Private Joyce appears to have survived the war as well as Martin.

No information is currently available on Sgt. Joyce's Military engagements, his military awards, or the date he was discharged from the Canadian Military. A request for his Military Service Record has been submitted and will be added later, if and when received.

Occupations

Martin worked in coal mines in Wales prior to moving to Canada, date currently unknown. He does not show up on the 1921 Census, as a result locating his arrival date In Canada may be problematic without requisitioning Ontario and Alberta records.

After the end of hostilities, Martin attended Alfred University, Alfred New York, see:

https://www.alfred.edu. There, Martin received a Certificate of Craftsmanship in Woodworking on 30 January 1948, and Elaine studied ceramics and carried on with her work in pottery for some years, probably until her unexpected death during a visit to Edmonton.

Following receiving his Certificate, he moved to Banff, Alberta, where he became Superintendent of Property at The Banff School of Fine Arts and later as a co-instructor with the Saskatchewan Arts Board, Regina, Saskatchewan.

Mr. Joyce subsequently moved to Ontario, working as head carpenter at the Stratford Festival from 1955 until his retirement. By my estimate, that date was circa 1970. I have located him in the Perth City Directory of 1961, so I have contacted Stratford Festival Archives looking for background and if available, imagery.

He died 8 November 1992, presumably in Stratford/Perth, I have posted an obituary request on Obituary Lookups, I have not yet been able to locate his location of burial or that of his spouse. Mr. Tetu advised that his death was from complications from esophageal cancer, he died in palliative car. There is a Martin Joyce buried in St. Catherine's Ontario, a two hour drive from Stratford, which may or not be our Martin.

Recently we learned that one of our few remaining 28th Armoured Regiment (BC) World War II veterans had passed away. Keith Moore of Barriere, BC, passed away at the age of 99 on 21 July 2021. Born in Enderby, his family relocated to Port Coquitlam, where he grew up. He joined the BC Regiment in 1942, and served in England, France, and Germany. In recent years he awarded the National Order of the Legion of Honour of France for his efforts in the Normandy invasion and the liberation of France.

His obituary indicated, "That Keith eventually settled in the Barriere region where he worked as a logger, a farmer, and a millwright, and he became an active and respected member of his community. Early in the 1960s, Keith took on the enormous task of raising his four children. He was a devoted father who loved to dance and sing and gather with his extended family and friends.

Keith was a founding member of the Royal Canadian Legion branch in Barriere, which he helped create in 1953. He was involved in establishing the first ambulance service in Barriere with the help of the Lions Club, served as volunteer Fire Chief, volunteered at the Senior Centre and the Rural Crime Watch, as well as devoting time to many other community organizations. Keith was honoured to receive Barriere's Citizen of the Year in 2012, and the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal for his spectacular contributions to his community."

We will remember him!










