We will remember them!










Civilian Instructor Stan Clarke instructing Army Cadets

Growing up in the Lower Mainland of British Columbia, MCpl (Ret'd) Stan Clark's first exposure to the military was going on army cadet exercises with his Scottish father, a British Army Veteran and member of the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF).

Enjoying the rigours of mountain climbing and experiencing the outdoors of B.C. and the Yukon were the impetus for Stan to join the Navy League and eventually the Army Cadets. "My passion for the mountains was ignited when I attended a cadet leadership course in Banff and then subsequently an Outward Bound adventure in Wales," says Stan.

Stan's Korean mom was less enthusiastic about his desire to join a military organization due to her agonizing memories of life in North Korea and having to escape its oppressive military regime. She was fortunate enough to escape to South Korea with some of her siblings but unfortunately not all family members in North Korea able to flee. Additionally, she had endured the demands of being a military spouse. She feared her son joining the CAF, as that would mean a life of going on dangerous deployments and being in harms way — similar to her husband's experience. However, when she saw how being part of a cadet unit created a sense of belonging, purpose and comradeship for Stan, she eventually relented and gave her blessing.

Stan started his military career as a Reservist with the Royal Westminster Regiment (R Westmr R). He eventually transferred into the Regular Force and became a member of the 1st Battalion of the Royal Canadian Regiment (RCR).

Despite serving in the elite Canadian Airborne Regiment as a young paratrooper, Stan left full-time service to finish high school and examine other career options. He returned as a Reservist to the R Westmr R and was able to share his newfound skills acquired in the Regular Force.

After the brief hiatus, Stan realized that he missed the structure and employment opportunities that the

Ayant grandi dans le Lower Mainland en Colombie-Britannique, le caporal-chef (à la retraite) Stan Clark a vécu sa première expérience avec l'armée en participant aux exercices des cadets avec son père écossais, vétéran de l'armée britannique et membre des Forces armées canadiennes (FAC).

Les rigueurs de l'alpinisme et du plein air en Colombie-Britannique et au Yukon sont des éléments qui ont incité Stan à se joindre à la Ligue navale et plus tard aux Cadets de l'Armée. « J'ai découvert que j'aimais la montagne quand j'ai suivi un cours de leadership pour cadets à Banff, puis quand j'ai participé à une excursion avec Outward Bound au Pays de Galle », raconte Stan.

La mère coréenne de Stan ne partageait pas l'enthousiasme de son fils qui voulait s'enrôler dans un organisme militaire parce qu'elle avait des souvenirs pénibles de la vie en Corée du Nord et qu'elle avait dû échapper au régime militaire oppressif de ce pays. Elle avait réussi à s'enfuir en Corée du Sud avec une partie de ses frères et sœurs, mais tous les membres de sa famille n'avaient pas réussi à fuir. Elle avait aussi dû endurer ce qui est attendu d'une femme de militaire. Elle craignait que son fils ne s'enrôle dans les FAC parce que cela signifiait pour lui une vie de missions et de situations dangereuses, comme celle de son mari. Toutefois, quand elle a vu combien les cadets ont apporté un sentiment d'appartenance, un sens du devoir et un esprit de solidarité à son fils Stan, elle a fini par céder et par lui donner sa bénédiction.

Stan a commencé sa carrière militaire comme réserviste avec le Royal Westminster Regiment (R Westmr R). Il est ensuite passé dans la Force régulière et est devenu membre du 1^{er} bataillon du Royal Canadian Regiment (RCR).

Même s'il avait servi dans le Régiment aéroporté d'élite du Canada en tant que jeune parachutiste, Stan a quitté le service à temps plein pour terminer ses études secondaires et explorer d'autres perspectives de carrière. Il est revenu comme réserviste au R

Regular Force offered, so he rejoined. His postings and deployments included Operation HARMONY in the former Yugoslavia, 3rd battalion RCR (Parachute Company), and then getting posted to CFB Suffield and rebadging to the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (PPCLI). Stan deployed on Operation APOLLO (first rotation into Afghanistan) in 2001.

Unfortunately, Stan was injured during a friendly fire incident at Tarnak Farms while participating in live fire ranges. An unintentional 500-lb bomb was dropped on Stan's platoon, killing four soldiers and injuring many more. Thus began Stan's journey toward mental, physical and spiritual health. He was finally posted to the 39th Brigade in Vancouver, where he was given the opportunity to heal and start his medical release from the CAF.

Stan found that he received significant help from the physician's assistant at CF Health services, who encouraged him to share his experience with other wounded members. This was his first exposure to peer support, which he continues to advocate for today.

Today, Stan uses his military skills and love for the great outdoors to support his recovery. He shares his experiences with other Veterans and hosts outdoor events so that fellow military members can find healing through physical activity and comradeship. He works with his local army and air cadets units, where he can continue to mentor and provide guidance to Canadian youth.

Westmr R et a pu mettre à profit ses nouvelles compétences dans la Force régulière.

Durant ce bref crochet, Stan a compris que l'encadrement et les possibilités d'emplois dans la Force régulière lui manquaient, ce qui fait qu'il a réintégré les rangs. Il a été envoyé en affectation et déployé avec l'opération HARMONY en ex-Yougoslavie et le 3^e bataillon du RCR (compagnie de parachutistes), avant d'être affecté à la Base des Forces canadiennes Suffield, rebaptisée la Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry. Stan a aussi été déployé dans le cadre de l'opération APOLLO (première rotation en Afghanistan) en 2001.

Malheureusement, Stan a été blessé par un tir fratricide à la ferme de Tarnak alors qu'il participait à un exercice de tir réel. Une bombe de 500 livres a été lâchée par erreur sur le peloton de Stan, tuant quatre soldats et en blessant de nombreux autres. C'est ainsi qu'a commencé le cheminement de Stan vers la santé mentale, physique et spirituelle. Il a été affecté à la 39^e Brigade à Vancouver, où il a pu se remettre et commencer sa vie après sa libération des FAC pour raisons médicales.

Stan a senti toute l'aide que lui apportait l'adjoint du médecin des Services de santé des Forces canadiennes, qui l'a encouragé à raconter son histoire à d'autres membres blessés des FAC. Il a ainsi pu vivre sa première expérience de soutien par les pairs, une méthode de soutien dont il se fait encore maintenant l'apôtre.

Aujourd'hui, Stan mise sur ses compétences militaires et son amour du plein air pour faciliter son rétablissement. Il parle de son vécu à d'autres vétérans et organise des activités en plein air pour que l'activité physique et la camaraderie puissent contribuer à leur guérison. Il travaille aussi avec des unités locales de l'armée et des cadets de l'air, avec lesquelles il peut continuer à servir de mentor et de conseiller auprès des jeunes du Canada.

Lieutenant Tim Chi Lee's family emigrated from Hong Kong in the 1980s and settled in East Vancouver. The Lee family was eager to integrate into the Vancouver lifestyle Tim Chi's childhood was similar to his peers — going to school, playing hockey and hanging around with friends. Despite being born in Vancouver, at times, Tim Chi felt like an outsider. People would ask him about his background. They would ask, "Where are you from?" When he'd reply that he's from Vancouver, the usual follow-up question was, "No, where are you really from?" Thankfully, this was a rare occurrence in the diverse and multicultural city of Vancouver. However, Tim Chi experienced a difficult childhood that later manifested itself as depression and anger.

The impetus to join the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) came from Tim Chi's father, who regaled him with stories of what the Canadian military had accomplished on the world stage. "My father believed that serving in the Canadian Armed Forces was noble, that it was a force for good," says Tim Chi. At a young age, Tim Chi's mother encouraged him to enroll in the Navy League Program, where he revelled in the structure, sense of belonging and comradeship that the program provided.

After high school, Tim Chi joined the British Columbia Regiment (Duke of Connaught's Own), an Armoured Reconnaissance unit of the Army Reserves. During his time with the British Columbia Regiment (BCR), Duke of Connaught's Own (DCO). He enjoyed driving, especially vehicles with a manual transmission, and learning the Armoured Recce trade. "I was given every opportunity to succeed," Tim Chi explains. He felt that he was continually supported by both his peers and the chain of command in his endeavours.

During his initial years in the military, Tim Chi was able to operate within a military environment because he didn't have the mental space to feel or focus on anything other than training. This would eventually catch up to him "I didn't deal with it until it began to interfere with my work," he adds.

In 2008 when Tim Chi was working full-time at the local Brigade Headquarters, he discovered that he wasn't able to cope or ignore the depression that was starting to take a toll on his life. "There would be days that I just wasn't functional. I would regularly miss work, ignore phone calls, lock myself at home for the day, or have panic attacks

La famille Lee n'a pas hésité à embrasser le mode de vie vancouvérois. Tim Chi a connu une enfance semblable à celle de ses pairs : l'école, le hockey et du bon temps avec les copains. Pourtant, même s'il était natif de Vancouver, Tim Chi avait parfois le sentiment d'être un étranger. Les gens l'interrogeaient sur son parcours, du genre « D'où viens-tu? » Et lorsqu'il répondait qu'il était de Vancouver, on lui répliquait la plupart du temps : « Non, mais d'où viens-tu vraiment? » Heureusement, ces situations étaient anecdotiques puisque Vancouver est une ville diversifiée et multiculturelle. Mais malgré cela, Tim Chi a connu une enfance difficile qui s'est plus tard manifestée par une dépression et de la colère.

C'est le père de Tim Chi qui l'a incité à joindre les rangs des Forces armées canadiennes (FAC), en lui relatant avec intérêt les exploits des militaires canadiens à l'échelle internationale. « Mon père pensait qu'il y avait quelque chose de noble à servir dans les Forces armées canadiennes, qu'il considérait comme un allié du bien. » Sous l'influence de sa mère, le jeune Tim Chi s'est inscrit au programme de la Ligue navale, où il a découvert la camaraderie, le sentiment d'appartenance et le milieu structuré qui faisaient partie intégrante du programme.

Après ses études secondaires, Tim Chi s'est joint au British Columbia Regiment – BCR (Duke of Connaught's Own – DCO), une unité de reconnaissance blindée de la Réserve. Il adorait conduire des véhicules, particulièrement ceux à transmission manuelle, et c'est au sein du BCR qu'il a appris avec grand plaisir les rudiments des missions de reconnaissance blindée. « On m'a donné toutes les chances de réussir », avoue Tim Chi. Ce dernier a toujours senti qu'il avait l'appui de ses pairs et de la chaîne de commandement dans tout ce qu'il entreprenait.

Pendant ses premières années de service dans l'armée, Tim Chi est parvenu à évoluer au sein d'un contexte militaire car il n'accordait aucun espace mental à ses émotions, l'entraînement demeurant son unique préoccupation. Cela a fini par le rattraper : « Je n'ai pas prêté attention à cette situation jusqu'à ce qu'elle commence à nuire à mon travail », ajoute-t-il.

En 2008, alors que Tim Chi travaillait à temps plein au quartier général de la brigade locale, il a constaté qu'il

when stressed. There were two concurrent triggers that really brought on my realization that I needed professional help. First, my inability to keep a regular schedule was starting to lead to disciplinary actions at work," Tim Chi explains.

While some of his co-workers and supervisors questioned Tim Chi's reliability, others recognized the signs and symptoms of depression and steered him towards Canadian Forces Health Services to get help. Concurrently, his girlfriend at the time saw how he was dealing with stress in an extremely unhealthy way and urged him to seek professional help. "These two intersections led me to the realization that I could not keep packing down and/or running away from feeling, but that I had to work through the things that were in my head," he adds.

Tim Chi started to work with a social worker at HQ and began unpacking what the root causes were. He was then was referred to a counsellor who specialized in military and police clients, "I was given the opportunity to learn coping mechanisms as well as how to understand, reframe, and work through a lot of the trauma, pain, and anger that I had been carrying with me," says Tim Chi. Despite the stigma and potential career implications, Tim Chi persevered. "...at that point in my life, I had no other choice. I was either going to lose my [military career] for disciplinary issues, or I could work to improve the situation," he adds. Tim Chi had hit bottom and decided to seek help.

Tim Chi's experience dealing with his mental health diagnosis was difficult, especially within his family and the Asian community. At that time, some members of the community never discussed or actively avoided the topic of mental health. "My parents were extremely shocked to find out that I was seeking professional help for mental health related issues. They didn't understand what it meant to seek the help of mental health professionals and just wanted me to get fixed quickly. I had to explain that the road to recovery would be a process that wasn't going to happen overnight," he says. His perseverance paid off.

Thankfully Tim Chi continued seeking help and went on to have a fulfilling career in the CAF. "I recognize[d] that I was extremely blessed at that time to have one supervisor who believed in my potential and helped me through the mental health system."

n'arrivait plus à gérer la dépression qui commençait à perturber sa vie, ni à en faire abstraction. « Certains jours, je n'arrivais tout simplement pas à fonctionner. Je m'absentais régulièrement du travail, je ne répondais pas au téléphone, je me réfugiais chez moi pour la journée, ou encore je faisais des crises de panique lorsque j'étais stressé. Puis, deux éléments déclencheurs simultanés sont arrivés dans ma vie, et c'est à ce moment que j'ai pris conscience que j'avais besoin d'une aide professionnelle. D'abord, parce que je n'arrivais plus à respecter un horaire régulier, j'ai commencé à faire l'objet de mesures disciplinaires au travail », explique Tim Chi.

Alors que certains de ses collègues et de ses superviseurs mettaient en doute la fiabilité de Tim Chi, d'autres ont reconnu chez lui les signes et les symptômes de la dépression, et ils n'ont pas hésité à l'orienter vers les Services de santé des Forces canadiennes afin qu'il obtienne de l'aide. Au même moment, sa petite amie de l'époque a constaté qu'il réagissait de façon très malsaine au stress et l'a incité à demander de l'aide professionnelle. « Ces deux interactions m'ont amené à prendre conscience que je ne pouvais pas continuer à réprimer ou à fuir mes émotions, mais que je devais me résoudre à examiner ce qui se passait dans ma tête », ajoute-t-il.

Tim Chi a commencé à consulter un travailleur social du QG et à explorer l'origine profonde de ses problèmes. On l'a ensuite dirigé vers un conseiller spécialisé auprès de la clientèle militaire et policière. « Il m'a amené à développer des mécanismes d'adaptation, puis à comprendre, à recadrer et à surmonter une grande partie des traumatismes, de la douleur et de la colère que je cultivais en moi », explique Tim Chi. Malgré la stigmatisation qu'il risquait de subir et les conséquences auxquelles il s'exposait par rapport à sa carrière, Tim Chi a persisté. « À ce moment-là de ma vie, je n'avais pas d'autre choix : soit je renonçais à ma carrière militaire pour des enjeux disciplinaires, soit je m'efforçais d'améliorer la situation », ajoute-t-il. Tim Chi avait touché le fond et a décidé de demander de l'aide.

Composer avec un diagnostic de santé mentale a été difficile pour Tim Chi, surtout auprès de sa famille et de la communauté asiatique. À l'époque, certains membres de la communauté n'abordaient pas ou évitaient délibérément le sujet de la santé mentale. « Mes parents ont été particulièrement bouleversés d'apprendre que je consultais un professionnel pour des problèmes de santé

After a period of time leadership responsibilities were entrusted to Tim Chi early in his career, and he grew as a leader to become a Senior Non-commissioned Officer (NCO) within the regiment. He took on significant leadership roles with the BCR and was recognized by the unit leadership for his dedication and work ethic.

He has fond memories of the Primary Leadership Qualification (PLQ) course, where he and his course mates were pushed beyond their physical and mental limits. While some of his peers lamented the experience, Tim Chi relished in the challenge. Some career highlights include deployment on domestic operations such as Op LENTUS in 2017 and the various opportunities to travel at home and abroad. Tim Chi has seen every province in the nation, travelled to Europe to participate in regimental battlefield tours, and climbed Mt Kilimanjaro in east Africa with members of the BCR.

During his time in the Intermediate Leadership Program, a national course for progression to the rank of Warrant Officer, Tim Chi was challenged by one of his peers to pursue a career as an officer in the CAF.

After considerable reflection and being action oriented, Tim Chi decided to see if he had what it takes to be a pilot in the Royal Canadian Air Forces. After a rigorous selection process, he was one of three selected applicants out of twenty applicants. Finally, the dream to fly aircraft in the CAF was becoming a reality.

Tim Chi credits his time in the army and the support of family and friends for his success. A serious commitment to his faith, family, and physical and mental wellness helps him manage the demands of military life. He is encouraged by the fact that the CAF has come a long way in the realm of mental health, and well-being for its members. "Back then they didn't have peer sentinels and the briefings on mental health still seemed quite "distant" or inaccessible when discussed among junior ranks. I also felt the stigma of having these issues come from my family history, rather than from an operational stress injury," Tim Chi explains. Today there is specific mental wellness training for all rank levels that helps create awareness, reduce stigma and train supervisors.

He currently works in the Operational Support Squadron at 19 Wing Comox. Tim Chi appreciates how fortunate he is

mentale. Ils ne comprenaient pas ce que signifiait de demander de l'aide d'un professionnel en santé mentale : ils voulaient seulement que je me dépêche à me remettre sur pied. J'ai dû leur expliquer que le chemin vers la guérison était un processus qui ne se réalisait pas du jour au lendemain », raconte-t-il. Sa persévérance a porté fruit.

Heureusement, Tim Chi a continué de consulter et a connu une carrière enrichissante au sein des FAC. « Je reconnais qu'à l'époque, j'ai eu la chance incroyable d'avoir un superviseur qui croyait en mon potentiel et qui m'a aidé à aborder le système de santé mentale. »

Après un certain temps, il s'est vu confier des responsabilités de leadership, si bien qu'il a gravi les échelons au sein du régiment jusqu'à devenir sous-officier supérieur. Tim Chi a d'ailleurs assumé d'importants rôles de direction au sein du BCR et a été reconnu par l'unité de commandement pour son dévouement et son éthique du travail.

Il garde de bons souvenirs de sa formation de qualification avancée en leadership, où lui-même et ses camarades de classe avaient dû se surpasser, tant sur le plan physique que psychologique. Tim Chi se souvient d'avoir apprécié ce défi, alors que certains de ses pairs avaient trouvé l'expérience particulièrement éprouvante. Parmi les faits saillants de sa carrière, il souligne les déploiements lors d'opérations nationales comme l'Opération LENTUS en 2017, ainsi que ses diverses occasions de voyager au pays comme à l'étranger. Tim Chi a parcouru toutes les provinces au pays, s'est rendu en Europe pour faire la tournée des champs de bataille où son régiment a combattu, et a escaladé le mont Kilimanjaro en Afrique de l'Est en compagnie d'autres membres du BCR.

Alors qu'il suivait le programme de leadership intermédiaire (une formation nationale pour obtenir le grade d'adjudant), c'est l'un de ses collègues qui l'a incité à faire carrière comme officier dans les FAC.

Après mûre réflexion et écoutant son côté proactif, Tim Chi a voulu voir s'il avait ce qu'il faut pour devenir pilote dans l'Aviation royale canadienne. Au terme d'un processus exigeant menant à la sélection de 3 candidats sur un total de 20, il a finalement été retenu : son rêve de piloter un aéronef des FAC devenait réalité... and looks to each day with gratitude, and embraces the opportunity to serve Canada.

Tim Chi attribue son succès aux années passées dans les forces armées et au soutien de ses amis et de sa famille. Pour mieux affronter les difficultés de la vie militaire. il mise sur sa détermination, le soutien de sa famille et son bien-être physique et mental. Il est rassuré de savoir que les FAC ont beaucoup progressé dans le domaine de la santé mentale et du bien-être au bénéfice de leurs membres. « À l'époque, on ne disposait d'aucune sentinelle de pairs, et les séances d'information sur la santé mentale ne semblaient pas concerner les militaires des rangs inférieurs et elles leur étaient inaccessibles. Je me suis également senti stigmatisé par le fait que mes problèmes découlaient de mes antécédents familiaux, et non d'une blessure de stress opérationnel », explique Tim Chi. De nos jours, on offre aux militaires de tous les grades une formation spécialisée en matière de bien-être qui contribue à sensibiliser les militaires, à réduire la stigmatisation et à former les superviseurs sur le sujet de la santé mentale.

Il évolue actuellement au sein de l'Escadron de soutien aux opérations du 19^e Escadre Comox. Tim Chi se considère choyé, et il vit chaque journée avec gratitude en savourant sa chance de servir le Canada.



Graham Thompson Lyall signed his CEF Attestation papers on September 24, 1915 at St. Catherine's Ontario with the 81st Battalion, with the rank of Lieutenant. He reported that he had

previous experience with the XIXth Regiment for about one year. His profession was listed as Mechanical Engineer.

He served in WWI: Canadian Expeditionary Force, 102nd Infantry Battalion (North British

Columbians), later renamed 102nd Infantry Battalion (Central Ontario) in 1917.

Rank: Lieutenant

Regimental Number: 158528

Victoria Cross

Meet Lieutenant Graham Thomson Lyall of the 102nd Infantry Battalion.

#OnThisDay in 1918 (sic 27 September 1920),

"Lieutenant Lyall led his platoon in an advance while fighting in Bourlon Wood near Cambrai in France. He and his men outflanked a German position and captured 13 prisoners, four machine guns and a field gun.

Later the same day, his platoon came up against another enemy strongpoint. With his platoon weakened by the day's fighting, Lieutenant Lyall charged the enemy alone and single-handedly killed the officer in charge and took 45 prisoners and five machine guns. He then led his men to their final objective and took another 47 prisoners.

Finally, a few days later, Lyall assaulted another enemy position, and captured another 80 German prisoners and 17 machine guns."

Whilst leading his platoon against Bourlon Wood, the leading company was held up by a strong point, which he captured by a finnk movement, together with thirteen prisoners, one field gun, and four machine-guns. Later, his platoon, much weakened by casualties, was held up by machine-guns at the southern end of Bourlon Wood. Collecting any men available, he led them towards the strong point, and springing forward alone, rushed the position single-banded and killed the officer in charge, subsequently capturing at this point 45 prisoners and five machine-guns. Having made good his final objective, with a further capture of 47 prisoners, he consolidated his position. During two days of operations Lieut. Lyali captured in all 3 officers, 182 other ranks, 26 machine-guns, and one field gun.

Lyall was promoted to Acting Lieutenant Colonel as a result of his actions at Cambrai in 1918. It appears that he achieved the formal rank of Captain in the Canadian Overseas Military Forces, and subsequently Captain in the Royal Engineers by the end of hostilities. 





The following profile of Lieutenant Tim Chi Lee was originally published by **ATLAS INSTITUTE FOR VETERANS AND FAMILIES** and is reproduced verbatim herein with their very kind permission.









Lieutenant Tim Chi Lee's family emigrated from Hong Kong in the 1980s and settled in East Vancouver. The Lee family

Le lieutenant Tim Chi Lee et sa famille ont émigré de Hong Kong dans les années 1980 pour s'établir dans le was eager to integrate into the Vancouver lifestyle Tim Chi's childhood was similar to his peers — going to school, playing hockey and hanging around with friends. Despite being born in Vancouver, at times, Tim Chi felt like an outsider. People would ask him about his background. They would ask, "Where are you from?" When he'd reply that he's from Vancouver, the usual follow-up question was, "No, where are you really from?" Thankfully, this was a rare occurrence in the diverse and multicultural city of Vancouver. However, Tim Chi experienced a difficult childhood that later manifested itself as depression and anger.

The impetus to join the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) came from Tim Chi's father, who regaled him with stories of what the Canadian military had accomplished on the world stage. "My father believed that serving in the Canadian Armed Forces was noble, that it was a force for good," says Tim Chi. At a young age, Tim Chi's mother encouraged him to enroll in the Navy League Program, where he revelled in the structure, sense of belonging and comradeship that the program provided.

After high school, Tim Chi joined the British Columbia Regiment (Duke of Connaught's Own), an Armoured Reconnaissance unit of the Army Reserves. During his time with the British Columbia Regiment (BCR), Duke of Connaught's Own (DCO). He enjoyed driving, especially vehicles with a manual transmission, and learning the Armoured Recce trade. "I was given every opportunity to succeed," Tim Chi explains. He felt that he was continually supported by both his peers and the chain of command in his endeavours.

During his initial years in the military, Tim Chi was able to operate within a military environment because he didn't have the mental space to feel or focus on anything other than training. This would eventually catch up to him "I didn't deal with it until it began to interfere with my work," he adds.

In 2008 when Tim Chi was working full-time at the local Brigade Headquarters, he discovered that he wasn't able to cope or ignore the depression that was starting to take a toll on his life. "There would be days that I just wasn't functional. I would regularly miss work, ignore phone calls, lock myself at home for the day, or have panic attacks when stressed. There were two concurrent triggers that really brought on my realization that I needed professional

Tim Chi a connu une enfance semblable à celle de ses pairs : l'école, le hockey et du bon temps avec les copains. Pourtant, même s'il était natif de Vancouver, Tim Chi avait parfois le sentiment d'être un étranger. Les gens l'interrogeaient sur son parcours, du genre « D'où viens-tu? » Et lorsqu'il répondait qu'il était de Vancouver, on lui répliquait la plupart du temps : « Non, mais d'où viens-tu vraiment? » Heureusement, ces situations étaient anecdotiques puisque Vancouver est une ville diversifiée et multiculturelle. Mais malgré cela, Tim Chi a connu une enfance difficile qui s'est plus tard manifestée par une dépression et de la colère.

C'est le père de Tim Chi qui l'a incité à joindre les rangs des Forces armées canadiennes (FAC), en lui relatant avec intérêt les exploits des militaires canadiens à l'échelle internationale. « Mon père pensait qu'il y avait quelque chose de noble à servir dans les Forces armées canadiennes, qu'il considérait comme un allié du bien. » Sous l'influence de sa mère, le jeune Tim Chi s'est inscrit au programme de la Ligue navale, où il a découvert la camaraderie, le sentiment d'appartenance et le milieu structuré qui faisaient partie intégrante du programme.

Après ses études secondaires, Tim Chi s'est joint au British Columbia Regiment – BCR (Duke of Connaught's Own – DCO), une unité de reconnaissance blindée de la Réserve. Il adorait conduire des véhicules, particulièrement ceux à transmission manuelle, et c'est au sein du BCR qu'il a appris avec grand plaisir les rudiments des missions de reconnaissance blindée. « On m'a donné toutes les chances de réussir », avoue Tim Chi. Ce dernier a toujours senti qu'il avait l'appui de ses pairs et de la chaîne de commandement dans tout ce qu'il entreprenait.

Pendant ses premières années de service dans l'armée, Tim Chi est parvenu à évoluer au sein d'un contexte militaire car il n'accordait aucun espace mental à ses émotions, l'entraînement demeurant son unique préoccupation. Cela a fini par le rattraper : « Je n'ai pas - prêté attention à cette situation jusqu'à ce qu'elle commence à nuire à mon travail », ajoute-t-il.

help. First, my inability to keep a regular schedule was starting to lead to disciplinary actions at work," Tim Chi explains.

While some of his co-workers and supervisors questioned Tim Chi's reliability, others recognized the signs and symptoms of depression and steered him towards Canadian Forces Health Services to get help. Concurrently, his girlfriend at the time saw how he was dealing with stress in an extremely unhealthy way and urged him to seek professional help. "These two intersections led me to the realization that I could not keep packing down and/or running away from feeling, but that I had to work through the things that were in my head," he adds.

Tim Chi started to work with a social worker at HQ and began unpacking what the root causes were. He was then was referred to a counsellor who specialized in military and police clients, "I was given the opportunity to learn coping mechanisms as well as how to understand, reframe, and work through a lot of the trauma, pain, and anger that I had been carrying with me," says Tim Chi. Despite the stigma and potential career implications, Tim Chi persevered. "...at that point in my life, I had no other choice. I was either going to lose my [military career] for disciplinary issues, or I could work to improve the situation," he adds. Tim Chi had hit bottom and decided to seek help.

Tim Chi's experience dealing with his mental health diagnosis was difficult, especially within his family and the Asian community. At that time, some members of the community never discussed or actively avoided the topic of mental health. "My parents were extremely shocked to find out that I was seeking professional help for mental health related issues. They didn't understand what it meant to seek the help of mental health professionals and just wanted me to get fixed quickly. I had to explain that the road to recovery would be a process that wasn't going to happen overnight," he says. His perseverance paid off.

Thankfully Tim Chi continued seeking help and went on to have a fulfilling career in the CAF. "I recognize[d] that I was extremely blessed at that time to have one supervisor who believed in my potential and helped me through the mental health system."

After a period of time leadership responsibilities were entrusted to Tim Chi early in his career, and he grew as a leader to become a Senior Non-commissioned Officer

En 2008, alors que Tim Chi travaillait à temps plein au quartier général de la brigade locale, il a constaté qu'il n'arrivait plus à gérer la dépression qui commençait à perturber sa vie, ni à en faire abstraction. « Certains jours, je n'arrivais tout simplement pas à fonctionner. Je m'absentais régulièrement du travail, je ne répondais pas au téléphone, je me réfugiais chez moi pour la journée, ou encore je faisais des crises de panique lorsque j'étais stressé. Puis, deux éléments déclencheurs simultanés sont arrivés dans ma vie, et c'est à ce moment que j'ai pris conscience que j'avais besoin d'une aide professionnelle. D'abord, parce que je n'arrivais plus à respecter un horaire régulier, j'ai commencé à faire l'objet de mesures disciplinaires au travail », explique Tim Chi.

Alors que certains de ses collègues et de ses superviseurs mettaient en doute la fiabilité de Tim Chi, d'autres ont reconnu chez lui les signes et les symptômes de la dépression, et ils n'ont pas hésité à l'orienter vers les Services de santé des Forces canadiennes afin qu'il obtienne de l'aide. Au même moment, sa petite amie de l'époque a constaté qu'il réagissait de façon très malsaine au stress et l'a incité à demander de l'aide professionnelle. « Ces deux interactions m'ont amené à prendre conscience que je ne pouvais pas continuer à réprimer ou à fuir mes émotions, mais que je devais me résoudre à examiner ce qui se passait dans ma tête », ajoute-t-il.

Tim Chi a commencé à consulter un travailleur social du QG et à explorer l'origine profonde de ses problèmes. On l'a ensuite dirigé vers un conseiller spécialisé auprès de la clientèle militaire et policière. « Il m'a amené à développer des mécanismes d'adaptation, puis à comprendre, à recadrer et à surmonter une grande partie des traumatismes, de la douleur et de la colère que je cultivais en moi », explique Tim Chi. Malgré la stigmatisation qu'il risquait de subir et les conséquences auxquelles il s'exposait par rapport à sa carrière, Tim Chi a persisté. « À ce moment-là de ma vie, je n'avais pas d'autre choix : soit je renonçais à ma carrière militaire pour des enjeux disciplinaires, soit je m'efforçais d'améliorer la situation », ajoute-t-il. Tim Chi avait touché le fond et a décidé de demander de l'aide.

Composer avec un diagnostic de santé mentale a été difficile pour Tim Chi, surtout auprès de sa famille et

(NCO) within the regiment. He took on significant leadership roles with the BCR and was recognized by the unit leadership for his dedication and work ethic.

He has fond memories of the Primary Leadership Qualification (PLQ) course, where he and his course mates were pushed beyond their physical and mental limits. While some of his peers lamented the experience, Tim Chi relished in the challenge. Some career highlights include deployment on domestic operations such as Op LENTUS in 2017 and the various opportunities to travel at home and abroad. Tim Chi has seen every province in the nation, travelled to Europe to participate in regimental battlefield tours, and climbed Mt Kilimanjaro in east Africa with members of the BCR.

During his time in the Intermediate Leadership Program, a national course for progression to the rank of Warrant Officer, Tim Chi was challenged by one of his peers to pursue a career as an officer in the CAF.

After considerable reflection and being action oriented, Tim Chi decided to see if he had what it takes to be a pilot in the Royal Canadian Air Forces. After a rigorous selection process, he was one of three selected applicants out of twenty applicants. Finally, the dream to fly aircraft in the CAF was becoming a reality.

Tim Chi credits his time in the army and the support of family and friends for his success. A serious commitment to his faith, family, and physical and mental wellness helps him manage the demands of military life. He is encouraged by the fact that the CAF has come a long way in the realm of mental health, and well-being for its members. "Back then they didn't have peer sentinels and the briefings on mental health still seemed quite "distant" or inaccessible when discussed among junior ranks. I also felt the stigma of having these issues come from my family history, rather than from an operational stress injury," Tim Chi explains. Today there is specific mental wellness training for all rank levels that helps create awareness, reduce stigma and train supervisors.

He currently works in the Operational Support Squadron at 19 Wing Comox. Tim Chi appreciates how fortunate he is and looks to each day with gratitude, and embraces the opportunity to serve Canada.

de la communauté asiatique. À l'époque, certains membres de la communauté n'abordaient pas ou évitaient délibérément le sujet de la santé mentale. « Mes parents ont été particulièrement bouleversés d'apprendre que je consultais un professionnel pour des problèmes de santé mentale. Ils ne comprenaient pas ce que signifiait de demander de l'aide d'un professionnel en santé mentale : ils voulaient seulement que je me dépêche à me remettre sur pied. J'ai dû leur expliquer que le chemin vers la guérison était un processus qui ne se réalisait pas du jour au lendemain », raconte-t-il. Sa persévérance a porté fruit.

Heureusement, Tim Chi a continué de consulter et a connu une carrière enrichissante au sein des FAC. « Je reconnais qu'à l'époque, j'ai eu la chance incroyable d'avoir un superviseur qui croyait en mon potentiel et qui m'a aidé à aborder le système de santé mentale. »

Après un certain temps, il s'est vu confier des responsabilités de leadership, si bien qu'il a gravi les échelons au sein du régiment jusqu'à devenir sous-officier supérieur. Tim Chi a d'ailleurs assumé d'importants rôles de direction au sein du BCR et a été reconnu par l'unité de commandement pour son dévouement et son éthique du travail.

Il garde de bons souvenirs de sa formation de qualification avancée en leadership, où lui-même et ses camarades de classe avaient dû se surpasser, tant sur le plan physique que psychologique. Tim Chi se souvient d'avoir apprécié ce défi, alors que certains de ses pairs avaient trouvé l'expérience particulièrement éprouvante. Parmi les faits saillants de sa carrière, il souligne les déploiements lors d'opérations nationales comme l'Opération LENTUS en 2017, ainsi que ses diverses occasions de voyager au pays comme à l'étranger. Tim Chi a parcouru toutes les provinces au pays, s'est rendu en Europe pour faire la tournée des champs de bataille où son régiment a combattu, et a escaladé le mont Kilimanjaro en Afrique de l'Est en compagnie d'autres membres du BCR.

Alors qu'il suivait le programme de leadership intermédiaire (une formation nationale pour obtenir le grade d'adjudant), c'est l'un de ses collègues qui l'a incité à faire carrière comme officier dans les FAC.

Après mûre réflexion et écoutant son côté proactif, Tim Chi a voulu voir s'il avait ce qu'il faut pour devenir pilote dans l'Aviation royale canadienne. Au terme d'un processus exigeant menant à la sélection de 3 candidats sur un total de 20, il a finalement été retenu : son rêve de piloter un aéronef des FAC devenait réalité...

Tim Chi attribue son succès aux années passées dans les forces armées et au soutien de ses amis et de sa famille. Pour mieux affronter les difficultés de la vie militaire, il mise sur sa détermination, le soutien de sa famille et son bien-être physique et mental. Il est rassuré de savoir que les FAC ont beaucoup progressé dans le domaine de la santé mentale et du bien-être au bénéfice de leurs membres. « À l'époque, on ne disposait d'aucune sentinelle de pairs, et les séances d'information sur la santé mentale ne semblaient pas concerner les militaires des rangs inférieurs et elles leur étaient inaccessibles. Je me suis également senti stigmatisé par le fait que mes problèmes découlaient de mes antécédents familiaux, et non d'une blessure de stress opérationnel », explique Tim Chi. De nos jours, on offre aux militaires de tous les grades une formation spécialisée en matière de bien-être qui contribue à sensibiliser les militaires, à réduire la stigmatisation et à former les superviseurs sur le sujet de la santé mentale.

Il évolue actuellement au sein de l'Escadron de soutien aux opérations du 19^e Escadre Comox. Tim Chi se considère choyé, et il vit chaque journée avec gratitude en savourant sa chance de servir le Canada.

followed the presentation. The regular business meeting of CCMMS with Judge Wong in the chair concluded the morning's proceedings.








BATTLEFIELD TOUR ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING 12 JULY 2022

CSM Robert Hill Hanna VC Memorial Statue Unveiling Ceremony 20th August 2022 Lower Square Kilkeel

On the evening of the 20th of August 2022, a gathering took place in the Lower Square of Kilkeel, Northern Ireland, UK, to hold an unveiling ceremony of a statue to the memory of CSM, Robert Hill Hanna, VC, from the 29th Battalion (Vancouver Regiment) Canadian Expeditionary Force who was awarded the Victoria Cross for his bravery at Hill 70 in August 1917.

Attending a reception at the Shomberg Society's Hall on the 18th and the unveiling ceremony on the 20th from Canada were CSM Hanna's son, Mr. Robert (Bob) Hanna, his wife Trudy, and their family, including a number of Great-Grandchildren. Also in attendance were members of the Orange Lodge of Ontario, who assisted with fundraising, local supporters including the Ulster-Scots Agency, The Northern Ireland Memorial Museum, the Kilkeel Development Association, and Lt-Col (Ret'd) James D. Barrett, CD, BCR Association President. There were other organizations, charities and individuals who contributed and donated towards the raising of the statue. The base of the statue is made from a Granite block from the Mourne Mountains.

This project began two years prior as an endeavour of the Schomberg Society, which was formed in 1998 by local Ulster-Scots whose primary aim was to preserve and promote all aspects of their culture including history, language and traditions in their community located in the ancient Kingdom of Mourne. As part of that desire to preserve their history, they decided to honour CSM Hanna in his home town. Stone Sculptor David weir of D.W. Stone Studio was retained to make the statue.



The first welcoming reception on the Thursday the 18th was hosted by Mr. James Donaldson, who organized most of the event, and James gave a detailed presentation on what the Schomberg Society was about, and the statue project. The attendees were entertained by both highland dancing and the playing of two of the large Lambeg drummers who also played at the unveiling. Bob Hanna and his family were interviewed by both the BBC and Irish TV the following day. The Schomberg Society also acknowledged the assistance of the BCR Association and BCR Museum in helping with the details of CSM Hanna's uniform to ensure period correctness.

Although the morning of the 20th of August started with a rainy drizzle, as the day progressed, however, the skies cleared and by the time the parade through Kilkeel started at 1830 hrs, the sun was coming out. A cousin of Bob Hanna's, Ossie Wallace, kindly drove Lt-Col Jim Barrett for a tour of the area, prior to his joining with the other veterans attending the ceremony where they followed the second of two bands through the town from the water, the upper square and down to the lower square where they were dismissed, and the attendees took their seats. Also in attendance were the Mayor of Kilkeel, Charlie Casey, and the President of the Schomberg Society. The ceremony's Master-of Ceremony was Lt-Col (Retired) Kingsley Donaldson, from the Royal Tank Regiment, and all rose for the arrival of the Lord Lieutenant of Northern Ireland, who arrived with his Aide, a full Colonel from Canada stationed in the UK.



Following introductions and a prayer led by Reverend William Bingham, Bob Hanna and his son, Bob, unveiled the statue of his father, CSM Hanna.



Lt-Col Jim Barret was called forward to read the Victoria Cross Citation for CSM Hanna:

"For most conspicuous bravery in attack, when his company met with most severe enemy resistance and all

the company officers became casualties. A strong point, heavily protected by wire and held by a machine gun, had beaten off three assaults of the company with heavy casualties. This Warrant Officer under heavy machine gun and rifle fire, coolly collected a party of men, and leading them against this strong point, rushed through the wire and personally bayonetted three of the enemy and brained the fourth, capturing the position and silencing the machine gun. This most courageous action, displayed courage and personal bravery of the highest order at this most critical moment of the attack, was responsible for the capture of a most important tactical point, and but for his daring action and determined handling of a desperate situation the attack would not have succeeded. CSM Hanna's outstanding gallantry, personal courage and determined leading of his company is deserving of the highest possible reward."



Memorial wreaths were then laid by the statue following its dedication by Reverend Bingham and performances included the Northern Ireland Military Wives Choir, Schomberg Society Lambeg Drummers, the reading of a poem 'Bob's Story 1956' by Neil Cousins, and a playing of 'Hill 70' by Piper Mark Smyth.

Overall, we thank the community of Kilkeel, and the Schomberg Society form organizing an impressive and thoughtful recognition of CSM Robert Hill Hanna, and their warm hospitality shown to of all of us from Canada who attended.

CEREMONY OF REMEMBRANCE CANADIAN MONUMENT, DIKSMUIDE, BELGIUM BELGIUM – CANADIAN REMEMBRANCE COMMITTEE 24 AUGUST 2022

A Ceremony of Remembrance was held at the Canadian Monument ("Liberationmonument") in Diksmuide on August 24th, 2022. Official Wreaths were placed at the Canadian Monument by Wannes Dejaegher, a member of BCRC- LEKE and Wim Vandenbussche President of the Belgian Canadian Remembrance Committee - LEKE (BCRC- LEKE) and by Ludwig Vandenbussche, Secretary of BCRC- LEKE - Member of the Belgium-Canada Association.













Greetings Dukes,

I write to you from Beirut, Lebanon where I have been deployed for the past 2 months as part of Operation IMPACT. Op IMPACT is part of Canada's whole-of-government approach to the Middle East with the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) mission to build the military capabilities of Iraq, Jordan, and Lebanon, and set the conditions for their long-term success.

As a component of Op IMPACT, the aim of the Canadian Training Assistance Team – Lebanon (CTAT-L) is to conduct capacity-building activities with the Lebanese Armed Forces (LAF). Currently, those activities include Combat First Aid, Advanced Winter Survival & Mountain Ops, Logistics Mentorship and Civil-Military Cooperation (CIMIC). For those unfamiliar with CIMIC, it can be defined as, "a military capability that supports the commander's mission by establishing and maintaining essential coordination and cooperation between the military force and civil actors, enhancing situational awareness in the area of operations."

Along with my team, we delivered an Instructor Standardization package with war game rehearsal and facilitated the delivery of the Advanced CIMIC Planners Course, which aims to qualify officers to deliver CIMIC effects at the Brigade level. The course was attended by 20 LAF officers and centred on the Operational Planning Process (OPP) and the CIMIC Officer's planning and advisory role with respects to the civil environment during Brigade offensive operations. As there is no equivalent Army Operations Course (AOC) for LAF officers until their Company Commander's Course, both OPP and staff functions were relatively new concepts for the students. The LAF instructors were all experienced CIMIC operators with the key difference between NATO CIMIC and LAF CIMIC, is the latter primarily conducts domestic, homeland CIMIC instead of expeditionary operations beyond their borders. With the current economic challenges combined with the flood of refugees from war-ravaged Syria, the LAF CIMIC is conducting operations on a near daily basis with many of their leaders bloodied in combat with Daesh on their Eastern Border.

As most have read, Lebanon has suffered a massive economic crisis, which has continued to deteriorate over the past 3 years with inflation exceeding 215%. Food price inflation is nearly double at 400% with the USD-LBP exchange rate collapsing by 95%. Soldiers who once earned \$1200 USD/month are now taking home as little as \$50/month with many having to resort to second and third jobs and literally struggling to make ends-meat (out of necessity, a vegetarian diet is encouraged). As the most respected institution in the country, the LAF is considered a critical pillar of stability and though officers and soldiers are grappling to earn a decent salary, they remain committed to their motto, "Honor, Sacrifice, Loyalty."

Of trade specific interest, I had the opportunity to visit the premier Armoured Regiment in country. Equipped with M60 and M48 MBTs, the LAF impressed me with their ability to keep these aging steel beasts operational. In addition to American tanks, each combat Brigade has an integral Armoured Battalion equipped with T54/55s. The Regiment will soon be augmented by a small number of M2 Bradley IFV's, donated by the USA. Regardless of nation and language, there is a natural kinship amongst the community of armoured warriors.

As my deployment comes to a close, I think what will always resonate with me is the remarkable hospitality, humility, humour, and incredible resiliency that defines the people of Lebanon.


BCR (DCO) FAMILY DAY HMCS DISCOVERY 27 AUGUST 2022

Off Hwy 1, take Kananaskis Valley turn off. Please note you now need to purchase a conservation park pass to make any stops in the park. It's located at the second dam, North Interlakes turn off. (Go to Panorama, but instead of turning right into Panorama, turn left up the hill) You need to walk across the dam & you should come up to a large rock with the plagues and a nice view of the mountains. There are many hiking trails and camping areas to explore in the park as well.

THE BARRETT BUNKER SEPTEMBER 2022

For this edition of the Barrett Bunker, I thought it timely to look at how the face of the Regiment has changed over time in terms of its ethnic make-up from its founding 139 years ago to the present day.

It should come as no great surprise to anyone that the Regiment in its earliest days as the Provisional BC Regiment of Garrison Artillery was largely recruiting from the white populations of New Westminster, Victoria, Nanaimo, and Vancouver. With the most numerous members coming from England, Wales, Scotland, and Ireland.



So too it was when you look at the lists of recruits signed up in the Great War 1914-19 and the make up of our first fighting battalion, the 7th Battalion (1st BC Regiment) CEF. Although the senior officers and NCO

were largely a mix of 6th DCOR (CO) Irish Fusiliers of Canada (2IC), etc., the companies of soldiers were also drawn from the Seaforth Highlanders of Canada, the 104th Westminster Fusiliers, The Earl Grey Rifles, and the retired British Army Veteran's living in the interior and the Kootenays. Our follow up battalions included the 29th (Vancouver) and the 102nd Battalion (North British Columbia) CEF. We would be amiss if we did not acknowledge the other battalions raised which were broken up for reinforcements as the war and need for replacements progressed.



158th Duke of Connaught's Own (Overseas Battalion) CEF Raised in Vancouver 1915, Trained at Vernon Military Camp (above) and broken up for reinforcements on arrival in UK January 1917.

The soldiers in addition to those whose ancestors came from the United Kingdom included other European Nationalities and Indigenous volunteers who served as well. At least one officer in the 7th Bn CEF was black.



Pte Francis 'Frank' Gott 102nd (North BC) CEF T'itq'et (Lillooet) First Nations Served 1916 - 1917

This takes us to our story of the Chinese-Canadian Soldiers who served with the BC Regiment for many years after 1946. Many of these soldiers were raised in Vancouver and were recruited by the Canadian Army for service in WWII against the Japanese. Trained by the Special Operations Executive for covert operations conducting reconnaissance and surveillance, they were trained at Commando Bay on Okanagan Lake before being operationally assigned to Force 136 under British Command in South-East Asia. At least

thirteen of the soldiers had been parachuted behind enemy lines prior to the surrender of Japan. Four won the Military Medal for their bravery in action and all survived.

Following the war, many of these veterans joined the BC Regiment and served for many years, including during the Fraser Valley Flooding of 1948. Their Troop Officer, Captain Douglas Jung became the first Chinese-Canadian Member of Parliament in Ottawa in 1957 when he was elected to represent Vancouver Centre. It is also important to remember that these men served faithfully our nation without the right to vote, which was restored in 1947.

Jumping forward, the make-up of the Regiment reflected the changing of our society and by the time I joined in the early 80s there were multiple ethnic groups represented, with many indigenous members, and our soldiers came from all over the Lower Mainland out to Mission. Current soldiers of the BC Regiment (DCO) can speak in at least nineteen different languages and reflect the current makeup of our society and nation. All proud Dukes!

THE BRITISH COLUMBIA REGIMENT (DUKE OF CONNAUGHT'S OWN) MUSEUM SOCIETY



Lt. Col. Archibald Woodbury McLelan, 121st Battalion, CEF, (1884 – 1966)

Introduction

Archibald Woodbury McLelan was a product of the 11th Regiment (Irish Fusiliers of Canada) and latterly the 121st Battalion, CEF, here follows a short discussion located at Memorybc.ca:

The 11th Field Regiment

The 11th Regiment (Irish Fusiliers of Canada) was organized ca. 1913 and combined with the Vancouver Regiment in 1936 to form the Irish Fusiliers of Canada (Vancouver Regiment In 1946 the Regiment became the 65th Light Anti-Aircraft Regiment (Irish Fusiliers) but in 1958 it was amalgamated with the 120th Independent Field Battery and reverted to the name Irish Fusiliers of Canada (Vancouver Regiment). (From memorybc.ca)

The 121st (Western Irish) Battalion, CEF (The "Battalion")

During 1915, the 121st Battalion, CEF was formed, based in New Westminster, B.C., with a large contingent drawn from the 11th Field Regiment, which included one Lt. Sherwood Lett, who was awarded the Military Cross and who served in the CEF at Hill 70 and Passchendaele, as well as in WWII at Dieppe (1942) and Overlord in Normandy (1944). He was wounded and evacuated from Dieppe as well as at Caen, He went on to become a diplomat as well as The Chief Justice of The Supreme Court of British Columbia and finally The British Columbia Court of Appeal. On August 16, 1916, from the Nominal Roll of Officers and Men, the 121st embarked from Halifax, Nova Scotia, on Empress of Britain. (Source: Nominal Roll). Lt. Col. Archibald Woodbury McLelan appears as it's ranking officer. A significant number of the officers and men were drawn from the ranks of the 11th Field Regiment, including Lt. Col. McLelan.

Upon arrival, the battalion found themselves absorbed into the 16th Reserve Battalion, making Lt. Col. McLelan it's only Commanding Officer.

Today, the 121st is perpetuated by The British Columbia Regiment (Duke of Connaught's Own).

Note: Lt. Col. McLelan carries the same Christian and Surname as a well known person from Nova Scotia and the Federal Government in John A. MacDonald's day, however as indicated in "Find a Grave", he does not appear to be a direct Descendant of businessman, politician and Confederation opponent Archibald Woodbury McLelan (1824 – 1890).

12 May 1917: Returned to Canada on S.S. "Olympic" for medical treatment, struck off G.M.F.

6 June 1917: Struck off Strength

14 June 1917: Struck off Strength – C.E.F.

3 January 1918: Granted leave of absence to 13 Feb 1918

14 August 1918: Struck off Strength, medically unfit

Lt. Col. McLelan's CEF record indicates significant medical issues while in the CEF, and no indication of direct military action. Further, there is no apparent recognition of his passing in media of the day, and apparently no Military recognition or ceremony to mark his passing.

Life after the Military

Following discharge, Lt. Col. McLelan operated as a farmer as well as sole member of a Potato Board.

The 1921 Canada Census indicates that he was a farmer, in Surrey, B.C.

He was sued and adjudged personally liable for damages claimed by a potato grower in 1930, from an article in the Vancouver Province on 4 September 1930.

As noted above, he died in New Westminster, B.C. on 18 October, 1966.

Lt. Norman Leacock Yearwood MC, 7th Battalion, CEF Regimental Number 16375 Introduction

The Regimental Museum was honoured to have Mr Douglas Yearwood, the Grandson of Major Norman Leacock Yearwood, MC, who served with the 7th Battalion throughout WW I, visit on August 5th. Douglas has read all of the Regiment's published histories and thus has an

excellent knowledge of the Regiment and in particular his Grandfather's exploits. He was also able to provide some first-hand knowledge of Major Yearwood's wartime travails.

Early in the war, he was gassed, left for dead and had been piled onto a heap of corpses. Sometime later, a medic saw him twitch, and found that he was not quite yet dead. Major Yearwood was later commissioned and returned to win a Military Cross on the first day of the Battle of Amiens. when he charged across no man's land and captured a number of German gun crews.

Col. (Retd) Keith Maxwell advised this is consistent with the MC citation and dates.

Douglas also advised that Norman was a rifleman with the original contingent of the battalion when it left Vancouver for Valcartier and returned in 1919 as a Lieutenant (one of the few originals to survive).

(Author's Note: Private Yearwood appears in the Nominal Roll of the 7th). He was a Major in the regiment when he passed away in 1932. His grandson has a photo of the Regiment's officers with him in it. He obtained it from the City of Vancouver Archives. I asked him to send us a copy.


joining the 7th Battalion, as well as influenza and tonsilitis during his military service.

Life after Military Service


The obituary and article which appeared in the Vancouver Province on May 22 and 23, 1932 indicate that he served in the Regiment as a Reservist, this suggests that he rose to a higher rank in steps culminating at the rank of Major. Major Yearwood does not appear to be referenced in Swift & Strong.


It is known that he served as an accountant in civilian life with Canadian National Steamships based in Vancouver, B.C. for approximately 21 years, suggesting his employment commenced at least as early as 1911. He lived on West 36th Avenue on the west side of Vancouver, B.C. at the time of his death.

OUT OF THE PAST The BRITISH COLUMBIA REGIMENT (DCO) SHOOTING TEAMS

The Regiment has enjoyed a protracted and mesmerizing history established by tens of thousands of "Canadian Citizen Soldiers" who have given voluntary service, during peace and war, since the formation of the Seymour Artillery Company in New Westminster B.C. in 1866. That's 156 years of military service to Canada. It's easy to put aside the past. We are all very committed in serving the Regiment, during our tenures of military servicer and perhaps fail to recollect to-days military service events become historical in character. It's titled "Regimental History"; to which you have a responsibility. As a "Duke", serving or retired, consider preparing a record, with photos if possible, of your time with the Regiment. Also, keep a

copy with your family records, and consider forwarding a copy to the Regimental Museum Society for custody in the Regimental Archives.

You are likely wondering how this photo relates to our Regiment. Colonel, then Corporal, Richard Wolfenden arrived in Canada, in 1858, with Colonel Moody's Royal Engineers. He was Colonel Moody's scribe.

Captain Richard Wolfenden was the Adjutant of the New Westminster Rifles. In later years he was promoted to Lt-Col and appointed to command the Provisional Regiment of Garrison Artillery. Col Wolfenden was the Regiment's second Commanding Officer. In civilian life, he was British Columbia's first "Queens Printer", and well known for his social and community life. He passed away in Victoria, B.C. in 1911.

Mount Wolfenden, located on the north side of Neroutsos Inlet, directly across from Port Alice B.C., recognizes and honours Lieutenant Colonel Richard Wolfenden.

PASSING OF MRS GRACE LUNGLEY WIFE OF FORMER BCR COMMANDING OFFICER LT-COL ARTHUR LUNGLEY, CD



LUNGLEY, Grace Megan August 29, 1916 - May 30, 2022

Grace Elliot (Morrow) Lungley was born August 29, 1916, in Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada to parents Norman Elliot and Elizabeth (Singleton) Elliot. As a child she grew up in the village of Regina Beach, a tiny community of a handful of families that expanded to perhaps 200 souls in the summer because of a nearby lake. There she and her four siblings Eva, James, Lorna and Thomas played, went to school and helped in the Elliot General store that her father and mother built and ran. At the age of 12 she and the family moved to New Westminster and soon after Vancouver (B.C.)

After graduating from high school, in the depth of the depression, she was able to get a "good" job working for the telephone company. She lived at home until the age of 27 when she met and married David James Morrow, a part owner of the Star Steam Laundry and a dashing young officer in the Canadian navy. Tragically, two years later, her beloved husband David was lost at sea November 1944, the result of a German submarine finding its target towards the end of World War II. Fortunately, Alice Davida Morrow was born 7 months later.

As a beautiful merry widow Grace was wined and dined by many. She traveled to Switzerland for one month and stayed for six. She volunteered with the Junior League and later was President of the Georgian

Club, now part of the Vancouver Club.

Ten years after the death of her first husband, Grace met and married the second love of her life Arthur Frank Lungley on March 1, 1956. An immigrant from England, tall, handsome, a survivor of WWII, he was a good husband, stepfather and son-in-law to Grace's mother Elizabeth who continued to live with the family for the rest of her life.

An inveterate shopper, nothing put more of a glint in her eye and delight in her demeanor than to go on a shopping expedition, "for bargains". Clothes, "antiques", food, she was always looking for the yellow tags at Fred Meyer or the sale bin at the Army and Navy. Even a few months before her death, after she was vaccinated and boostered for Covid her idea of fun was to shop at Fred Meyer looking for the yellow tags using the shopping cart for support.

Always ready to entertain and travel, Grace and Arthur went on many adventures together, particularly long trips to Maui where they met and became long-time friends with so many from the Maui Kai. And they hosted parties to celebrate New Years', birthdays, anniversaries together and then after Arthur's death Grace carried on entertaining. And she often travelled to far off places with her daughter, husband and family: at 80 to Cambodia, at 90 to Botswana, at 100 to Myanmar, mixed in with several bareboat sailing trips along the way.

St. Augustine's Anglican Church was a big focus at the end of her life. She loved the friends she made there, gathering greens from the neighborhoods nearby for the decorations, and in particular tending the church garden. Having sold her Vancouver home of 45 years she took up apartment living with gusto again making good friends at The Fontainebleau. Finally, she was persuaded to move to Portland OR to be near her daughter and family. So, in 2020 at 103 years of age she was a new immigrant to Portland Oregon, but still living independently in her own newly purchased condo. It was in her condo in her bed that she died peacefully in her sleep, which was what she wanted.

Grace is predeceased by her parents and all her siblings and her two husbands, the last of an era. She is survived by her daughter Davida (Slate) plus grandchildren Megan (Mike) and Will and two beloved great grandchildren Leone Grace and Edith and many nieces, nephews, and friends. In later life she became good friends with her stepson (Brooke Campbell now deceased) and his wife Janet Campbell and their children Shan Bodie (Jeremy) and Alan Campbell (Shelley) and their relatives in England.


