Vimy Ridge 1917 A Battle that Defines a Nation

The Chinese Canadian Military Museum Society and ANAVETS, Pacific Unit # 280, programme for the morning forum on ZOOM commenced with special guest speaker, Lieutenant-Colonel (Ret'd) Jim Barrett, President of The BC Regiment (DCO) Association, and Vice-president of the BCR Museum Society delivering an excellent presentation on the timely topic, "Vimy – A Battle That Defines a Nation".



Fields turned into 'cloth models' so each battalion knew their objectives.

Jim has excellent knowledge of the events leading up to the battle and covered off the lessons learned from the Somme and how the Canadian Corps Commander, Sir Julien Byng, and his senior staff, along with improvements in the science of artillery combined with air superiority on the battlefield gave the Canadian attack an excellent chance of success. Logistical issues were not forgotten either.





Not generally known are the mistakes made on the German Side which contributed to our success and the greater battle by Third British Army under the command of General Allenby in support of the French.

King Wan thanked Jim for his most insightful, informative, and detailed presentation. The presentation was followed by a Q&A session with members as a fitting conclusion to such an impressive address.



As stated in the biographical data presented by RUSI, Vancouver:

"Commander Price enrolled in the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) in 1993. His time at sea includes sailing in Minor War Vessels and as an Officer-in-Charge of training vessels on the west coast in operational and training roles. He has extensive experience in domestic operations and has been a member of Joint Task Force Pacific's Regional Liaison Program since 2013, leading that program since 2018. This team is the point-of-contact with Emergency Management BC and the BC Wildfire Service during events such as forest fires, floods, and pandemic response. He has also served as a member of the Vice-Chief of Defence Staff's (VCDS) Directorate of Employer Support to build relationships with reservists' civilian employers and educational institutions to ensure they could continue the pursuit of a Reservist military career. Commander Price served as the Commanding Officer of HMCS DISCOVERY on three separate occasions over eight years.

In 2021 Commander Price deployed on OPERATION NEON as Commander TASK FORCE BLUERIDGE based at the United States Navy base in Yokosuka, Japan in enforcement of United Nations Security Council Resolutions limiting the import of oil into North Korea. Commander Price was the Deputy Director for the Enforcement Coordination Cell. He is currently the Chief-of-Staff for the Royal Canadian Navy Reserve Western Region where he is responsible for the oversight of administration, personnel management, and training for seven Naval Reserve Divisions in the four Western provinces."

VANCOUVER VIMY PARADE 8 APRIL 2023



On April 8th 2023, over 200 cadets from the BCR cadet corps, Seaforth Highlanders of Canada, the Royal Westminster Regiment, 15 Field Artillery and 39 Service Battalion corps took part in the 106th anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge Commemoration, held at Mountain View Cemetery.



The Battle of Vimy Ridge was fought in April 1917 during World War I, between the Canadian Corps and the German Army. The battle began on April 9, 1917, and the Canadians successfully captured the hill after four days of heavy combat. The triumph came at a high price, with almost 10,000 Canadians slain, including 3,598 troops. The Battle of Vimy Ridge is regarded as a watershed point in Canadian history because it was the first time all four divisions of the Canadian Expeditionary Force fought together and won a critical victory

VAISAKHI CELEBRATIONS 2023 SURREY PARADE 22 APRIL 2023





With crowds estimated to reach 700,000 people, this year's Vaisakhi Parade celebration in Surrey, the first since 2019 due to the Pandemic, was billed as the "Grand Return" and promised to be one of the largest in Canada, if not the world. "Roddy MacKenzie's father served with the Royal Canadian Air Force in Bomber Command during the Second World War, but like so many brave veterans who had survived the war, he spoke little of his exploits. When Roddy started on his personal journey to discover something of what his father had achieved, he uncovered a great deal about the devastating effectiveness of Bomber Command and the vital role it played in the defeat of Third Reich. Roddy became a man on a mission, and this revealing, and often personal study, is the result. Bomber Command: Churchill's Greatest Triumph takes the reader through the early days of the Second World War and introduces all the key individuals who turned the Command into the war-winning weapon it eventually became, as well as detailing the men and machines which flew night after night into the heart of Hitler's Germany.

The main focus of his book is the destruction and dislocation wrought by the bombing to reduce, and ultimately destroy, Germany's ability to make war. In his analysis, Roddy dug deep into German archival material to uncover facts rarely presented to either German or English language readers. These demonstrate that Bomber Command's continual efforts, at appalling cost in aircrew casualties and aircraft losses, did far more damage to the Reich than the Allies knew."





Dear Ted,

History tells us that 06 June 1944 was the beginning of the end of the Second World War.

By the Spring of 1944, Germany had conquered most of the European continent, including France. A narrow stretch of water, the

English Channel was all the separated the German Forces from Great Britain. A final victory over Germany could only occur with

its defeat in North-Western Europe, The Allies decided to launch a major invasion against German Forces on the European

continent. On D-Day, a massive Canadian, British and American Force crossed the English Channel engaging in Operation

Overlord on a 50-mile stretch of heavily defended coast of Normandy, France. Allied troops fought their way to Normandy from

different landing areas; Juno Beach (Canada), Gold and Sword Beaches, (United Kingdom) Utah and Omaha Beaches (United States).

15,000 Canadian Soldiers established a beachhead along a five-mile stretch fronting the villages of Courseulle-Sur-Mer north to

St, Aubi-Sur-Mer. When completed, the completed, the Canadian and British troops would attack and capture the city of Caen. Prior

to the landing, over 450 Canadians successfully parachuted inland, prior to dawn, to capture the bridges over the Orne River and the Caen Canal. Many Canadian soldiers fighting in the Normandy campaign were young and new top battle, but their courage and skill meant they often helped to lead the Allied advance against a determined enemy; it paid off.

The collective experiences of Canada's Veterans who landed in Normandy in the summer of 1944, and fought to close the Falaise Gap and beyond, provide Canadians with a proud and lasting legacy that will continue into our country's future. We MUST always remember those who served, and the Fallen. We MUST help to keep alive the values they fought for and died for truth, peace, freedom and diversity. These values guide much of what we do to-day and reflects our free and peaceful country.

Consider passing this message to your children and grandchildren children.

BURIAL LOOS BRITISH CEMETERY 8 JUNE 2023

On the 8th of June 2023, Sgt R. Musgrave, Pte P Howarth, of the 7th Battalion (1st BC) CEF and Pte H. Atherton of the 10th Battalion CEF were buiried with their comrades who perished at Hill 70 at the British Loos Cemetery not far from the Hill 70 Memorial. Burial Parties from the perpetuating Regiments, namely the British Columbia Regiment (Duke of Connaught's Own) and the King's Own Calgary Regiment were present along with the deceased closest living relatives located through the work of the Regiments and Dr Sarah Lockyer from History & Heritage's Casualty Identification Programme who work to identify newly found skeletal remains and pre-existing unknown graves of Canadian service members from the Great War, the Second World War and the Korean War. The Programme attempts to identify the Canadian service members and provides them with a proper military burial. When research identifies a Canadian Occupant of an unidentified war grave, a new headstone is requested with the service member's name. Richard Musgrave was born 22 September 1884 in Blackrigg, Canomie, Scotland. His only listed parent was Rebecca Musgrave. Their family included Richard's sister Jeannie (Jane) Musgrave. Before enlisting, Richard was working as a Teamster in Calgary, Alberta.

On 30 April 1915 at age 30, Richard enlisted with the 56th Overseas Battalion of the Canadian Expeditionary Force (CEF) in Calgary, Alberta. On 5 July 1915, he sailed from Montreal aboard S.S. Elele headed to Shorncliffe Army Camp in England for training. On 17 February 1916, Private Musgrave travelled to France as a new member of the 7th Infantry Battalion (British Columbia), CEF. Throughout 1916, Musgrave was promoted up the ranks until achieving the rank of sergeant on 19 March 1917. On 14 April 1917, Sergeant Musgrave was wounded, but it was minor enough to stay on duty. On 9 July 1917, he was awarded the Military Medal for bravery.

On 15 August 1917, Sergeant Musgrave fought with the 7th Battalion during the first day of the Battle of Hill 70 near Lens, France. The 7th Battalion fought on the far left side of the 2nd Canadian Infantry Brigade. The 7th Battalion took part in the second wave of attacks between the Blue and Red Line objectives. The fight for the Red Line was difficult as the Germans held strongly to their positions. The Canadians, including the 7th Battalion, suffered heavy casualties as they fought their way forward past the Red Line to the Green Line objective. However, soon after passing the Red Line, they had to withdraw back to it since their left side was exposed. The 10th Infantry Battalion, CEF then advanced from behind the 7th Battalion to help hold the position against heavy German counterattacks. While the Green Line was successfully captured the following day, the battle continued until 25 August and cost over 10,000 Canadian casualties (killed, wounded, or missing). The 7th Battalion had over 140 men killed, 118 of whom were

missing and never found. Sergeant Musgrave, age 32, was reported missing on 15 August 1917 and was presumed to have died as part of the battle.

Following the war, Sergeant Musgrave's name was engraved on the Canadian National Vimy Memorial commemorating Canadian soldiers who died during the First World War and have no known grave.

On 11 July 2017, skeletal human remains were discovered during a munitions clearing process near rue Léon Droux and rue des Poissonniers, north of Lens, France. A few artifacts were found with the remains, including a Military Medal ribbon and a whistle.

Through historical, genealogical, anthropological, archaeological, and DNA analysis, with the assistance of the Canadian Forces Forensic Odontology Response Team, and the Canadian Museum of History, the Casualty Identification Review Board was able to confirm the identity of the remains as those of Sergeant Richard Musgrave in October 2021.

Sergeant Richard Musgrave was buried on 8 June 2023 in the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Loos British Cemetery in Loos-en-Gohelle, France by members of The British Columbia Regiment (Duke of Connaught's Own) from Vancouver, British Columbia. Attending the burial were family members, as well as representatives from the Government of Canada, the local French government, and the Canadian Armed Forces.

CORPORAL PERCY HOWARTH

In 2011, human remains were found in Vendin-le-Vieil, France. The remains were confirmed as those of Corporal Percy Howarth.

- Born 15 August 1894 in Darwen, Lancashire, England
- Died 15 August 1917 at the age of 23
- Died a member of the 7th Canadian Infantry Battalion (British Columbia), CEF
- Buried at <u>Commonwealth War Graves Commission</u>'s <u>Loos British Cemetery Plot VXIII, Row</u> H, Grave 10

Percy Howarth was born 16 August 1894 in Darwen, Lancashire, England. His parents were Richard and Margaret Howarth, née Dearden. Percy's family included siblings John, Mary, Eugenie, Eleazer, Charlie, Clara, and Maud. Percy immigrated to Canada in 1912, sailing from England on the RMS "Victorian". Before enlisting, Percy was working as a seaman in Vancouver, British Columbia.

On 19 July 1916, Percy enlisted with the 121st 'Overseas' Battalion, CEF in Vancouver, British Columbia, at the age of 21. On 14 August 1916, he sailed from Halifax aboard the S.S. "Empress of Britain" arriving in Liverpool, England on 24 August 1916. On 28 August 1916, Private Howarth joined the 7th Canadian Infantry Battalion, CEF, and trained in England before joining his unit in France on 29 November 1916. In April 1917 while in France, Private Howarth got sick with influenza and was treated in hospitals for a week before returning to duty. On 11 April 1917, he was promoted to the rank of Lance Corporal and then Corporal on 14 May 1917.

Corporal Howarth and the 7th Battalion fought in the Battle of Hill 70, which began on 15 August 1917. The 7th Battalion was on the left flank of the 2nd Canadian Infantry Brigade and took part in the second wave of the attack between the Blue and the Red Line objectives. The fight for the Red Line was difficult as the Germans held strong in their position. Heavy casualties were reported from this attack. The 7th Battalion then pressed towards the Green Line objective. However, they had to withdraw to the area of the Red Line since their left flank was exposed. During the afternoon of 15 August, the 10th Canadian Infantry Battalion, CEF was brought forward to help the 7th Battalion hold the line against German counterattacks. On 16 August, a second attack led by the 10th Battalion with support by the 7th Battalion, captured the Green Line. From 15 to 18 August 1917, the 7th Battalion suffered 118 casualties with no known graves in connection with the assault on Hill 70. Corporal Howarth was reported missing, then presumed to have died on 15 August 1917 at the age of 23.

After the war, Corporal Howarth's name was engraved on the <u>Canadian National Vimy Memorial</u>. This memorial commemorates Canadian soldiers who died during the First World War and have no known grave.

On 9 June 2011, skeletal human remains were discovered during a munitions clearing process for a construction site near Léon Droux Street, Vendin-le-Vieil, France. Alongside the remains were a few artifacts including a digging tool, a whistle, and a pocket watch.

Through historical, genealogical, anthropological, archaeological, and DNA analysis, with the assistance of the Canadian Forces Forensic Odontology Response Team, and the Canadian Museum of History, the Casualty Identification Review Board was able to confirm the identity of the remains as those of Corporal Percy Howarth in October 2021.

Corporal Howarth was buried on 8 June 2023 in the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Loos British Cemetery in Loos-en-Gohelle, France by members of The British Columbia (Duke of Connaught's Own) from Vancouver, British Columbia. Attending the burial were family members, as well as representatives from the Government of Canada, the local French government, and the Canadian Armed Forces.

ARTCLE FROM OKANAGAN MILITARY MUSEUM PORTRAIT OF 29th BN CEF SOLDIER

Every so often, we come across an item that raises more questions than answers. For example, this painting apparently depicts a soldier in the 29th Battalion (Vancouver) Canadian Expeditionary Force training in Hastings Park, Vancouver, in early 1915. It shows the soldier wearing a khaki woollen 7-button tunic with stand-up collar without insignia or cloth badges and a Service Dress cap with unit badge. In addition, he has a backpack with rolled-up Great coat, an unusual water bottle, a Ross rifle, khaki woollen trousers with putties and brown leather ankle boots.




"A Tobin Tiger" E.V. 1915 Oils on cedar wood shingle Pencil/ink sketch, 37x27cm. OMM-P-369

An associated note from the original purchaser, Ida Mary Burnett (nee Hinge), states: "This picture was purchased by me in 1915 in Vancouver. It is painted on a shingle, posed by a member of the Batt. [Battalion Ed.] The artist (unknown to me), wishing to provide some ready cash for his young family, painted quite a few before going overseas. The Manager of the Montreal Bank disposed of them for him." A search online found that Ida was married to Captain James Henry Burnett, who was in the Canadian Army Veterinarian Corps.

The artist's initials E.V. may point to Private Ernest James Keith Vincent, 76154 of the 29th, who died of wounds in October 1916, since he is the only person on the nominal roll at the time of embarkation with those initials. He was a single man working as a machinist whose mother and sister lived in the Nelson, BC, area.

Written in pencil on the back of the board is "#377 Pte I Williamson 3 6 Lonsdale Ave." Perhaps the notation #377 indicates a prolific production of artwork, possibly of many different topics of interest, prior to the artist's enrollment and deployment overseas. He may have been an art student or hobbyist with time and means, or medically or vocationally exempt from service, but probably not a serving recruit.

377 does not appear to be a service number as service numbers issued by the 29th ranged from 75001 to 77000, and nobody with 75377 or 76377 fits. Edward Irving Williamson 790016 of the 131st Battalion C.E.F., who lived in New Westminster with his wife and daughter, and worked as a street car conductor, may be the noted Private I. Williamson. The name might refer to Pte Robert Buchannan Williamson 76335 in the 29th from Vancouver, who may have posed for this painting. On the other hand, someone may have made an unrelated note of convenience on the back of the board, just like the equation written in pencil between the soldier's feet.

The unit's nickname, Tobin's Tigers, was named after the Vancouver industrialist, lawyer, and Royal Military College graduate, Lieutenant-Colonel Henry Seymour Tobin. He was a surveyor on the first overland route survey from Edmonton, Alberta, to Dawson Creek, Yukon Territory; a member of the Royal Canadian Northwest Mounted Police there; and a Boer War veteran.

Tobin commanded the unit when it formed in March 1915 with recruits from Vancouver and New Westminster. The 29th sailed to England from Montreal PQ in May with 37 officers and 1,090 men. They served in the 6th Canadian Infantry Brigade of the 2nd Canadian Infantry Division in France and Belgium until disbanding in September 1920 in Vancouver. Its history is perpetuated by the British Columbia Regiment (DCOR) in the Canadian Army, Reserve. He died in Vancouver on August 8, 1956, at 78 years of age.

- The Award is in over 130 countries with over 1 million participants worldwide, and over 21,000 participants in Canada
- This year we are celebrating the 60th Anniversary of the Award in Canada
- The Award is used by organizations that work with young people ages 14-24 to help youth achieve their full potential. It empowers youth to make a difference while setting goals and exploring their potential, taking on new challenges, giving back to their community and achieving success.
- Cadets Canada and the Duke of Edinburgh's International Award Canada are currently
 working on finalizing a new agreement. We are hopeful these will soon finalize with plans





THE BARRETT BUNKER JUNE 2023



43 Troop A Squadron BCR - Ft Lewis, Wash, MILCON Aug 1982

For this effort I have decided to look through my notes into what the BCR's were doing in June of 1983 just over 40 years ago. Between 24-27 June 1983, A squadron BCR led by Major Jack Drake, CD conducted our last Field Training Exercise for the September 1982 to June 1983 year on Sea Island in Richmond not far from the North End of Vancouver International Airport. My role as a Second-Lieutenant and Assistant Adjutant at the RHQ for this FTX was to take over command of the General Military Training (GMT) Course Officer (BMQ now) from Lt Roland Peters, who had taken a break from the Regiment for a week prior to deployment to Petawawa for his six weeks to complete his block qualifications as an Armoured Troop Officer. Lt Peters had commissioned from the rank of sergeant in the fall of 1982.

I arrived at the Beatty Street Drill Hall at 1900 hrs and prepared for the training. The original plan was for us to do a route march from the Drill Hall, but that changed into us being dropped off at critical points to guide the Regiment to the leaguer on Sea Island which WO Dave Holwell and I had scouted out earlier in the day as part of the Advance Party. We dropped the GMT soldiers off in pairs along the route at all the major intersections and critical turns in the area to provide direction. Traffic control also being a part of the skill set of the armoured recce soldier. We remained in location from 2200 to 0200 hrs the next morning as Maj Drake and the Regiment moved from the Drill Hall through downtown Vancouver, into Richmond, and into their Leaguer. Following the arrival of the rest of the BCRs we commence our planned night march through the country roads on Sea Island practising patrolling and fieldcraft as we went. I had MCpl Walker as my 2IC and both of us carried the heavy 25 Radio sets which added about 30 pounds (about 13 Kilograms) to our pack loads. I think each one was powered by 12 D Cell batteries, and you also carried a spare. Overall the night march went very well and as the day progressed into the dawn of Saturday the 25th of June, I realized that were in the same area where my parents to train our Brittany Spaniel and pick blackberries each August. Our and drills went well except for when I made a poor corner drill which in the real world would have exposed us to the risk of fire. Always lessons to be learned, even by young second-lieutenants.

We eventually found our way back to the A Sqn Leaguer about 0530 hrs where we were able to wash up, oil our FN rifles and have some breakfast before going to ground for a couple of hours of needed rest. Trooper Prouse, (who was top soldier on the course) and I rolled up in our respective groundsheets too tired to get

into sleeping bags like the rest of our Troop. I recall a Lt Paul Lindsay (Future CO) doing the same thing when on FTX as part of enemy force on EX Poseidon Duke 15-17 March 2002 in the cold up near Porteau-Cove and wondering how can you do that? Easier when you are younger, I suppose.

Up at 0930 our troop drew our lunch rations and accompanied by RSM Don Neish, we greased up with camouflage paint and headed out for more section drills and training. OCDT Chuck Shell came along for the day. Training went well enough that I bought everyone a coffee at a boat launch when we look a break, and on the way back looked for any available ruins in which we could practise house clearing drills. Spying a farmer standing by his barn, I asked him if he would mind if we used his barn for practise. Inside he and his family were relaxing and we were given permission to use the back stalls of the barn. The farmer's wife took a picture of the two of us together. I would have been wearing my 1954 pattern issued webbing, black beret and carrying a Sterling Submachine gun at the time. OCdt Chuck Shell directed the lessons and the soldiers performed well except for one unfortunate who slipped and fell into cow deposits. Not a very popular Trooper after that.

We made our way back to the BCR A Sqn leaguer by 1700 hrs for dinner. Maj Drake knew that we had worked hard the night before and throughout the day, so we were stood down from our planned night march to join the rest of the troops for the end of year party.

Cpl Rob Halverson was tasked to give me a ride to the Drill Hall so I could be home to attend my Niece's Christening at our old family Church Sunday morning.

That is how we ended our tenth FTX of the year for June 1983, a year in which we celebrated the Centennial of the BCR being formed on 12 October 1883 and which we won the Worthington Trophy for being the top Reserve Armoured Unit in Canada and the Dunwoody Trophy for being the Best in the West.

Captain Charles Tennent, 30th Battalion, CEF

The 30th Battalion CEF was raised in 1915 according to it's Nominal Roll. Today, the 30th Battalion is perpetuated with The British Columbia Regiment (DCO) in Vancouver, B.C. The Battalion was raised in 1915 in Victoria, B.C., originally intended as a fresh infantry battalion, however, by the time it arrived in England, it was reassigned as a reinforcement unit and ultimately in 1917 was absorbed into the 7th Battalion, CEF.

Our subject appears in the 30th Battalion Nominal Roll with a misspelled surname: Tenant, however he does appear in the CEF records as Charles Tennent. He appears with the rank of Lieutenant, his previous posting was noted as with S.A. (South Africa Constabulary). His father as next of kin was noted as living at Purbright, Dorset, England, and his reported country of birth as Scotland. He was Taken on Strength on 18 November 1914 at Victoria, B.C. He is noted in a 1919 newspaper article reproduced in this article to have arrived in Victoria, B.C. in the 1880's. His separation document identifies his wife's Christian name as Gwendolen W., living in Kensington from 1917, this raises the possibility that his spouse remained in the U.K. They were married in November 1915, with permission. The names of any children are unknown. The cemetery records from Ross Bay Cemetery suggest that he was married, location not available at time of writing, and that her maiden name was Sutton. Prior to enlistment in the C.E.F., and prior to his service in the South Africa Constabulary, he served with the North West Mounted Police, and Strathcona Horse. The following clipping indicates he left the service of the North-West Mounted Police as well as the Yukon Gold Commissioner in January 1900, to report to Calgary, then N.W. Territories, to join the Strathcona's who were preparing to report to the Transvaal, however his obituary indicates he served from 1886 to 1888 in the NWMP.

According to the Yukon Sun, Charles Tennent, for years a member of the N. W.M.P., and latterly of the gold commissioner's office, left for the outside on January 15th. It is Mr. Tennent's aspiration to join the corps of the N.W. M.P. detailed for service in the Transvaal. If he does not arrive in Calgary before the departure of his corps, it is his intention to promptly follow it to its destination.

The following article from The Victoria Daily Times dated 12 February 1900 describes his travels from Telegraph Creek to Calgary to join the Strathcona's for deployment to South Africa.

Around the Corridors

Robert Hyland Comes Over the Ice From Talegraph Creek to Enlist.

Another Story to Be Added to the Queen's Hotel.

Robert Hyland, who for many months has been engaged in the store of his father and brother at Telegraph Creek, and in looking after their pack trains, registered at the Dominion yesterday, having arrived from the headwaters of the Stikine by the steamer Dirigo. He came down for the purpose of enlisting in the Strathcona Horse. It was about two weeks ago that the mail which reached Telegraph Creek told of the call for volunteers, and as soon as Mr. Hyland received news of the call he decided to answer it, and a few days later he was hurrying over the frozen trail with a dog team towards Wrangel. He made the trip, breaking a trail nearly all the way, in three days, which is one of the fastest trips made down the river. He caught the steamer Dirigo at Wrangel and arrived here just one day too late to secure a place in the corps. Mr. Hyland took up his residence this morning with his brother, J. Hyland, on Montreal street. Other arrivals by the Dirigo who came down from the north to enlist in the Strathcona Horse were five members of the Northwest Mounted Police. The five, who are registered at the Victoria, are as follows: W. K. Humfrey, from Bennett; Chas. Tennent, from Dawson; Charles G. Duncan and W. H. Binns, from Tagish; and J. E. Harding, from the White Pass. They were ac cepted by wire this afternoon. Mr Hyland, however, was not given a place

An article from The Victoria Daily Times dated 24 October 1914 covering preparations for mounting a new battalion references our subject as a provisional Lieutenant. The article is too lengthy to insert into this article, however it is available for review on request to the writer. His obituary indicates he enlisted with the 50th Gordon Highlanders on 14 August 1914 and transferred to the 30th Battalion on 1 November 1914.

Swift & Strong references on page 70 that the first contingent sailed for England led by Lt. Col. Hall (88th Victoria Fusiliers) on 23 February 1915 and arrived on the 30th (May) 1915.

Victoria Times Colonist: 23 September 1938 p. 1, 4

Lt. Tennent arrived in France in May 1915 with the first contingent of the 30th Battalion, C.E.F.

His military record indicates he was transferred to the 7th Battalion on 12 May 1915.

On 1st October 1915, he was appointed Aide-de-Camp and Camp Commandant of the 1st Division.

On 9 September 1916, he was elevated to the rank of Captain.


On 17 July 1917 he was appointed by General Sir Arthur Currie, GCMG, KCB as his Aide-de-Camp, removing him from the line of fire.

In February 1918, he was invalided to Canada (sic with serious medical issues) to recuperate, permanently unfit for duty. He arrived on 23 February 1918 on S.S. Woodford.

There is no evidence from his military record that he was awarded any medals during his military service.

Following Military Service

On 15 April 1919, he was appointed a travelling inspector for the British Columbia Bureau of Labour. There appears to be no other post military media coverage of his career following 1919.

Death and Burial

Captain (Retd.) Tennent died at Saanich, B.C. on 23 September 1938, from B.C. Archives records. His obituary was published in The Victoria Times Colonist on the same day.

Captain Tennent is buried at Ross Bay Cemetery, Victoria, B.C. His Military headstone apparently has been placed at his grave in the recent past by Last Post Fund.

His plot is shared with his mother-in-law: Ada Helena nee: Gladding Sutton 1857-1926. The burial location of his spouse Gwen Tennent is unclear, it is apparent from her mother's death notice that she was still living in 1926, and on Captain Tennent's Death Certificate in 1938. The cause of death shown on the death record is carcinoma.

SERGEANT WILLIAM HENRY CLENDINNING, MM 28th CAR (BCR) RCAC

As many readers will know, Sgt. Clendinning would become a member of the 28th Armored Regiment, CAR (BCR) "A" Squadron, and would survive and escape captivity on 9 August 1944 at Hill 140 in Normandy, only to be lost in Belgium in September 1944. He is quoted in Swift & Strong on page 182 regarding his experiences at Hill 140.

I have provided a link to his military record, which is now available from Library Canada, which includes his paybook as well as his military record. It is very readable and concise, so I recommend it to anyone who is interested in the details of his military Career.


Sgt. Clendinning was awarded the Military Medal for his actions related to Hill 140.

Clendinning's tank was one of many of his regiment's which was knocked out and set on fire by enemy antitank guns. "In spite of heavy shelling and mortar fire Sgt. Clendinning immediately reorganized his own crew and that of another tank, ordered to dig in and, with salvaged weapons during the day repelled several enemy attacks in considerable strength supported by artillery and mortar fire, and inflicted severe casual-

In Memoriam Peggy Gwen Lee

Peggy Gwen Lee (nee Wong) 李黃翠娟, WW2 SJA Veteran (October 20, 1923 - April 13, 2023)

Peggy Gwen Lee (nee Wong) of Prince Rupert, who was one of 14 siblings, had moved to Vancouver to attend hairdressing school and opened her first salon at 17 years old. As the war raged on, Peggy joined St. John Ambulance at 19 in 1942, and served in a civil defence unit called the Women's Ambulance Corps until the end of the Second World War. Her platoon was unique in that it consisted entirely of 20 Chinese women, the only one in all of North America.

When Pearl Harbour and Hong Kong were attacked on December 7, 1941 (PST), Vancouver's St. John Brigade was able to mobilise within the hour to staff and action all First Aid posts. The members of the Women's Ambulance Corps wore para-military uniforms, tailored to measure by Dunn's Tailors. Trained in home nursing, ambulance driving and first aid, they were being prepared for the invasion on Canadian soil, but that attack never came during the entirety of the war.

Peggy and her platoon, Second Company of Platoon A, were drilled at the Seaforth Armoury in downtown Vancouver, and became comprehensive nurses, firefighters, and stretcher-bearers. They proudly paraded down East Georgia Street in Chinatown, and across the then Georgia-Harris Viaduct to the Beatty Street Armoury (today's Beatty Street Drill Hall) for inspection. One of her jobs was to ensure residents kept their windows blacked out at night. Peggy was the youngest member of this platoon and was the last surviving member of her platoon at 99 years young in early-2023. She was also the last known surviving WW2 veteran of St. John Ambulance in BC from our greatest generation.

Peggy was a trailblazer, as she ran four hair salons at its peak, including one inside the Hotel Vancouver for almost 20 years; and raised her 4 children, while contributing to the greater Vancouver community. Peggy's larger than life portrait can be found as a part of the Chinatown History Windows project, located in the historic Shanghai Alley. She was also a founding member and active fundraiser for the Chinese Canadian Military Museum Society (CCMMS), the only museum in Canada devoted to Chinese Canadian Veterans' history. Her last overseas trip was in 2014 to China at the age of 91, as a WW2 veteran and CCMMS participant.

Members of St. John Ambulance Canada and BC/Yukon paid regular visits to honour her service and even celebrated the various holidays during her sunset years, which included the Chancellor of the Priory of Canada, our Provincial Commissioner, members of the military, and many senior officers and cadets. Peggy received many recognitions and accolades, including the St. John Medallion for her Dedicated Service in November 2020. During the very first visit with officers and cadets, Peggy looked up with a smile as she immediately recognized the uniform, pointed and said, "St. John Ambulance!"

At 1:45 pm April 13, 2023 on a sunny Thursday afternoon, Peggy passed away peacefully on her centennial year. Although she would've turned 100 this October, SJA members were there to celebrate the start of her centennial year during the Lunar New Year in January. Peggy was predeceased by her husband, William Henry Rees Lee; and is survived by their children, Colin, Catherine, Deborah, Barbara, and granddaughter Maya.
